



*P*roblem. To describe a circle about a given equilateral and equiangular pentagon.

Let $ABCDE$ be the pentagon, and let O be the point of intersection of the diagonals AC and BD , and let AO be extended to F , and BO to G , and CO to H .



∴ $AO = BO = CO = DO = EO$ (B. I. pr. 4)



∴ $AO = BO = CO = DO = EO$ (B. I. pr. 4)



∴ $AO = BO = CO = DO = EO$ (B. I. pr. 4)

In like manner it may be proved that $BO = CO = DO = EO = AO$, and therefore $AO = BO = CO = DO = EO$.

Therefore if a circle be described from the point where these five lines meet, with any one of them as a radius, it will circumscribe the given pentagon.

*P*roblem. To describe an equilateral and equiangular hexagon in a given circle.



From any point in the circumference of the given circle describe a circle passing through its centre, and draw the diameters AB , CD , and EF ; draw AC , CE , EA , BD , DF , and FB , and the required hexagon is inscribed in the given circle.

Since AB passes through the centre

of the circle, AOB and BOC are equilateral

triangles, hence $\angle AOB = \angle BOC =$ one-third of two right

angles; (B. I. pr. 31) but $\angle AOB = \angle BOC =$ (B. I. pr. 17)

∴ $\angle AOB = \angle BOC = \angle COE =$ one-third of

(B. I. pr. 31) and the angles vertically opposite to each are all equal to one another (B. I. pr. 15), and thus we have equal arcs (B. I. pr. 26), which are subtended by equal chords (B. I. pr. 29); and since each of the angles of the hexagon is double of the angle of an equilateral triangle, it is also equilateral.
