Hull, 2013-11-21 The internship is the capstone experience of professional education and training preparatory for the application of psychology in health and human services. It is analogous for the practice of psychology to what the doctoral dissertation represents in the student's development as a scholar. At its best, the internship should be viewed as far more than simply a requirement for one's degree or licensure: a rite de passage for entry into the profession. Rather, it should be regarded by students and faculty alike as a rich opportunity for personal and professional growth, the opportunity to assess and even rethink one's assumptions about human behavior and psychological problems in the context of different client populations, types of problems addressed, and psychological service system environments. In articulating the first formal guidelines for the accreditation of graduate training programs in clinical psychology, a committee of the American Psychological Association comprised of distinguished psychologists of their day asked, "What are the aims of a psychological internship?" 1950s and early 1960s which had two major functional parts in addition to the executive component One was the problem solving core the procedural competence the other was the representation of the problem environment In the analogy the concepts knowledge and techniques of psychology constitute the core competence the health system in all its complexity is the problem environment A health psychologist is one whose basic competence in psychology is augmented by a working knowledge of some aspect of the health system Quite apparently there are functionally distinct aspects of health psychology to the degree that there are meaningful subdivisions in psychological competence and significantly different microenvironments within the health system I hesitate to refer to them as areas of specialization as the man who gave health psychology its formal definition Joseph Matarazzo has said that there are no specialties in psychology cited in the editors preface to this book
