Garcilaso Inca de la Vega José Anadón, 1998-05-22 Sixteenth century historian Garcilaso Inca de la Vega had a unique view of the ancient Inca Empire and the Americas A Peruvian mestizo who emigrated to Spain he was the first writer to envision Latin America as a multiethnic continent and he advanced a humanist interpretation of New World history that continues to enrich our appreciation of that era Widely read and translated Garcilaso is a key figure for understanding the development of mestizo culture in Latin America and his works have sparked many heated debates This new collection of articles advances that discussion through contributions by twelve distinguished scholars who review central aspects of Garcilaso s life and work from the perspectives of history linguistics literary theory and anthropology These essays explore the complex intertextual threads which weave through Garcilaso s principal writings Some examine the relationship of his work with the canon of European historiography while others stress its link with Andean culture still others focus on the puzzles presented by his use of self representation Many of the articles offer fresh readings of Garcilaso s Royal Commentaries and include not only textual analyses of key themes but also a reassessment of Inca political organization Other contributions address his Florida of the Inca focusing on such aspects as its discourse and dating Together all the essays demonstrate that Garcilaso scholarship continues to be receptive to new critical approaches Assembled as a tribute to Jos Durand whose life long study of Garcilaso renewed scholarly understanding of the historian s work Garcilaso Inca de la Vega is a valuable collection for anyone interested in the history of North and South America or the rise of mestizo culture It contributes significantly to current studies in multiculturalism as it renews our appreciation for one of its earliest proponents

Narrative Threads Jeffrey Quilter, Gary Urton, 2010-07-05 The Inka Empire stretched

over much of the length and breadth of the South American Andes encompassed elaborately planned cities linked by a complex network of roads and messengers and created astonishing works of architecture and artistry and a compelling mythology all without the aid of a graphic writing system. Instead the Inkas records consisted of devices made of knotted and dyed strings called *kipu* on which they recorded information pertaining to the organization and history of their empire. Despite more than a century of research on these remarkable devices the *kipu* remain largely undeciphered. In this benchmark book twelve international scholars tackle the most vexed question in *kipu* studies: how did the Inkas record and transmit narrative records by means of knotted strings? The authors approach the problem from a variety of angles. Several essays mine Spanish colonial sources for details about the kinds of narrative encoded in the *kipu*. Others look at the uses to which *kipu* were put before and after the Conquest as well as their current use in some contemporary Andean communities. Still others analyze the formal characteristics of *kipu* and seek to explain how they encode various kinds of numerical and narrative data.

Strange Names of God Sangkeun Kim, 2004. One of the most precarious and daunting tasks for sixteenth century European missionaries in the cross cultural mission frontiers was translating the name of God *Deus* into the local language. When the Italian Jesuit Matteo Ricci 1552-1610 introduced the Chinese term *Shangti* as the semantic equivalent of *Deus* he made one of the most innovative cross cultural missionary translations. Ricci's employment of *Shangti* was neither a simple rewording of a Chinese term nor the use of a loan word but was indeed a risk taking identification of the Christian God with the Confucian Most High *Shangti*. *Strange Names of God* investigates the historical progress of the semantic configuration of *Shangti* as the divine name of the Christian God in China by focusing on Chinese intellectuals' reaction to the strangely translated Chinese name of God.

Judaism in Christian Eyes Yaacov Deutsch, 2012-06-28. This book examines Christian ethnographic writing about the Jews in early modern Europe offering a systematic historical analysis of this literary genre and arguing its importance for better understanding both the period in general and Jewish-Christian relations in particular. The book focuses on nearly 80 texts from Western Europe mostly Germany that describe the customs and ceremonies of the contemporary Jews containing both descriptions and illustrations of their subjects. Deutsch is one of the first scholars to study these unique writings in extensive detail. He examines books in which Christian authors describe Jewish life and provides new interpretations of Christian perceptions of Jews. Christian Hebraism and the attention paid by the Hebraist to contemporary Jews and Judaism. Since many of the authors were converts studying their books offers new insights into conversion during the period. Their work presents new perspectives on the study of religion developments in the field of anthropology and ethnography and internal Christian debates that arose from the portrayal of Jewish life. Despite the lack of attention by modern scholars some of these books were extremely popular in their time and represent one of the important ways by which Jews were perceived during the period. The key claim of the study is that although almost all of the descriptions of Jewish customs are accurate the authors chose to concentrate mainly on details that show the Jewish

ceremonies as anti Christian superstitious and ridiculous these details also reveal the deviation of Judaism from the Biblical law Deutsch suggests that these ethnographic descriptions are better defined as polemical ethnographies and argues that the texts despite their polemical tendency represent a shift from writing about Judaism as a religion to writing about Jews and from a mode of writing based on stereotypes to one based on direct contact and observation *Elective Affinities* Agnieszka H.
