**Essays on Time-based Linguistic Analysis** Charles James Nice Bailey, 1996 The purpose of this volume is to make easily available a representative selection of Charles James N Bailey's views on linguistic theory Several previously published papers have been extensively revised and updated for the collection which also contains two new chapters The collection is flanked by a new Prologue and Epilogue and the whole is preceded by Peter M hlh usler's Introduction which offers a critical appraisal of Professor Bailey's contribution to the field In the Prologue the author discusses the rationale for a Developmentalist or time based framework for the scientific analysis of languages in the Epilogue he laborates a new approach to historical linguistics These initial and final chapters reflect the volume's twofold emphasis on time based analysis both in descriptive multi dialectal analyses of languages and in historical analysis For historical analysis Professor Bailey contrasts his approach with the current paradoxical practice of employing static models that exclude a time parameter an approach which he characterizes as synchronic idiolectal In doing so he offers explanations for matters which have not previously been accounted for in a satisfactory way why and when languages change the disruptive effects of language contact in triggering important kinds of change and the role of markedness in complex changes Concentrating on the sound system and syntax of English he presents a time based model with rules for generating highly complex multiphased phenomena which have been until now impervious to linguistic analysis *Dialectology as Dialectic* Jamin R.

Pelkey, 2011-04-29 Dialectology proper has traditionally focused on the geographic distribution of language variation as an end in itself and has remained relatively segregated from other branches of linguistic and extra linguistic inquiry Cross fertilizing winds have been blowing through the field for more than a decade but much work remains for adequate synthesis This book seeks to further the interdisciplinary integration of the field by highlighting and harnessing the many dialectic tensions inherent in language variation research and dialect definition Undertaking a broadscale experiment in applied dialectics the book demonstrates multiple grounds for insisting on a more robust integrational approach to dialectology while simultaneously demonstrating grounds for defining the Phula languages of China and Vietnam The Phula languages belong to the Burmic sub branch of the Tibeto Burman family and are primarily spoken in southeastern Yunnan Province China With origins as early as the ninth century these language varieties have been left undefined and largely unresearched for hundreds of years Based on extensive original fieldwork the book identifies 24 synchronic Phula languages descended from three distinct macro clades diachronically This is accomplished by blending typological descriptive historical comparative and socio cognitive perspectives Diagnostics include both qualitative and quantitative measurements and insights from history geography ethnology language contact sociolinguistics and more are called on for data interpretation This dialogic approach incorporates complexity by asserting that dialectology itself best flourishes as an interdependent dialectic a dynamic synthesis of competing perspectives Language Variety in the South Revisited Cynthia Bernstein, Thomas E.

Nunnally, Robin Sabino, 2014-01-22 Top linguists from diverse fields address language varieties in the South Language Variety in the South Revisited is a comprehensive collection of new research on southern United States English by foremost scholars of regional language variation Like its predecessor Language Variety in the South Perspectives in Black and White The University of Alabama Press 1986 this book includes current research into African American vernacular English but it greatly expands the scope of investigation and offers an extensive assessment of the field The volume encompasses studies of contact involving African and European languages analysis of discourse pragmatic lexical phonological and syntactic features and evaluations of methods of collecting and examining data The 38 essays not only offer a wealth of information about southern language varieties but also serve as models for regional linguistic investigation *Lexical Phonology and the History of English* April McMahon, 2000-04-13 This book has two main goals the re establishment of a rule based phonology as a viable alternative to current non derivational models and the rehabilitation of historical evidence as a focus of phonological theory Although Lexical Phonology includes several constraints such as the Derived Environment Condition and Structure Preservation intended to reduce abstractness previous versions have not typically exploited these fully The model of Lexical Phonology presented here imposes the Derived Environment Condition strictly introduces a new constraint on the shape of underlying representations excludes underspecification and suggests an integration of Lexical Phonology with Articulatory Phonology *Syntactic Reconstruction and Proto-Germanic* George Walkden, 2014 This book offers reconstructions of various syntactic properties of Proto Germanic including verb position in main clauses the syntax of the wh system and the non occurrence of null pronominal subjects and objects Although previous studies have looked at the lexical and phonological reconstruction of Proto Germanic little is currently known about the syntax of the language and it has even been argued that the reconstruction of syntax is impossible Dr Walkden uses extensive evidence from the early Germanic languages Old English Old High German Old Saxon Old Norse and Gothic to show that syntactic reconstruction is not only possible but also profitable He argues that while the reconstruction of syntax differs from lexical phonological reconstruction due to the so called correspondence problem this is not insurmountable In fact the approach taken in current Minimalist theories in which syntactic variation is attributed to the properties of lexical items opens the door for syntactic reconstruction as lexical reconstruction The book also discusses practical solutions for circumventing the correspondence problem in particular the use of both distributional properties of lexical items and the phonological forms of such items in order to establish cognacy The book will be of interest to historical linguists working on syntactic reconstruction and the Germanic languages from graduate level upwards as well as to advanced students of syntactic change more generally
