Ed Ruscha / Now Then: a Retrospective Kiko Aebi, Christophe Cherix, Ana Torok, 2023-09-28 A sweeping cross media survey of Ruscha's six decade career from paintings and works on paper to photographs and artist's books with essays by leading scholars Spanning 65 years of Ed Ruscha's remarkable career and mirroring his own cross disciplinary approach Ed Ruscha Now Then features over 250 objects produced from 1958 to the present including paintings drawings prints films photographs artist's books and installations Published to accompany the most comprehensive presentation of the artist's work to date and his first solo exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art New York this richly illustrated catalog highlights Ruscha's most acclaimed works alongside lesser known aspects of his practice Essays by an interdisciplinary group of contributors examine Ruscha's work under a new light beyond the categories of Pop and Conceptual art with which he has traditionally been associated to present fresh perspectives on one of the most influential figures in postwar American art Taken together they underscore Ruscha's singular contributions including his material exploration of language experiments with unconventional mediums such as gunpowder chocolate or chewing tobacco and his groundbreaking self published books Supplemented by an illustrated chronology and exhibition history this publication captures the ceaseless reinvention that has defined his prolific six decade career Ed Ruscha born 1937 was raised in Oklahoma City and moved to Los Angeles in 1956 where he attended the Chouinard Art Institute now CalArts First showing with the Ferus Gallery in the early 1960s Ruscha was included in Walter Hopps landmark Pop art show New Painting of Common Objects at the Pasadena Art Museum in 1962 He has since shown his work extensively most recently in several medium specific museum surveys including the 2004 exhibition Cotton Puffs Q Tips R Smoke and Mirrors The Drawings of Ed Ruscha at the Whitney Museum of American Art New York which traveled to the Museum of Contemporary Art Los Angeles and the National Gallery of Art Washington DC and the 2009 exhibition Ed Ruscha Fifty Years of Painting at the Hayward Gallery London which traveled to the Haus der Kunst Munich and Moderna Museet Stockholm In 2005 he represented the United States at the 51st Venice Biennale Ruscha lives and works in Los Angeles

Ed Ruscha and the Great American West Karin Breuer, D.J. Waldie, Ed Ruscha, 2016-07-12 The renowned artist Ed Ruscha was born in Nebraska grew up in Oklahoma and has lived and worked in Southern California since the late 1950s Beginning in 1956 road trips across the American Southwest furnished a conceptual trove of themes and motifs that he mined throughout his career The everyday landscapes of the West especially as experienced from the automobile gas stations billboards building facades parking lots and long stretches of roadway are the primary motifs of his often deadpan and instantly recognizable paintings and works on paper as well as his influential artist books such as Twentysix Gasoline Stations and All the Buildings on the Sunset Strip His iconic word images declaring Adios Rodeo Wheels over Indian Trails and Honey I Twisted through More Damn Traffic to Get Here further underscore a contemporary Western sensibility Ruscha's interest in what the real West has become and Hollywood's version of it plays out

Krieger, 2011-03-08 Tomography is a method of exploring a phenomenon through a large number of examples or perspectives In medical tomography such as a CAT scan two dimensional slices or images of a three dimensional organ are used to envision the organ itself Urban tomography applies the same approach to the study of city life To appreciate different aspects of a community from infrastructure to work to worship urban planning expert Martin H Krieger scans the myriad sights and sounds of contemporary Los Angeles He examines these slices of life in *Urban Tomographies* The book begins by introducing tomographic methods and the principles behind them which are taken from phenomenological philosophy It draws from the examples of Lee Friedlander and Walker Evans as well as Denis Diderot Charles Marville and Eugène Atget who documented the many facets of Paris life in three crucial periods Rather than focus on singular extraordinary figures and events as do most documentarians Krieger looks instead at the typical presenting multiple specific images that call attention to people and activities usually rendered invisible by commonality He took tens of thousands of photographs of industrial sites markets electrical distributing stations and storefront churches throughout Los Angeles He also recorded the city's ambient sounds from the calls of a tamale vendor to the buzz of a workshop saw Krieger considers these samples from the urban sensorium in this innovative volume resulting in a thoughtful illumination of the interplay of people with and within the built environment With numerous maps and photographs as well as Krieger's unique insights *Urban Tomographies* provides an unusually representative and rounded view of the city
