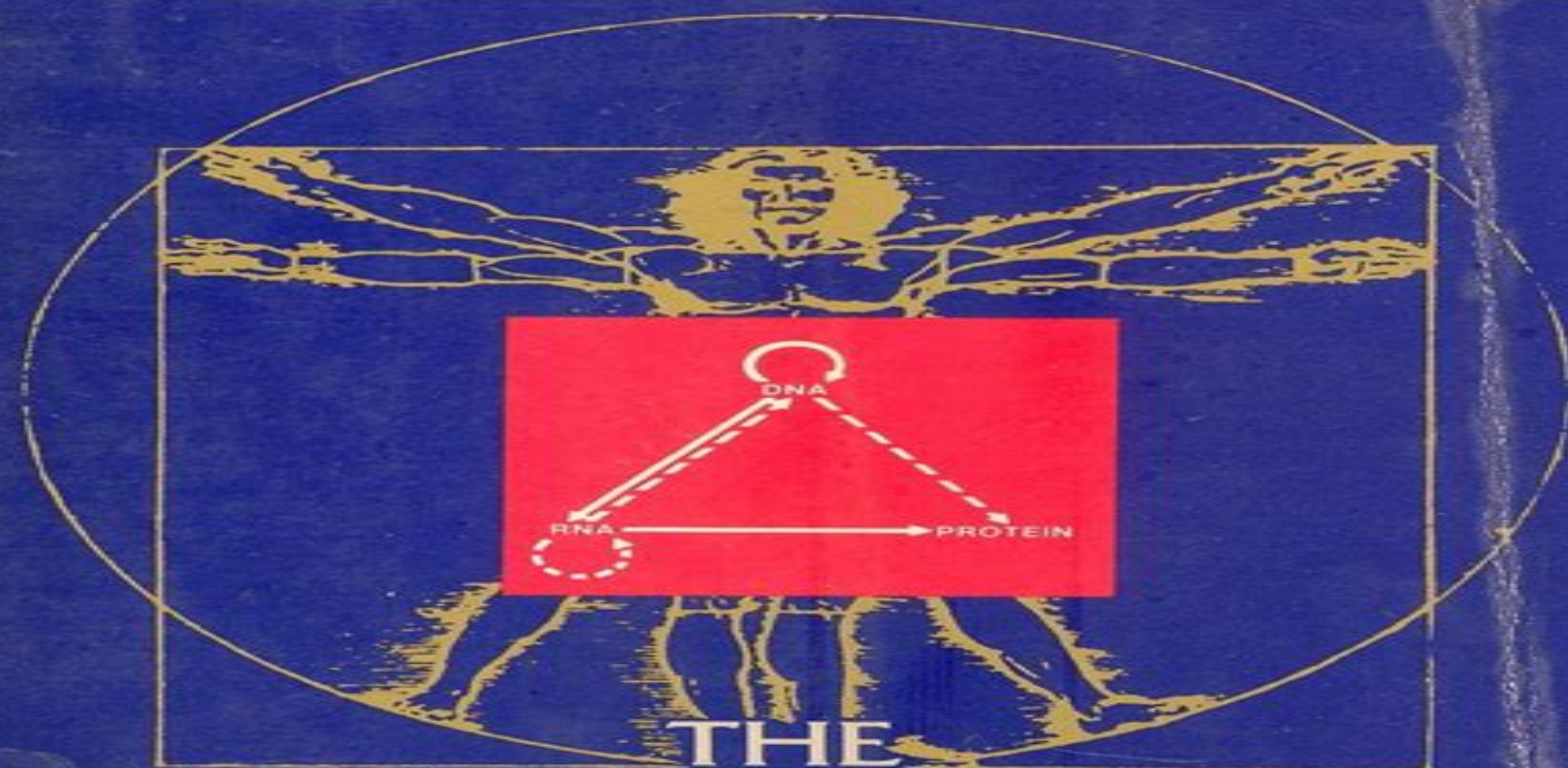

Bliese, 2022-04-19 Richard H Bliese draws on historic architecture of eight sided churches to call attention to an important but often overlooked emphasis on the eighth day of creation Early Christians were focused on God's new creation that began in Christ's resurrection on Sunday the first day of the week But these Christians understood resurrection as the continuation of God's creative and redemptive activity So the first day of the week became the eighth day of creation and therefore the day of resurrection work and time to join with Christ in transforming the world Christian disciples do this work by living out their baptismal vocations especially in their daily work and through their ethical economic choices The author turns to Martin Luther and the Reformation to outline an evangelical spirituality that invested in people and their vocations as worker priests Daily life work and family were underscored as the place where discipleship came alive Bliese describes this as an architectural design for faithful living He further draws on parts of Luther's Small Catechism Ten Commandments Apostles Creed and Lord's Prayer as keys to this evangelical design Five additional architectural designs for eighth day disciples are included The final chapter describes how eighth day disciples are called to live by faith in freedom and responsibility Making disciples today needs to revolve around a gospel story that links one's personal faith with one's work and economic life Such faith gives us ears to hear God's unfolding drama and eyes to see the needs of the neighbor The book includes a study guide for personal reflection and group conversation

