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In the Shadow of the Dictators Paul Corthorn,2006-08-23 Paul Corthorn presents an illuminating in depth study of the British Left s response to the rise of international fascism in the 1930s He uses a range of newly available archival sources to analyse how the Labour left which took the form of the Socialist League between 1932 and 1937 and the Independent Labour Party reacted to developments such as Mussolini s invasion of Abyssinia Franco s uprising in Spain and Hitler s drive for territorial expansion He argues that their responses to these threats from the fascist dictators were shaped above all by their constantly changing views of another dictatorship the Soviet Union under Stalin an elegant piece of innovative research on the Labour left between 1932 and 1939 based on an impressive amount of research and on a perceptive and sensitive handling of the evidence collected this elegantly written book fills a major gap in the existing literature Professor E F Biagini University of Cambridge

Chapman,2018-02-15 This book describes inductively Leonard Woolf s career as a writer From novels and political studies to shorter journalism and criticism his published work is enumerated here in detail His signed and unsigned articles as literary editor of *The Nation* and *The Athenaeum* London and editor of *The Political Quarterly* Oxford are featured as well as an indexed selected list of political books in his library *The Hammonds* Stewart Angas Weaver,1997 Here for the first time is the story of one of history s great scholarly and marital collaborations J L and Barbara Hammond were among the most innovative and influential historians of the twentieth century Between 1911 and 1934 they wrote eight books together that amount in effect to the first sustained social history of modern England Three of their books in particular *The Village Labourer* 1911 *The Town*

Labourer 1917 and The Skilled Labourer 1919 not only anticipated what came to be known as history from below but also permanently changed the way most people think about the Industrial Revolution which they defined in the apocalyptic terms to which we have become accustomed The Hammonds were also public figures prominently involved along with L T Hobhouse J A Hobson C P Scott and others in the definition and dissemination of the new liberalism From the point of involvement in the politics of one century they helped give enduring historical shape to another and thus exercise like their friends Sidney and Beatrice Webb a dual fascination Of the two Hammonds J L was the more prolific writing six books on his own and serving as a political journalist for virtually his entire professional life which saw him intervene editorially in every public crisis from the Boer War to the Second World War Ireland was after the Industrial Revolution arguably his greatest passion one to which he devoted much of his editorial life and his supreme literary effort Gladstone and the Irish Nation 1938 Barbara Hammond was an accomplished classicist the first woman to earn a First Class degree in Greats at Oxford She is shown here to have done much more work on the labourer books than has been previously recognized and to sustain through her letters an artful running commentary on the foibles of her age Through her especially the author evokes a radical but also doggedly Victorian sensibility that survived uneasily into the age of Bloomsbury and beyond The Hammonds were unique in the extent of their fused identity in the extent to which they became as G M Trevelyan once put it one flesh and one author The Hammonds is part dual biography part evocation of an age but it is also a study of marriage a marriage at a particular moment in history a marriage in the art and craft of history *Keynes in Action* Peter Clarke, 2022-11-24 Uses an accessible narrative frame to explore key issues like truth probability expediency pragmatism in Keynes's unique career The Criterion Jason Harding, 2002 In this detailed study of literary culture in the inter war period Jason Harding examines the standing of T S Eliot's journal the Criterion in relation to other literary periodicals and beyond that to the larger cultural networks of the time The Criterion may at first sight seem a well studied publication often dismissed as predictably conservative even proto Fascist However through his examination of insufficiently known archive material and interviews with living witnesses to the period Harding significantly alters our understanding of the journal and of Eliot's role as editor More than that by carefully resituating the journal in its relations of both competition and co operation with a range of other literary periodicals for the most part little studied themselves he shows himself an authoritative and discriminating guide to the often complex networks within which Eliot worked The Criterion Cultural Politics and Periodical Networks in Inter War Britain defends the journal against charges of Fascism and anti-Semitism it is an invaluable book for scholars of Eliot and an original and incisive exploration of difficult areas of literary cultural exchange **The Labour Party, Nationalism and Internationalism, 1939-1951** R. British Labour Seeks a Foreign Policy, 1900-1940 Henry Winkler, 2017-10-24. Since World War II, the British Labour Party has played a central role in dealing with complex international issues. Achieving real power in parliament for the first time, Labour governments have acted responsibly and are usually in accord with the views of a substantial majority of the British people. Such was not always the case. In *British Labour Seeks a Foreign Policy, 1900-1940*, Henry R. Winkler synthesizes twenty years' study of the subject to offer the first full-scale treatment of the Labour Party's evolution in foreign affairs. The Labour Party came into existence at the beginning of the twentieth century to deal with the domestic problems of the working class and it showed relatively little interest in foreign policy issues. In the aftermath of World War I, however, small groups of moderates made the case against the bitter rejection of the Versailles Treaty by many in the Labour Party and the trade union movement. Most of these argued that the League of Nations could be used to remedy some of the deficiencies of the settlement and that such a League must have the sanction of force if it was to be effective. During the 1930s, the failures of the League in the Far East, Abyssinia, Spain, and Central Europe compelled some of its advocates to conclude that, League or no League, the threat from Nazi Germany mandated support for a program of preparedness and rearmament even under the aegis of a hated National Government. The result by 1937 was the final formal abandonment of many of the radical illusions of the twenties and thirties as Labour reluctantly but formally assumed a posture that enabled it to share in the governance of wartime Britain and to take a key

