Postcolonial Gateways and Walls Daria Tunca,Janet Wilson,2016-11-07 Metaphors are ubiquitously used in the humanities to bring the tangibility of the concrete world to the elaboration of abstract thought Drawing on this cognitive function of metaphors this collection of essays focuses on the evocative figures of the gateway and the wall to reflect on the state of postcolonial studies Some chapters on such topics as maze making in Canada and the Berlin Wall in the writings of New Zealand authors foreground the modes of articulation between literal borders and emotional dis connections while others examine how artefacts ranging from personal letters to clothes may be conceptualized as metaphorical gateways and walls that lead or conversely regulate access to specific forms of cultural expression and knowledge Following this line of metaphorical thought postcolonial studies itself may be said to function as either barrier or pathway to further modes of

enquiry This much is suggested by two complementary sets of contributions on the one hand those that contend that the canonical centre periphery paradigm and the related writing back model have prevented scholars from recognizing the depth and magnitude of cross cultural influences between civilizations on the other those that argue that the scope of traditional postcolonial models may be fruitfully widened to include territories such as post imperial Turkey a geographical and cultural gateway between East and West that features in several of the essays included in this collection Ultimately all of the contributions testify to the fact that postcolonial studies is a field whose borders must be constantly redrawn and whose paradigms need to be continually reshaped and rebuilt to remain relevant in the contemporary world in other words the collection s varied approaches suggest that the discipline itself is permanently under construction Readers are therefore invited to perform a critical inspection of the postcolonial construction site

Apartheid Spies and the Revolutionary Underground Billy Keniston, 2024-11 On 28 June 1984 a parcel bomb sent by the apartheid security police exploded in an apartment building in Lubango Angola killing 36 year old Jeanette Schoon and her six year old daughter Katryn The Schoons were members of the revolutionary underground exiled from South Africa and committed to both the African National Congress and to socialism What many political activists had feared or suspected at the time was confirmed during the 1990s Truth and Reconciliation Commission the bomb targeting the Schoons was sent by Craig Williamson an apartheid spy and high ranking member of the South African security service

Apartheid Spies and the Revolutionary Underground is the first book length account of the assassination of Jeanette and Katryn Schoon Jeanette Curtis Schoon and Craig Williamson first met in 1973 on the Wits University campus Jeanette was a passionate student radical and part of a network of white radicals fighting apartheid Williamson had successfully infiltrated the student movement and rose within its ranks He held positions of trust first within the National Union of South African Students NUSAS and then after pretending to flee the country as an office bearer of the International Universities Exchange Fund in Sweden which helped fund many South Africans in exile The book uncovers how the lives of a group of white radicals intersected with and were impacted by the undercover security police and their operations both within and outside of South Africa Intensifying political oppression caused many young radicals to flee South Africa in 1976 many of them like Jeanette and her partner Marius Schoon joined the African National Congress in exile Williamson and the Schoons paths and those of their comrades continued to cross he was a guest in their homes a supplier of

funds for their projects a witness for the prosecution in political trials and ultimately the hand that directed targeted assassinations Williamson received amnesty for his role in the Schoons murder among other crimes For the friends and family of the Schoons and for all those seeking social justice this was an unacceptable outcome and Williamson continues to walk a free man This book attempts to show the limits of the TRC process to render healing from South Africa s apartheid past That justice has not been served to the Schoons remains a tragedy in this story of the struggle against apartheid

By looking at the South African situation through the lens of trauma they make clear how the psychic deformations and injuries left behind by racism and colonialism cannot be mended by material reparation or by simply reversing economic and political power structures. Western trauma theories as developed by scholars such as Caruth, van der Kolk, Herman and others are insufficient for analysing the more complex situation in a postcolony such as South Africa. This is because Western trauma concepts focus on the individual traumatized by a single identifiable event that causes PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder). What we need is an understanding of trauma that sees it not only as a result of an identifiable event but also as the consequence of an historical condition. In the case of South Africa that of colonialism and more specifically of apartheid. For most black and coloured South Africans the structural violence of apartheid's laws were the existential condition under which they had to exist. The living conditions in the townships, pass laws, relocation and racial segregation affected great parts of the South African population and were responsible for the collective traumatization of several generations. This trauma however is not an unclaimed and unclaimable experience. Postcolonial thinkers who have been reflecting on the experience of violence and trauma in a colonial context, writing from within a Fanonian tradition, have on the contrary believed in the importance of reclaiming the past and of transcending mechanisms of victimization and resentment so typical of traumatized consciousnesses. Narration and the novel have a decisive role to play here.