The Catechism of the Catholic Church encourages parents to catechize their children. Parents' duty to educate their children is instinctive and inalienable. Parents have the first responsibility for educating their children. Parents' role in education is so important it is near impossible to offer an adequate substitute. By marriage, parents receive the responsibility of evangelizing their children. Parents educate their children to fulfill God's law. As first heralds, parents should initiate their children into the mysteries of the faith. Education in the faith by parents should begin in the child's earliest years. Family catechesis precedes other forms of religious instruction in the faith. But catechize on what and how. As a cradle Catholic, father, grandfather, layperson, and ardent student of our Faith, I offer a suggestion based on common sense and a book series. We're living through the greatest loss of faith in the history of the Catholic Church, a refrain reverberating thru Catholic America. Likely you are familiar with the statistics: 25% percent decline in Mass attendance, 15% of churches closed and/or consolidated, 65% of Catholics do not believe in the Real Presence. Catholicism, the largest Christian creed, followed closely by fallen-away Catholics. America's religious decline is not new. Experts claim Christianity has been on decline since the removal of prayer from public schools in 1962. Catholic school enrollment declined concurrently. Yet prayer was not removed from Catholic schools. Predictably, Mass attendance followed. What changed? Catholic authorities proffered explanations and recommendations, none of which stemmed the tide. A sure sign the root cause was not rightly identified. What changed was the equivalent of removing the pillar of prayer from public schools. Mass was removed from Catholic catechesis, school CCD, RCIA, adult formation, ambo, and domestic church. A cursory look at a Baltimore Catechism, the 1950-60s field manual for Catholics, reveals a 30-page segment. Catechism of the Mass immerses students in liturgical details. A cursory look at current Catholic curricula reveals a paucity of information on Mass, ranging from a few paragraphs in texts for schools and homeschool to take-home trifolds for CCD, RCIA, etc. Is Mass that important? Did you know Mass is the only sacrifice, perfect, pleasing, and acceptable to God. Is the most sacred function of the Church, surpassing all others in efficacy. Is the Church's greatest prayer. Is the Church's #1 effort to save souls. Is the same sacrifice Christ made on the Cross. Is the perfect answer to prayer as it brings mercy and salvation. Christ won for us. Is required attendance every Sunday and six Holy Days a year, but Communion only once. Is the Source and Summit of our Faith. Is Heaven on Earth. Seemingly, Mass is the answer to everything integral to Catholicism. Why is it not taught in Catholic education settings? How do we reverse the tide? Catholics must reassess school CCD, RCIA, adult formation, school and homeschool catechesis to make space for a deep dive into Mass. To fulfill the need, I submit a book series, *Catechism Curriculum for Catholic Homeschool*, which includes a 163-page text accompanied by a workbook with fifty-one lesson reviews containing 1,600 questions. The series is not a theological or academic treatise but a user-friendly step-by-step guide to Mass for homeschool catechesis, unlike anything available.

In *Creation and Contemplation*, Julien Decharneux explores the connections between the cosmology of the Qur'an and various cosmological traditions of Late Antiquity, with a focus on Syriac Christianity. The first part of the book studies how, in exhorting its audience to contemplate the world, the Qur'an carries on a tradition of natural contemplation that had developed throughout Late Antiquity in the Christian world. In this regard, the analysis



suggests particularly striking connections with the mystical and ascetic literature of the Church of the East which was in effervescence at the time of the emergence of Islam The second part argues that the Qur'anic cosmological discourse is built so as to serve the overarching theological message of the text namely God's absolute unity Despite the allusive and sometimes obscure way in which the Qur'an talks about the world's coming into being and its maintenance in existence the text betrays its authors acquaintance with cosmological debates of Late Antiquity In studying the Qur'an through the prism of Late Antiquity this book contributes to our understanding of the emergence of Islam and its relationship with other religious traditions of the time Winner of the 2022 Marie Antoinette Van Huele Prize and the 2023 Richard Kreglinger Prize both Faculty of Philosophy and Social Sciences Free University of Brussels

Many passages in the New Testament detail the value of baptism and indicate its status as one of the primary gifts God gives. At the same time, Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus indicates the benefits of baptism should already be evident. The early church understood this and saw that God had been preparing his people for the sacrament from the very beginning. This book goes back through the Old Testament to draw on the various themes God has presented to inform and instruct his people about the sacrament he would later institute.
