The Education of Black People W. E. B. DuBois, 2001-06 Undoubtedly the most influential black intellectual of the twentieth century and one of America's finest historians W E B DuBois knew that the liberation of the African American people required liberal education and not vocational training He saw education as a process of teaching certain timeless values moderation an avoidance of luxury a concern for courtesy a capacity to endure a nurturing love for beauty At the same time DuBois saw education as fundamentally subversive This was as much a function of the well established role of education from Plato forward as the realities of the social order under which he lived He insistently calls for great energy and initiative for African Americans controlling their own lives and for continued experimentation and innovation while keeping education's fundamentally radical nature in view Though containing speeches written nearly one hundred years ago and on a subject that has seen more stormy debate and demagoguery than almost any other in recent history *The Education of Black People* approaches education with a timelessness and timeliness at once rooted in classical thought that reflects a remarkably fresh and contemporary relevance *The Education of Black People* William Edward Burghardt Du Bois, 1975

freed African Americans former reservation Indians and a burgeoning immigrant population In *The Autobiography of Citizenship* Tova Cooper looks at how educators tried to impose unity on this divergent population and how the new citizens in turn often resisted these efforts reshaping mainstream U S culture and embracing their own view of what it means to be an American *The Autobiography of Citizenship* traces how citizenship education programs began popping up all over the country influenced by the progressive approach to hands on learning popularized by John Dewey and his followers Cooper offers an insightful account of these programs enlivened with compelling readings of archival materials such as photos of students in the process of learning autobiographical writing by both teachers and new citizens and memoirs photos poems and novels by authors such as W E B Du Bois Jane Addams Charles Reznikoff and Emma Goldman Indeed Cooper provides the first comparative inside look at these citizenship programs revealing that they varied wildly at one end assimilationist boarding schools required American Indian children to transform their dress language and beliefs while at the other end the libertarian Modern School encouraged immigrant children to frolic naked in the countryside and learn about the world by walking hiking and following their whims Here then is an engaging portrait of what it was like to be and become a U S citizen one hundred years ago showing that what it means to be American is never static

Zaki, 2007 *Civil Rights and Politics at Hampton Institute* presents the story of how one of the preeminent and historically conservative private institutions of black higher education came to play an important part in the struggle for full racial equality Hoda Zaki traces Hampton Institute's progressive impact to its first black and alumnus president Alonzo G. Moron who used his office to launch a powerful and sustained attack against segregation A brilliant man who was uncompromising in his beliefs about creating a more inclusive democracy Moron struggled against conservative forces both outside of and within his own institution before his ouster by Hampton's predominantly white governing board in 1959 just a year before the Greensboro sit ins signaled the death knell for the segregationist era in which his institution had prospered Hoda Zaki details the significance of Moron's complicated career through discussions of his theories of citizenship education his work in promoting equal rights as a mission for the college and the political philosophy as evidenced in his speeches that he shared with other civil rights leaders of the era
