Field Interferences in the Ecology of Marine Invertebrate Larvae Kirsten Muus,1990 **The Response of Marine Invertebrate Larvae to Physical and Biological Characteristics of the Water Column** Jessica A. Sameoto,2007

Aggregations of meroplankton at physical and biological discontinuities have been observed in the field however the role of larval behaviour in generating these patterns remains elusive This thesis examined the effects of salinity food patches larval density and flow on the vertical distribution of meroplanktonic larvae For bipinnaria of the sea star *Asterias rubens* 4 and 6 arm sea urchin larvae of *Strongylocentrotus droebachiensis* and veligers of the mussel *Mytilus edulis* the presence of a halocline had a pronounced effect on larval vertical distribution In the absence of a halocline larvae swam upwards and for echinoderm larvae most larvae aggregated near the surface of the water column When the salinity of the top water layer was reduced larvae aggregated at and below the halocline The aggregation response of larvae increased with the strength of the vertical salinity gradient and was not caused by larval buoyancy Rather salinity induced mortality likely influenced the behavioural changes seen in the halocline study as a strong relationship was observed between the proportion of larvae in the top water layer in the halocline treatments and the probability of larvae surviving in the salinity of that layer The shape of this relationship varied between *A. rubens* and *S. droebachiensis* indicating that the functional response of larvae to salinity is most likely species specific The presence of a food patch acted to further inhibit larval dispersal through the halocline by strengthening the aggregation response at the halocline Changes in the vertical distribution of 4 arm stage echinoplutei of *S. droebachiensis* were also examined at three flow velocities 0.048 and 1.02 cm s⁻¹ in an annular flume Under flow conditions the number of larvae observed in the mid to low water column increased with increased flow velocity These results suggest that flow negatively influences the ability of larvae to aggregate near the surface of the water column but that even weak swimming larvae such as *S. droebachiensis* are able to actively influence their vertical distribution in flows that exceed their swimming speed This study adds to our knowledge of the behavioural interaction of larvae with their environment and suggests that on small scales cm s to m s behaviour may play an important role in determining larval distribution To my knowledge this is the first study to explicitly relate larval behaviour with salinity induced stress and the first to test the effect of flow on larval vertical distribution in the water column
