**Visual Typologies from the Early Modern to the Contemporary** Tara Zanardi, Lynda Klich, 2018-07-04 *Visual Typologies from the Early Modern to the Contemporary* investigates the pictorial representation of types from the sixteenth to the twenty-first century Originating in longstanding visual traditions including street crier prints and costume albums these images share certain conventions as they seek to convey knowledge about different peoples The genre of the type became widespread in the early modern period developing into a global language of identity The chapters explore diverse pictorial representations of types customs and dress in numerous media including paintings prints postcards photographs and garments Together they reveal that the activation of typological strategies including seriality repetition appropriation and subversion has produced a universal and dynamic pictorial language Typological images highlight the tensions between the local and the international the specific and the communal and similarity and difference inherent in the construction of identity The first full-length study to treat these images as a broader genre *Visual Typologies* gives voice to a marginalized form of representation Together the chapters debunk the classification of such images as unmediated and authentic representations offering fresh methodological frameworks to consider their meanings locally and globally and establishing common ground about the operations of objects that sought to shape embody or challenge individual and collective identities

**1668** Peter Sahlin, 2017-11-09 When animals and their symbolic representations in the Royal Menagerie in art in medicine in philosophy helped transform the French state and culture Peter Sahlin's brilliant new book reveals the remarkable and understudied animal moment in and around 1668 in which authors including La Fontaine whose *Fables* appeared in that year anatomists painters sculptors and

especially the young Louis XIV turned their attention to nonhuman beings At the center of the Year of the Animal was the Royal Menagerie in the gardens of Versailles dominated by exotic and graceful birds In the unfolding of his original and sophisticated argument Sahlins shows how the animal bodies of the menagerie and others were critical to a dramatic rethinking of governance nature and the human The animals of 1668 helped to shift an entire worldview in France what Sahlins calls Renaissance humanimalism toward more modern expressions of classical naturalism and mechanism In the wake of 1668 came the debasement of animals and the strengthening of human animality including in Descartes's animal machine highly contested during the Year of the Animal At the same time Louis XIV and his intellectual servants used the animals of Versailles to develop and then to transform the symbolic language of French absolutism Louis XIV came to adopt a model of sovereignty after 1668 in which his absolute authority is represented in manifold ways with the bodies of animals and justified by the bestial nature of his human subjects 1668 explores and reproduces the king's animal collections in printed text weaving poetry and engraving all seen from a unique interdisciplinary perspective Sahlins brings the animals of 1668 together and to life as he observes them critically in their native habitats within the animal palace itself by Louis Le Vau the paintings and tapestries of Charles Le Brun the garden installations of Andr  Le N tre the literary work of Charles Perrault and the natural history of his brother Claude the poetry of Madeleine de Scud ry the philosophy of Ren  Descartes the engravings of Sbastien Leclerc the transfusion experiments of Jean Denis and others The author joins the nonhuman and human agents of 1668 panthers and painters swans and scientists weasels and weavers in a learned and sophisticated treatment that will engage scholars and students of early modern France and Europe and readers broadly interested in the subject of animals in human history French Drawings from the British Museum Perrin Stein, Martin Royalton-Kisch, 2005

Ranum, 2002 By the eighteenth century Paris was one of the great wonders of Europe renowned for its magnificent royal monuments and as a center for science literature and the arts More so than any other European city Paris reflected the spirit of an age an age that

reached its zenith with the reign of France's Sun King Louis XIV. No book better captures that spirit than Orest Ranum's *Paris in the Age of Absolutism*, first published in 1968 and now reissued in a revised and expanded edition. There were arches of triumph, hospitals, prisons, a new and gigantic wing on the Louvre, handsome stone bridges, streetlights, and massive stone quays along the Seine. Ranum ranges widely through the streets and quarters of Paris, attentive to the achievements of town planners, architects, and engineers as well as to city politics, social currents, and the spirit of religious reform. Behind it all lay the rule creating authoritarianism of the absolute state, which ironically unleashed Parisians' creative impulses in everything from literature, painting, and music to architecture, mathematics, and physics. *Paris in the Age of Absolutism* is one of those rare books that combines elegant prose with stunning erudition, making it both captivating for general readers and challenging to scholars. This new edition has been thoroughly revised and expanded to take into account the wealth of scholarship that has appeared since 1968.