role in dealing with the international issues that emerged in the aftermath of the Second World War This volume contains valuable lessons on the responsibilities of political parties as well as the pros and cons of specific policies It is essential reading for understanding Britain's later stands as its leaders tried to adjust to Britain's diminished power in the post World War II world

“Spain Mad”: British Engagement with the Spanish Civil War Tom Buchanan, 2024-06-15 Taking inspiration from a police informer's comment that his workmates had gone Spain mad in response to the Spanish Civil War this book uses biographical studies to explore the nature of British engagement with the conflict The opening chapter presents a general analysis of the subject and assesses the available evidence Some 2400 Britons volunteered to fight in the conflict and some 500 died there Accordingly the International Brigades are well represented in the book with chapters on two of the commanders of the British Battalion Wilfred Macartney and Fred Copeman and the Anglo Canadian volunteer Frank Whitfield Two of the other subjects George Orwell and Felicia Browne fought in other units However the book shows that engagement in the Civil War could take many forms hence the chapters on the journalist Philip Jordan clergyman E O Iredell and the humanitarian activist and politician G T Garratt The remaining chapters look at three historians and writers who have shaped the understanding of the Civil War in Britain Orwell Hugh Thomas and Jim Fyfe The book is based on extensive new research and many of these subjects have never previously been studied in any depth

East Wind Tom Buchanan, 2012-04-19 *East Wind* offers the first complete archive based account of the relationship between China and the British Left from the rise of modern Chinese nationalism to the death of Mao Tse tung Beginning with the Hands Off China movement of the mid 1920s Tom Buchanan charts the mobilisation of British opinion in defence of China against Japanese aggression 1931 1945 and the role of the British left in relations with the People's Republic of China after 1949 He shows how this relationship was placed under stress by the growing unpredictability of Communist China above all by the Sino Soviet dispute and the Cultural Revolution which meant that by the 1960s China was actively supported only by a dwindling group of enthusiasts The impact of the suppression of the student protests in Tiananmen Square June 1989 is addressed as an epilogue *East Wind* argues that the significance of the left's relationship with China has been unjustly overlooked There were many occasions such as the mid 1920s the late 1930s and the early 1950s when China demanded the full attention of the British left It also argues that there is nothing new in the current fascination with China's emergence as an economic power Throughout these decades the British left was aware of the immense unrealised potential of the Chinese economy and of how China's economic growth could transform the world In addition to analysing the role of the political parties and pressure groups of the left Buchanan sheds new light on the activities of many well known figures in support of China including intellectuals such as Bertrand Russell R H Tawney and Joseph Needham Many other interesting stories emerge concerning less well known figures which show the complexity of personal links between Britain and China during the twentieth century

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
