Emerson in His Own Time Ronald A. & Joel Bosco & Myerson, 2005-04 At his death Nathaniel Hawthorne 1804 1864 was universally acknowledged in America and England as the Great Romancer Novels such as *The Scarlet Letter* and *The House of the Seven Gables* and stories published in such collections as *Twice Told Tales* continue to capture the minds and imaginations of readers and critics to this day Harder to capture however were the character and personality of the man himself So few of the essays that appeared in the two years after his death offered new insights into his life art and reputation that Hawthorne seemed fated to premature obscurity or at least permanent misrepresentation This first collection of personal reminiscences by those who knew Hawthorne intimately or knew about him through reliable secondary sources rescues him from these confusions and provides the real human history behind the successful writer Remembrances from Elizabeth Peabody Sophia Hawthorne Oliver Wendell Holmes Ralph Waldo Emerson Bronson Alcott Rebecca Harding Davis and twenty others printed in *Hawthorne in His Own Time* follow him from his childhood in Salem through his years of initial literary obscurity his days in the Boston and Salem Custom Houses his service as U S Consul to Liverpool and Manchester and his life in the Anglo American communities at Rome and Florence to his late years as the Great Romancer In their enlightening introduction editors Ronald Bosco and Jillmarie Murphy assess the postmortem building of Hawthorne s reputation as well as his relationship to the prominent Transcendentalists spiritualists Swedenborgians and other personalities of his time By clarifying the sentimental associations between Hawthorne s writings and his actual personality and moving away from the critical review to the personal narrative these artful and perceptive reminiscences tell the private and public story of a remarkable life *The Lives of Margaret Fuller: A Biography* John Matteson, 2012-01-23

Psychologically rich Matteson s book restores the heroism of Fuller s life and work *The New Yorker* A brilliant writer and a fiery social critic Margaret Fuller 1810 1850 was perhaps the most famous American woman of her generation Outspoken and quick witted idealistic and adventurous she became the leading female figure in the transcendentalist movement wrote a celebrated column of literary and social commentary for Horace Greeley s newspaper and served as the first foreign correspondent for an American newspaper While living in Europe she fell in love with an Italian nobleman with whom she became pregnant out of wedlock In 1848 she joined the fight for Italian independence and the following year reported on the struggle while nursing the wounded within range of enemy cannons Amid all these strivings and achievements she authored the first great work of American feminism *Woman in the Nineteenth Century* Despite her brilliance however Fuller suffered from self doubt and was plagued by ill health John Matteson captures Fuller s longing to become ever better reflected by the changing lives she led *The Emerson Brothers* Ronald A. Bosco, Joel Myerson, 2006 *The Emerson Brothers* A Fraternal Biography in Letters is a narrative and epistolary biography drawn from the unpublished lifelong correspondence exchanged among four brothers Charles Chauncy Edward Bliss Ralph Waldo and William Emerson This is an extensive correspondence

for not counting Waldo's previously published letters there are 768 letters exchanged among the brothers and an additional 483 unpublished letters from the brothers to their aunt Mary Moody Emerson mother Ruth Haskins Emerson and Charles fiancée Elizabeth Hoar among others While lesser figures might have faltered under the burden of having been born an Emerson with social political and ecclesiastic roots extending back to the first century of New England settlement the brothers letters reveal that all were invigorated by a shared sense of origin and aspired to make a significant reputation for themselves Across six richly developed chapters the signal events and friendships that shaped the Emerson brothers lives are strung together to reveal a remarkable family culture For the first time *The Emerson Brothers* treats the illustrious history of the Emerson family in America as a foreshadowing of expectations the brothers inherited defines the extent of Waldo's debt to William for his encounter with German Biblical Criticism develops Charles and Edward's incredibly promising but ultimately tragic lives examines the profound emotional and intellectual impact of Aunt Mary on the younger Emersons considers the three year courtship between Charles and Elizabeth Hoar in the context of Waldo's own marriages and studies the brothers preoccupation with financial security for the family revealing too that finances were at least as powerful a motivation behind Waldo's 1832 resignation from Boston's Second Church as were the death of his first wife and his religious doubts This biography approaches Waldo's inner life in a way that makes him a figure to imagine personally by portraying him in relation to his brothers who are his intellectual equals It offers an imaginative social and cultural history of one of our oldest and most gifted families unique players in a period often considered to be the American Renaissance

thoughtfully researched movingly presented dual biography of two iconic American writers each trying to find the ideal friend with whom they could share their journey through our imperfect world Any biography that concentrates on either Henry David Thoreau or Ralph Waldo Emerson tends to diminish the other figure but in *Solid Seasons* both men remain central and equal Through several decades of writing friendship remained a primary theme for them both Collecting extracts from the letters and journals of both men as well as words written about them by their contemporaries Jeffrey S Cramer beautifully illustrates the full nature of their twenty five year dialogue Biographers like to point at the crisis in their friendship focusing particularly on Thoreau s disappointment in Emerson rarely on Emerson s own disappointment in Thoreau and leaving it there a friendship ruptured But the solid seasons remained as is evident when in 1878 Anne Burrows Gilchrist the English writer and friend of Whitman visited Emerson She wrote that his memory was failing as to recent names and topics but as is usual in such cases all the mental impressions that were made when he was in full vigour remain clear and strong As they chatted Emerson called to his wife Lidian in the next room What was the name of my best friend Henry Thoreau she answered Oh yes Emerson repeated Henry Thoreau **Masterpieces of American Romantic Literature**
