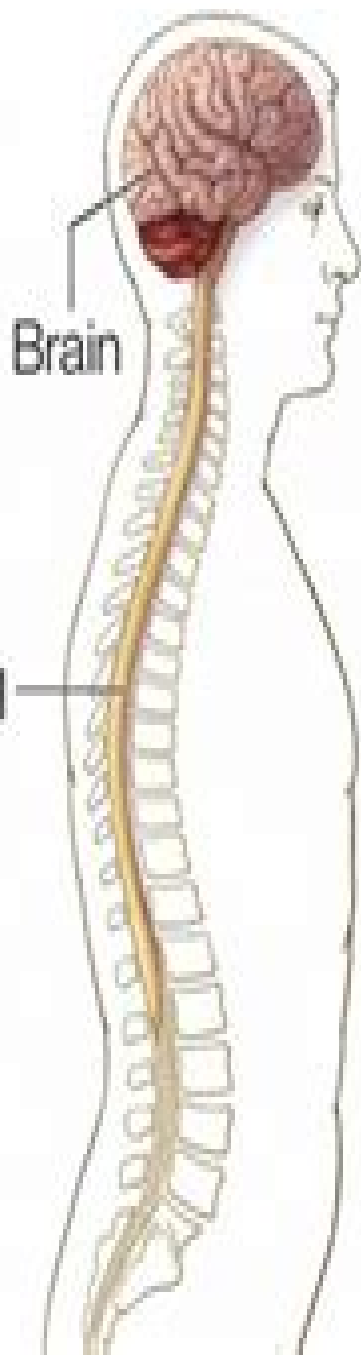

Portland, OR. *Guillain-Barre Syndrome* Silvia Iannello, 2005 The Guillain Barre syndrome GBS or Landry Guillain Barre Strohl syndrome, also known as post-infectious polyneuropathy or acute idiopathic polyneuritis, is an acute acquired frequently severe monophasic autoimmune illness of the peripheral nervous system. PNS GBS manifests itself with the clinical picture characterised by gait disturbance, pain, weakness, rapidly ascending symmetric flaccid muscle paralysis, areflexia with distal predominance involving lower motor neuron, sensory disturbance, variable autonomic involvement and increased cerebrospinal fluid protein without pleocytosis. Although GBS had previously been viewed as a unitary disorder with variations, it is today considered as a group of syndromes with several distinctive variants or subtypes. The aim of this book is to describe and discuss this disease that is not exactly rare but is almost the only inflammatory polyneuropathy and the most frequent cause of acute flaccid paralysis in general medical practice.

Hughes,2012-12-06 The period that followed World War II has witnessed a dramatic change in neurology From being a discipline in which its participants were castigated for being interested solely in diagnosis usually of disorders of unknown causation without effective therapy neurology has evolved into a highly active treatment orientated subject This transition is clearly reflected in the approach to diseases of the peripheral nervous system and to the Guillain Barre syndrome GBS in particular In a state of the art review made in 1952 Elkington 1952 observed that no less than 56% of neuropathies remained undiagnosed and amongst those of unknown causation he listed GBS With intensive investigation and follow up the proportion of neuropathies seen at tertiary referral centres which elude diagnosis is now as little as 13% McLeod et al 1984 Overall of course the proportion is even less This change is partly because of the introduction of new diagnostic techniques and partly because of the application of the great expansion in knowledge evident throughout medicine In this book Professor Richard Hughes has assembled current information on GBS and related disorders including chronic inflammatory demyelinating polyneuropathy CIDP the existence of which was not appreciated until Austin s perspicacious study published in 1958 In the Introduction Professor Hughes gives an account of the way in which recognition of the GBS emerged and matured and shows that it

followed *pari passu* with the realisation that paralysis and sensory loss may result from peripheral nerve disorders

Guillain Barre syndrome GBS is a rare autoimmune neurological disorder in which the body's own immune system attacks the peripheral nervous system leading to a wide range of symptoms GBS is most commonly caused by a varicella zoster virus VZV infection but it can also be caused by other viruses environmental toxins and even some types of surgery The most common symptom of GBS is a sudden onset of muscle weakness and tingling which can progress to paralysis However GBS can occur in any stage of development and it can affect people of any age Although GBS is usually benign it can be fatal if not treated quickly Early diagnosis and prompt treatment with antiviral medications is the key to success and there is currently no cure for GBS However by learning about the symptoms and signs of GBS and by being aware of the resources available to treat it anyone can help to prevent this disorder from causing serious harm
