minimum and I suppose that you can be thankful that we're doing ethics here rather than physics or anatomy. I define each technical term when I first use it and have also put together a glossary which appears at the end of the book. Each specialized term that appears in boldface has an entry there. You may be interested enough in what you read here that you'll want to continue your studies in moral philosophy. There is a natural place to begin the companion volume to this book, *The Ethical Life*, described later in this preface. I have also compiled a list of Suggestions for Further Reading for each chapter or pair of chapters. This list appears at the end of the book just before the glossary. I have selected the readings with an eye to what might be accessible and interesting to those just beginning their study of moral philosophy.
