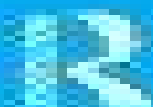

Edging Women Out Gaye Tuchman, 2012-08-21 Before about 1840 there was little prestige attached to the writing of novels and most English novelists were women By the turn of the twentieth century men of letters acclaimed novels as a form of great literature and most critically successful novelists were men In the book sociologist Gaye Tuchman examines how men succeeded in redefining a form of culture and in invading a white collar occupation previously practiced mostly by women Tuchman documents how men gradually supplanted women as novelists once novel writing was perceived as potentially profitable in part because of changes in the system of publishing and rewarding authors Drawing on unusual data ranging from the archives of Macmillan and company London to an analysis of the lives and accomplishments of authors listed in the Dictionary of National Biography she shows that rising literacy and the centralization of the publishing industry in London after 1840 increased literary opportunities and fostered men's success as novelists Men redefined the nature of a good novel and applied a double standard in critically evaluating literary works by men and by women They also received better contracts than women for novels of equivalent quality and sales They were able to accomplish this says Tuchman because they were to a large extent the culture brokers the publishers publishers readers and reviewers of an elite art form Both a sociological study of occupational gender transformation and a historical study of writing and publishing this book will be a rich resource for students of the sociology of culture literary criticism and women's studies Married, Middlebrow, and Militant Teresa Mangum, 1998 Examines the life and work of this daring nineteenth century author and women's rights advocate **Romanticism and Gender** Anne K. Ella Hepworth Dixon Valerie Fehlbaum, 2017-07-05 In a career that spanned over forty years Ella Hepworth Dixon 1857 1932 was alternately journalist critic essayist short story writer novelist editor of a women s magazine dramatist and autobiographer After an initial popularity however Dixon s work remained largely unread for decades Valerie Fehlbaum sheds light on Dixon s life and work and provides profound insight not only into Dixon herself but into the multifaceted character of the New Woman writer that Dixon typified Representing Female Artistic Labour, 1848-1890 Patricia Zakreski, 2016-12-05 Patricia Zakreski s interdisciplinary study draws on fiction prose painting and the periodical press to expand and redefine our understanding of women s relationship to paid work during the Victorian period While the idea of separate spheres has largely gone uncontested by feminist critics studying female labour during the nineteenth century Zakreski challenges this distinction by showing that the divisions between public and private were in fact surprisingly flexible with homes described as workplaces and workplaces as homes By combining art with forms of industrial or mass production in representations of the respectable woman worker writers projected a form of paid creative work that was not violated or profaned by the public world of the market in which it was traded Looking specifically at sewing art writing and acting Zakreski shows how these professions increasingly came to be defined as artistic and thus as suitable professions for middle class women and argues that the supposedly degrading activity of paid work could be transformed into a refining experience for women Rather than consigning working women to the margins of patriarchal culture then her study shows how representations of creative women by authors such as Elizabeth Barrett Browning Dinah Craik Charles Dickens Anthony Trollope and Charlotte Yonge participated in and shaped new forms of mainstream culture
