

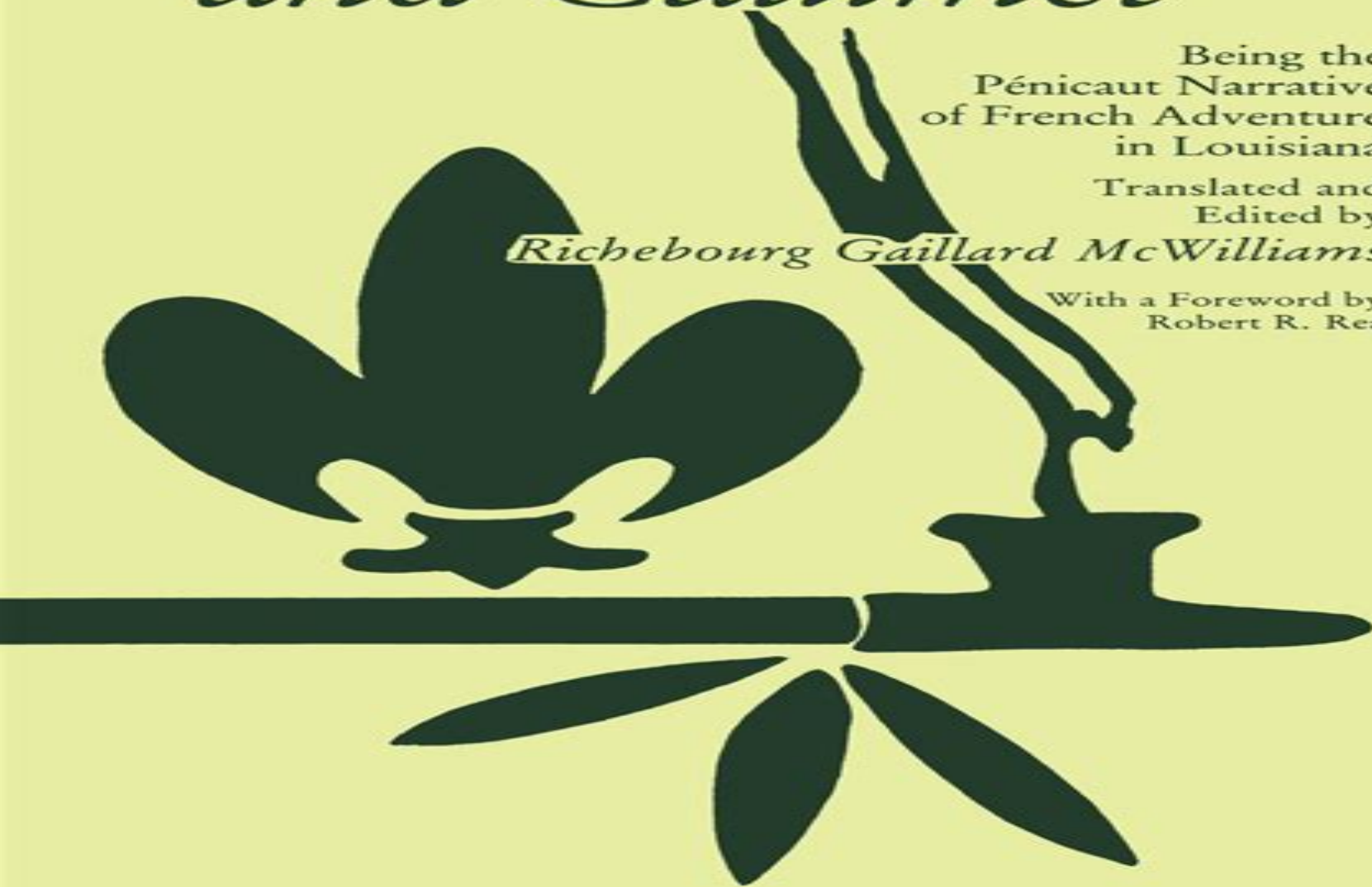

Translated from French Manuscripts... by Richebourg Gaillard McWilliams,...* André Joseph Penicaud, 1953 *Fleur de Lys and Calumet* André Pénicaud, 1988-07-30 Andre Penicaud a carpenter sailed with Iberville to the French province of Louisiana in 1699 and did not return to France until 1721 The book he began in the province and finished upon his return to France is an eyewitness account of the first years of the French colony which stretched along the Gulf Coast from Florida to Texas and in the Mississippi Valley from the Balize to the Illinois country As a ship carpenter Penicaud was chosen as a member of several important expeditions he accompanied Le Sueur up the Mississippi River in 1700 to present day Minnesota and he went with Juchereau de St Denis on the first journey from Mobile to the Red River and overland to the Rio Grande to open trade with the Spaniards in Mexico Penicaud helped to build the first post in Louisiana at Old Biloxi and the second post on the Mobile River Penicaud was at his best when describing the lives and social customs of the Indians of the region He saw them in realistic terms showing no prejudice toward their native habits Neither were his French colleagues cast in heroic or villainous molds though their accomplishments must strike modern readers as truly epic When first published *Fleur de Lys and Calumet* was a major stimulus to scholarship in the field This new edition will be welcomed by a new generation of scholars and readers interested in the colonial history of the Deep South and the Mississippi Valley ***Fleur de Lys and Calumet*** André Pénicaud, 1988 ***Voices of the Old South*** Alan Gallay, 1994-01-01 Eyewitness accounts intended to introduce readers to a wide variety of primary literary sources for studying the Old South *New Orleans* Charles D. Cherokee Medicine, Colonial Germs Paul Kelton, 2015-04-08 How smallpox or Variola caused widespread devastation during the European colonization of the Americas is a well known story But as historian Paul Kelton informs us that s precisely what it is a convenient story In Cherokee Medicine Colonial Germs Kelton challenges the virgin soil thesis or the widely held belief that Natives lack of immunities and their inept healers were responsible for their downfall Eschewing the metaphors and hyperbole routinely associated with the impact of smallpox he firmly shifts the focus to the root cause of indigenous suffering and depopulation colonialism writ large not disease Kelton s account begins with the long false dawn between 1518 and the mid seventeenth century when sporadic encounters with Europeans did little to bring Cherokees into the wider circulation of guns goods and germs that had begun to transform Native worlds By the 1690s English inspired slave raids had triggered a massive smallpox epidemic that struck the Cherokees for the first time Through the eighteenth century Cherokees repeatedly responded to real and threatened epidemics and they did so effectively by drawing on their own medicine Yet they also faced terribly destructive physical violence from the British during the Anglo Cherokee War 1759 1761 and from American militias during the Revolutionary War Having suffered much more from the scourge of war than from smallpox the Cherokee population rebounded during the nineteenth century and without abandoning Native medical practices and beliefs Cherokees took part in the nascent global effort to eradicate Variola by embracing vaccination A far more complex and nuanced history of Variola among American Indians emerges from these pages one that privileges the lived experiences of the Cherokees over the story of their supposedly ill equipped immune systems and counterproductive responses Cherokee Medicine Colonial Germs shows us how Europeans and their American descendants have obscured the past with the stories they left behind and how these stories have perpetuated a simplistic understanding of colonialism

