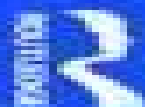

Facing the Other Sean Hand, 2014-04-04 Emmanuel Levinas is one of the key philosophers in the post Heideggerian field and an increasingly central presence in contemporary debates about identity and responsibility His work spans and encapsulates the major philosophical and ethical concerns of the twentieth century combining the insights of a basic phenomenological training with the demands of a Jewish culture and its basis in the endless exegesis of Talmudic reading His concerns and subjects are wide they include the Other the body infinity women Jewish Christian relations Zionism and the impulses and limits of philosophical language itself This collection explicates Levinas's major contribution to these debates namely the idea of the primacy of ethics over ontology or epistemology It investigates how in the wake of a post structuralist orthodoxy scholars and practitioners in such fields as literary theory cultural studies feminism and psychoanalysis are turning to Levinas's work to articulate a rediscovered concern with the ethical dimension of their discipline Stressing the largely assumed but unexplored Jewish dimension of Levinas's work this book is an important contribution to the field of Jewish studies and philosophy

**Levinas Faces Biblical Figures** Yael Lin, 2014-03-20 This collection of essays is an attempt to capture the drama of the encounter of the facing of Levinas and the biblical text It seeks to link Jewish experience and Levinasian themes such as responsibility substitution hospitality suffering and forgiveness and at the same time make the biblical text accessible in a new way The book offers new insights on the opening up of Levinas's thought and biblical stories to one another it considers the ways in which Levinas can open up the biblical text to questioning and how the biblical text can inform our reading of Levinas Setting up in dialogue the heteronomic texts the narrative texts of the bible and Levinas's philosophical texts allows an enforced and renewed understanding of both The examination of these issues is pursued from diverse perspectives and disciplines probing the role biblical figures play in Levinas's thought and the manner by which to approach them Do the biblical allusions serve in Levinas's thought merely as a rhetorical and literary device as illustrations of his ideas or perhaps they have a deeper philosophical meaning which contributes to his project in general Do the references to biblical figures work in Levinas's philosophy in a way that other literary figures are incapable of and how do these references comply with his conflicted attitude towards literature

**Incarnate Earth** Matthew Eaton, 2023-03-10 Incarnate Earth reimagines the doctrine of Incarnation by extending the unity between Creator and creation beyond Jesus to the entire world In dialogue with contemporary theologies of deep incarnation and the philosophy of Emmanuel Levinas the author argues that the face of Christ is encountered in the cruciform demand for justice embodied in the creaturely finitude and vulnerability that grounds ethics Central to this vision is a recognition that the religious role functions at the heart of Jesus life the revelation of God and the redemption of the world are performed throughout the physical world irreducible to humanity or one heroic representative of the species Thus the human encounters the divine Christ in and as the face of any vulnerable thing animal vegetal elemental or otherwise not as a transcendent being mediated through humanity The radical

nature of this reimagination necessitates renewed discussions of ecological and animal ethics calling for compassionate care for all vulnerable bodies insofar as this is possible It will be of interest to scholars of Christian theology and the philosophy of religion particularly those focused on ecotheology religious naturalism and environmental ethics
