Beals, Ann Savours, Anita McConnell, Roy Bridges, 2017-05-15 This volume offers annotated texts with biographical and historical introductions of four previously unpublished travel journals from the period 1775 1874 The first of these is the journal of a participant in a Spanish expedition sent from Mexico to explore the north west coast of America From the outset difficulties plaqued the voyage Bodega's ship a small schooner named Sonora was not designed for open ocean voyaging A landing party was attacked and killed midway into the voyage the Sonora became separated from her flagship and later she was nearly capsized by a massive wave Bodega's journal records the voyage's travails hardships discoveries and eventual return Next comes the journal of Commander Stokes who served in command of HMS Beagle under Captain P P King during the survey of the Straits of Magellan in 1827 This is an account of a detached operation in very difficult weather conditions in the western part of the