Grain and Fire Rebecca Sharpless, 2022-03-17 While a luscious layer cake may exemplify the towering glory of southern baking like everything about the American South baking is far more complicated than it seems Rebecca Sharpless here weaves a brilliant chronicle vast in perspective and entertaining in detail revealing how three global food traditions Indigenous American European and African collided with and merged in the economies cultures and foodways of the South to create what we know as the southern baking tradition Recognizing that sentiments around southern baking run deep Sharpless takes delight in deflating stereotypes as she delves into the surprising realities underlying the creation and consumption of baked goods People who controlled the food supply in the South used baking to reinforce their power and make social distinctions Who used white cornmeal and who used yellow who put sugar in their cornbread and who did not had traditional meanings for southerners as did the proportions of flour fat and liquid in biscuits By the twentieth century

however the popularity of convenience foods and mixes exploded in the region as it did nationwide Still while some regional distinctions have waned baking in the South continues to be a remarkable and remarkably tasty source of identity and entrepreneurship

Death Along the Natchez Trace Josh Foreman and Ryan Starrett, 2022 The Natchez Trace is the Path of Nations a 450 mile long game trail stamped into the earth by primeval bison Once the domain of the Natchez Choctaw Chickasaw Creek and Cherokee tribes the Trace nurtured these groups but it was also watered with the blood of tribesmen long before any white man trod on it European settlers eventually used the path to navigate between the backwoods Cumberland settlements and the cosmopolitan city of Natchez with Spanish gold clinking in the seams of their clothes and wads of tough jerky turning in their cheeks Today the Natchez Trace stands as one of the prettiest and most history soaked pathways in the United States Join authors Ryan Starrett and Josh Foreman as they look at the myriad ways people have lived and died along it

sweeping range of archival visual and material evidence *Wild Frenchmen and Frenchified Indians* examines perceptions of Indians in French colonial Louisiana and demonstrates that material culture especially dress was central to the elaboration of discourses about race At the heart of France s seventeenth century plans for colonizing New France was a formal policy Frenchification Intended to turn Indians into Catholic subjects of the king it also carried with it the belief that Indians could become French through religion language and culture This fluid and mutable conception of identity carried a risk while Indians had the potential to become French the French could themselves be transformed into Indians French officials had effectively admitted defeat of their policy by the time Louisiana became a province of New France in 1682 But it was here in Upper Louisiana that proponents of French Indian intermarriage finally claimed some success with Frenchification For supporters proof of the policy s success lay in the appearance and material possessions of Indian wives and daughters of Frenchmen Through a sophisticated interdisciplinary approach to the material sources *Wild Frenchmen and Frenchified Indians* offers a distinctive and original reading of the contours and chronology of racialization in early America While focused on Louisiana the methodological model offered in this innovative book shows that dress can take center stage in the investigation of colonial societies for the process of colonization was built on encounters mediated by appearance
