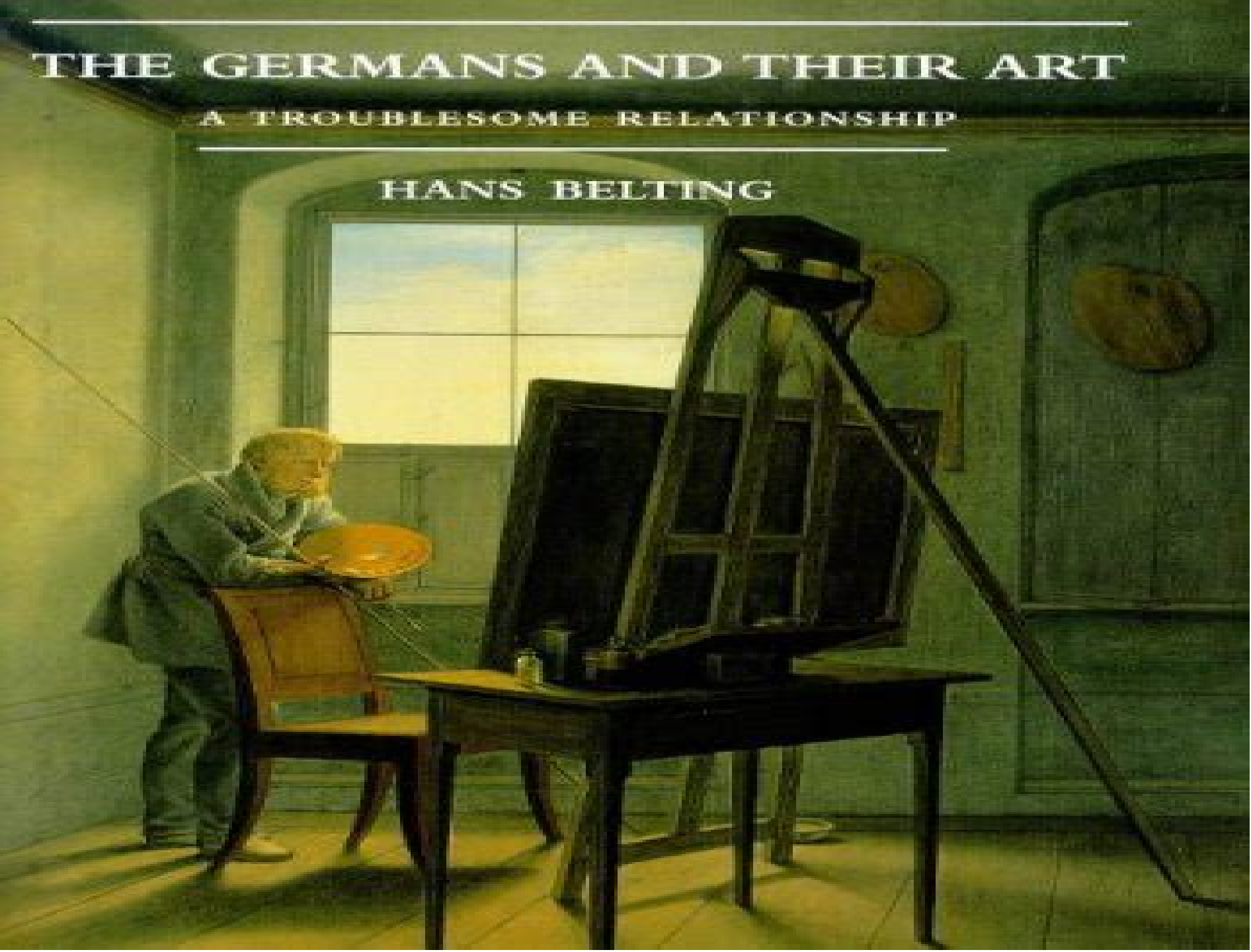

The Germans and Their Art Hans Belting, Professor for Art History and Media Theory Hans Belting, 1998-01-01 This study focuses on the attitudes Germans have towards their art from the Romantic period to the present and discusses the ways they have tried to find their identity as a nation through this art Belting proposes that German art criticism is divided by opposing ideologies and contradictions *Turks, Jews, and Other Germans in Contemporary Art* Peter Chametzky, 2021-09-14 The first book to examine multicultural visual art in Germany discussing more than thirty contemporary artists and arguing for a cosmopolitan Germanness With *Turks Jews and Other Germans in Contemporary Art* Peter Chametzky presents a view of visual culture in Germany that leaves behind the usual suspects those artists who dominate discussions of contemporary German art including Gerhard Richter Anselm Kiefer and Rosemarie Trockel and instead turns to those artists not as well known outside Germany including Maziar Moradi Hito Steyerl and Tanya Ury In this first book length examination of Germany's multicultural art scene Chametzky explores the work of more than thirty German artists who are among other ethnicities Turkish Jewish Arab Asian Iranian Sinti and Roma Balkan and Afro German With a title that echoes Peter Gay's 1978 collection of essays *Freud Jews and Other Germans* this book like Gay's rejects the idea of us and them in German culture Discussing artworks in a variety of media that both critique and expand notions of identity and community Chametzky offers a counternarrative to the fiction of an exclusively white Christian German culture arguing for a cosmopolitan Germanness He considers works that deploy critical confrontational and playful uses of language especially German and Turkish that assert the presence of foreign bodies among the German body politic that grapple with food as a cultural marker that engage with mass media and that depict and inhabit spaces imbued with the element of time American discussions of German contemporary art have largely ignored the emergence of non ethnic Germans as some of Germany's most important visual artists *Turks Jews and Other Germans in Contemporary Art* fills this gap **Germans in the Southwest, 1850-1920** Tomas Jaehn, 2005 A history of the German presence in the American Southwest from the mid nineteenth century through the World War I era [German Art in New York](#) Gregor Langfeld, 2025-10-01 Why did the Museum of Modern Art and the Guggenheim in New York and art collectors and curators such as Katherine Dreier and Alfred Barr collect modern German art in the first half of the twentieth century And why did certain works of art belong to the canon while others did not In this book Gregor Langfeld argues that National Socialism played a crucial role in the canonization of movements such as Expressionism and the Bauhaus A role which undermined the post 1945 reputations of many artists associated with classical and figurative trends Langfeld offers important new insights into the political and ideological motivations behind the New York art world's fluctuations in opinion fashion and price **Museums in the German Art World** James J. early twentieth century On a broader level it illuminates the origin and character of the museum's central role in modern culture James Sheehan begins by describing the establishment of the first public galleries during the last decades of Germany's old regime He then examines the revolutionary upheaval that swept Germany between 1789 and 1815 arguing that the first great German museums reflected the nation's revolutionary aspirations By the mid nineteenth century the climate had changed museums constructed in this period affirmed historical continuities and celebrated political accomplishments During the next several years however Germans became disillusioned with conventional definitions of art and lost interest in monumental museums By the turn of the century the museum had become a site for the political and cultural controversies caused by the rise of artistic modernism In this context Sheehan argues we can see the first signs of what would become the modern style of museum architecture and modes of display The first study of its kind this highly accessible book will appeal to historians museum professionals and anyone interested in the relationship between art politics and culture

