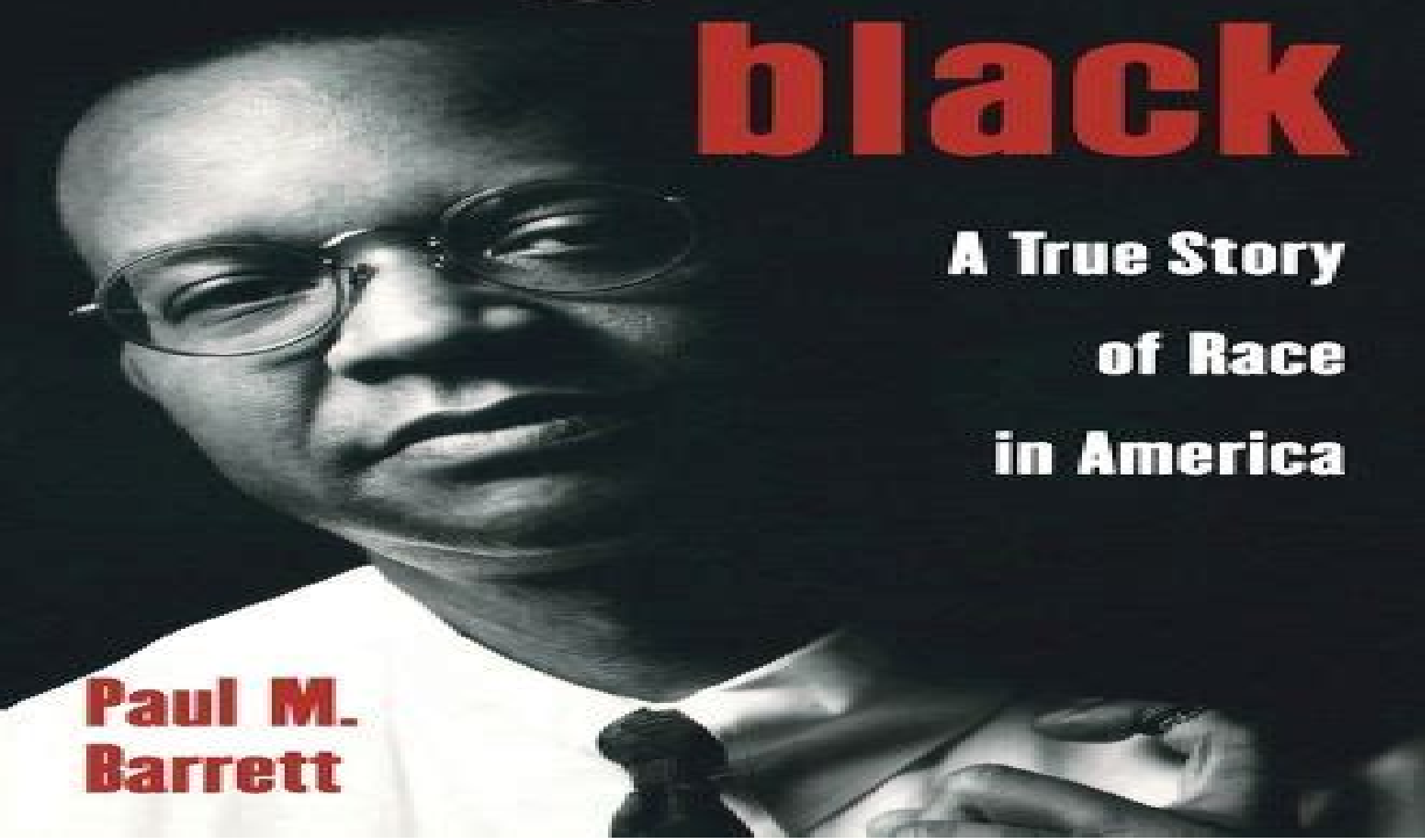

Canton,2010-05-11 Raymond Pace Alexander 1897 1974 was a prominent black attorney in Philadelphia and a distinguished member of the National Bar Association the oldest and largest association of African American lawyers and judges A contemporary of such nationally known black attorneys as Charles Hamilton Houston William Hastie and Thurgood Marshall Alexander litigated civil rights cases and became well known in Philadelphia Yet his legacy to the civil rights struggle has received little national recognition As a New Negro lawyer during the 1930s Alexander worked with left wing organizations to desegregate an all white elementary school in Berwin Pennsylvania After World War II he became an anti communist liberal and formed coalitions with like minded whites In the sixties Alexander criticized Black Power rhetoric but shared some philosophies with Black Power such as black political empowerment and studying black history By the late sixties he focused on economic justice by advocating a Marshall Plan for poor Americans and supporting affirmative action Alexander was a major contributor to the northern civil rights struggle and was committed to improving the status of black lawyers He was representative of a generation who created opportunities for African Americans but was later often ignored or castigated by younger leaders who did not support the tactics of the old guard s pioneers     **Dangerous Spaces** D. aptly selected canonical literature to inform the argument These references run from Hesse s *The Glass Bead Game* in the abstract to Joyce s *Ulysses* in the conclusion They include excerpts from and discussion about Bergman Borges Boswell Tolstoy de Beauvoir Chekhov Dostoevsky Samuel Johnson Aristotle Orwell Osler Chaucer Schweitzer Shakespeare Thorwalds Kafka and William Carlos Williams Such references are used not merely as an artistic and decorative leitmotif but become a critical narrative element and another complex and rich layer to this work The breadth and quality of the references are testimony to the author s clear understanding of the modern law and literature movement This work provides the basis of a medical school course As many medical educators as possible should also be encouraged to read this work for the insights it will give them into using their own personal life narratives and those of their patients to inform their decision making process This thesis will also be of value to the judiciary whose members are often called upon to make normatively difficult judgments about medical care and medical rules The human rights material leads to a hopeful view of an international movement toward a universal synthesis between medical ethics and human rights in all doctor patient relationships

*Downed by Friendly Fire* Signithia Fordham, 2016-11-22 Most Americans would never willingly revisit their high school experiences the nation s school systems reflect the broader society s hierarchical emphasis on race class and gender While schools purport to provide equal opportunities for all students this rarely happens in actuality particularly for girls In *Downed by Friendly Fire* Signithia Fordham unmask and examines female centered bullying in schools arguing that it is essential to unmask female aggression bullying and competition all of which directly relate to the structural violence embedded in the racialized and gendered social order For two and a half years Fordham conducted field research at Underground Railroad High School a suburban high school in upstate New York Through a series of composite student profiles she examines the girls relationships to academic achievement social competition and aggression toward one another Fordham argues that girls academically compete to lose which only perpetuates their subordination through the misrecognition of their own competitive behaviors She goes further to expand the meaning of violence to include what is seen as normal including suffering humiliation and social and economic abuse Using the concept symbolic violence Fordham theorizes the psychological and social damage suffered especially by black girls in schools The five narratives in *Downed by*

Friendly Fire ultimately highlight the pain and suffering this violence produces as well as the ways in which it promotes inequality exclusion and marginalization among girls
