multiple levels of censorship Smith finds Emphasizing the poet sustaining aspects of the passionate bonds between the two women Smith shows that their relationship was both textual and sexual Based on study of the actual holograph poems Smith reveals the extent of Sue Dickinson's collaboration in the production of poems most notably Safe in Their Alabaster Chambers This finding will surely challenge the popular conception of the isolated withdrawn Emily Dickinson Well versed in poststructuralist feminist and new textual criticism Rowing in Eden uncovers the process by which the
