

The methods introduced include robust estimation, testing, model selection, model check and diagnostics. They are developed for the following general classes of models: Linear regression, Generalized linear models, Linear mixed models, Marginal longitudinal data models, Cox survival analysis model. The methods are introduced both at a theoretical and applied level within the framework of each general class of models with a particular emphasis put on practical data analysis.
