**Epistemology** is the branch of philosophy that investigates the nature, scope, and limits of knowledge.

It examines questions related to belief, truth, justification, and the nature of knowing itself.

**Epistemological inquiries** explore how knowledge is acquired, evaluated, and structured. Central topics include the distinction between justified belief and opinion, the nature of evidence, and the criteria for true knowledge.

**Epistemology** delves into the foundations of knowledge, challenging assumptions about certainty and exploring the methods and processes by which individuals and societies come to understand and interpret the world around them.
