Wennemann, 2013-05-02 Posthuman Personhood takes up the ethical challenge posed by Francis Fukuyama s work Our Posthuman Future Daryl J Wennemann argues that the traditional concept of personhood may be fruitfully applied to the ethical challenge we face in a posthuman age He draws upon Wilfrid Sellars treatment of the concept of a person within the manifest image of man in the world Sellars proposed that we develop a stereoscopic view of reality that includes both a scientific understanding of the world and a meaningful place for persons living and acting in the world Following Mary Anne Warren Wennemann develops a distinction between two meanings of the term human a biological meaning and a moral meaning and maintains that all biologically human beings are persons But it is not necessarily the case that all persons must be biologically human After drawing on a contemporary version of Kant s distinction between a theoretical possibility and a real possibility the book posits that biologically non human persons like robots computers or aliens are a theoretical possibility but that we do not know if they are a real possibility Finally Wennemann describes an ethic of self limitation for the posthuman age

Self-Organization as a New Paradigm in Evolutionary Biology Anne Dambricourt Malassé,2022-07-04 The epistemological synthesis of the various theories of evolution since the first formulation in 1802 with the transmission of the inherited characters by J B Lamarck shows the need for an alternative synthesis to that of Princeton 1947 This new synthesis integrates the scientific models of self organization developed during the second half of the 20th century based on the laws of physics thermodynamics and mathematics with the emergent evolutionary problematics such as self organized memory This book shows how self organization is integrated in modern evolutionary biology It is divided in two parts The first part pays attention to the modern observations in paleontology and biology which include major theoreticians of the self organization d Arcy Thompson Henri Bergson Ren Thom Ilya Prigogine The second part presents different emergent evolutionary models including the sciences of complexity the non linear dynamical systems fractals attractors epigenesis systemics and mesology with different examples of the sciences of complexity and self organization as observed in the human lineage from both internal embryogenesis morphogenesis and external mesology viewpoints *Castoriadis's Ontology* Suzi Adams,2011 This book is the first systematic reconstruction of Castoriadis s philosophical trajectory It critically interprets the shifts in his ontology by reconsidering the ancient problematic of human institution nomos and nature physis on the one hand and the question of beingand creation on the other Unlike the order of physis the order of nomos has played no substantial role in the development of Western thought The first part of the book suggests that Castoriadis sought to remedy this by elucidating the social historical as the region of being that eludes the determinist imaginary of inherited philosophy This ontological turn was announced in his 1975 magnum opus *The Imaginary Institution of Society* With the aid of archival sources the second half of the book reconstructs a second ontological shift in Castoriadis s thought that occurred during the 1980s The author argues that Castoriadis extends his notion of ontological creationbeyond the human realm and into nature This move has implications for his overall ontology and