The Moment of Self-Portraiture in German Renaissance Art Joseph Leo Koerner, 1993 So foundational is this invention to modern aesthetics Koerner argues that interpreting it takes us to the limits of traditional art historical method Self portraiture becomes legible less through a history leading up to it or through a sum of contexts that occasion it than through its historical sight line to the present After a thorough examination of Durer's startlingly new self

portraits the author turns to the work of Baldung Durer's most gifted pupil and demonstrates how the apprentice willfully disfigured Durer's vision. Baldung replaced the master's self-portraits with some of the most obscene and bizarre pictures in the history of art. In images of nude witches, animated cadavers, and copulating horses, Baldung portrays the debased self of the viewer as the true subject of art. The Moment of Self-Portraiture thus unfolds as passages from teacher to student, artist to viewer, reception all within a culture that at once deified and abhorred originality.

The Visual Arts in Germany, 1890-1937 Shearer West, 2000. This work provides an introduction to the visual arts in Germany from the early years of German unification to World War II. The study is an analysis of painting, sculpture, graphic art, design, film, and photography in relation to a wider set of cultural and social issues that were specific to German modernism. It concentrates on the ways in which the production and reception of art interacted with and was affected by responses to unification, conflict between left and right political factions, gender concerns, contemporary philosophical and religious ideas, the growth of cities, and the increasing importance of mass culture.

Art and the German Bourgeoisie Carolyn Helen Kay, 2002-01-01. In this new study of art in fin de siècle Hamburg, Carolyn Kay examines the career of the city's art gallery director Alfred Lichtwark, one of Imperial Germany's most influential museum directors and a renowned cultural critic. A champion of modern art, Lichtwark stirred controversy among the city's bourgeoisie by commissioning contemporary German paintings for the Kunsthalle by secession artists and supporting the formation of an independent art movement in Hamburg influenced by French impressionism. Drawing on an extensive amount of archival research and combining both historical and art historical approaches, Kay examines Lichtwark's cultural politics, their effect on the Hamburg bourgeoisie, and the subsequent changes to the cultural scene in Hamburg. Kay focuses her study on two modern art scandals in Hamburg and shows that Lichtwark faced strong public resistance in the 1890s, winning significant support from the city's bourgeoisie only after 1900. Lichtwark's struggle to gain acceptance for impressionism highlights conflicts within the city's middle class as to what constituted acceptable styles and subjects of German art, with opposition groups demanding a traditional and pure German culture. The author also considers who within the Hamburg bourgeoisie supported Lichtwark and why. Kay's local study of the debate over cultural modernism in Imperial Germany makes a significant contribution both to the study of modernism and to the history of German culture.

Pennsylvania Germans Simon J. Bronner, Joshua R. Brown, 2017-02-15.
