Bernstein, 2013-05-28 Hannah Arendt is increasingly recognised as one of the most original social and political thinkers of the twentieth century In this important book Richard Bernstein sets out to show that many of the most significant themes in Arendt s thinking have their origins in their confrontation with the Jewish Question By approaching her mature work from this perspective we can gain a richer and more subtle grasp of her main ideas Bernstein discusses some of the key experiences and events in Arendt s life story in order to show how they shaped her thinking He examines her distinction between the Jewish parvenu and the pariah and shows how the conscious pariah becomes a basis for understanding the independent thinker Arendt s deepest insights about politics emerged from her reflections on statelessness which were based on her own experiences as a stateless person By confronting the horrors of totalitarianism and the concentration camps Arendt developed her own distinctive understanding of authentic politics the politics required to express our humanity and which totalitarianism sought to destroy Finally Bernstein takes up Arendt s concern with the phenomenon of the banality of evil He follows her use of Eichmann in order to explore how the failure to think and to judge is the key for grasping this new phenomenon Hannah Arendt and the Jewish Question offers a new interpretation of Arendt and her work one which situates her in her historical context as an engaged Jewish intellectual

Bernstein, 1996 Hannah Arendt 1906 1975 was one of the most original and interesting political thinkers of the twentieth century In this new interpretation of her career philosopher Richard Bernstein situates Arendt historically as an engaged Jewish intellectual and explores the range of her thinking from the perspective of her continuing confrontation with the Jewish question Bernstein argues that many themes that emerged in the course of Arendt's attempts to understand specifically Jewish issues shaped her thinking about politics in general and the life of the mind By exploring pivotal events of her life story her arrest and subsequent emigration from Germany in 1933 her precarious existence in Paris as a stateless Jew working for Zionist organizations her internment at Gurs and her subsequent escape and finally her flight from Europe in 1941 he shows how personal experiences and her responses to them oriented her thinking The Jewish Writings Hannah Arendt, 2008-02-26 Although Hannah Arendt is not primarily known as a Jewish thinker she probably wrote more about Jewish issues than any other topic As a young adult in Germany she wrote about German Jewish history After moving to France in 1933 she helped Jewish youth immigrate to Palestine During her years in Paris her principle concern was the transformation of antinomianism from prejudice to policy which would culminate in the Nazi final solution After France fell Arendt escaped from an internment camp and made her way to America There she wrote articles calling for a Jewish army to fight the Nazis After the war she supported the creation of a Jewish homeland in a binational Arab Jewish state of Israel Arendt's original conception of political freedom cannot be fully grasped apart from her experience as a Jew In 1961 she attended Adolf Eichmann s trial in Jerusalem Her report Eichmann in Jerusalem provoked an

immense controversy which culminated in her virtual excommunication from the worldwide Jewish community Today that controversy is the subject of serious re evaluation especially among younger people in the United States Europe and Israel The publication of The Jewish Writings much of which has never appeared before traces Arendt's life and thought as a Jew It will put an end to any doubts about the centrality from beginning to end of Arendt's Jewish experience and the Negro Question Kathryn T.
