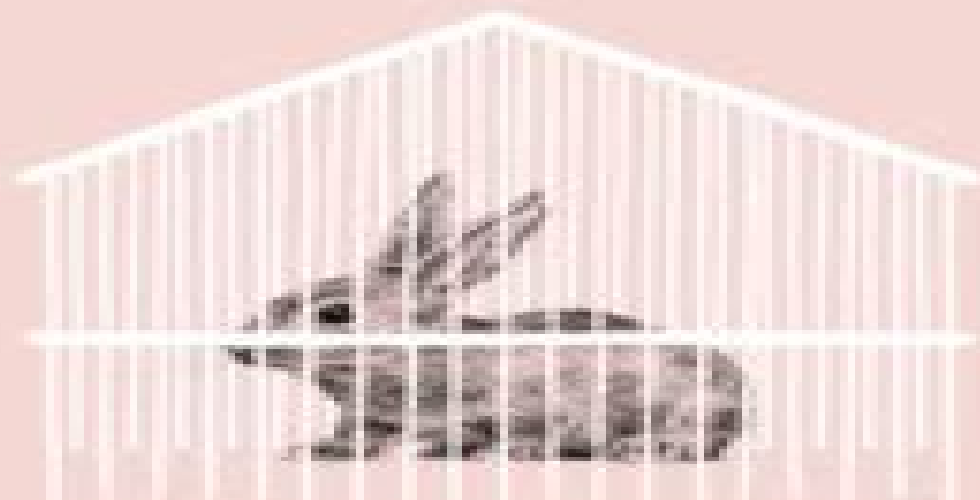

The first in depth study in English to analyze post utopian historical novels written during and in the wake of brutal Latin American dictatorships and authoritarian regimes During neoliberal reforms in the 1980s and 1990s murder repression and exile had reduced the number of intellectuals and Leftists and many succumbed to or were coopted by market forces and ideologies The opposition to the economic violence of neoliberal projects lacked a united front and feasible alternatives to the contemporary order no longer seemed to exist In this context some Latin American literary intellectuals penned post utopian historical novels as a means to reconstruct memory of significant moments in national history Through the distortion and superimposition of distinct genres within the narratives authors of post utopian historical novels incorporated literary cultural and political traditions to expose contemporary challenges that were rooted in unresolved past conflicts In *Anything but Novel* Jennie Irene Daniels closely examines four post utopian novels César Aira's *Ema la cautiva* Rubem Fonseca's *O Selvagem da pera* Jos Miguel Varas's *El correo de Bagdad* and Santiago Pérez's *Crónicas del Breve Reino* to make their contributions more accessible and to synthesize and highlight the literary and social interventions they make Although the countries the novels focus on Argentina Brazil Chile and Ecuador differ widely in politics regime changes historical precedents geography and demographics the development of a shared subgenre among the literary elite suggests a common experience and interpretation of contemporary events across Latin America These novels complement one another extending shared themes and critiques Daniels argues the novels demonstrate that alternatives exist to neoliberalism even in times when it appears there are none Another contribution of these novels is their repositioning of the Latin American literary intellectuals who have advocated for the marginalized in their societies Their work has opened new avenues and developed previous lines of research in feminist queer and ethnic studies and for nonwhite nonmale writers

The Polyphonic Machine Niall H.D. Geraghty, 2019-01-29 Focusing on the work of the Argentine authors César Aira Marcelo Cohen and Ricardo Piglia *The Polyphonic Machine* conducts a close analysis of the interrelations between capitalism and political violence in late twentieth century Argentina Taking a long historical view the book considers the most recent Argentine dictatorship of 1976-1983 together with its antecedents and its after effects exploring the transformations in power relations and conceptions of resistance which accompanied the political developments experienced throughout this period By tracing allusive fragments of Argentine political history and drawing on a range of literary and theoretical sources Geraghty proposes that Aira Cohen and Piglia propound a common analysis of Argentine politics during the twentieth century and construct a synergetic philosophical critique of capitalism and political violence The book thus constitutes a radical reappraisal of three of the most important authors in contemporary Argentine literature and contributes to the philosophical and historical understanding of the most recent Argentine military government and their systematic plan of state terrorism

Caught Between the Lines Carlos Riobó, 2019-04 Caught between the Lines examines how the figure of the captive and the notion of borders have been used in Argentine literature and painting to reflect competing notions of national identity from the nineteenth to the twenty first centuries Challenging the conventional approach to the nineteenth century trope of civilization versus barbarity which was intended to criticize the social and ethnic divisions within Argentina in order to create a homogenous society Carlos Riobó traces the various versions of colonial captivity legends He argues convincingly that the historical conditions of the colonial period created an ethnic hybridity a mestizo or culturally mixed identity that went against the state compulsion for a racially pure identity This mestizaje was signified not only in Argentina's literature but also in its art and Riobó thus analyzes colonial paintings as well as texts Caught between the Lines focuses on borders and mestizaje both biological and cultural as they relate to captives specifically how captives have been used to create a national image of Argentina that relies on a logic of separation to justify concepts of national purity and to deny transculturation

The Decline and Fall of the Lettered City Jean FRANCO, Jean Franco, 2009-06-30 The cultural Cold War in Latin America was waged as a war of values artistic freedom versus communitarianism Western values versus national cultures the autonomy of art versus a commitment to liberation struggles and at a time when the prestige of literature had never been higher The projects of the historic avant garde were revitalized by an anti capitalist ethos and envisaged as the opposite of the republican state The Decline and Fall of the Lettered City charts the conflicting universals of this period the clash between avant garde and political vanguard This was also a twilight of literature at the threshold of the great cultural revolution of the seventies and eighties a revolution to which the Cold War indirectly contributed In the eighties civil war and military rule together with the rapid development of mass culture and communication empires changed the political and cultural map A long awaited work by an eminent Latin Americanist widely read throughout the world this book will prove indispensable to anyone hoping to understand Latin

Changes, Conflicts and Ideologies in Contemporary Hispanic Culture Teresa Fernandez Ulloa,2014-06-02 This book is formed by various chapters studying the manner in which conflicts changes and ideologies appear in contemporary Hispanic discourses The contributions analyze a wide variety of topics related to the manner in which ideological and epistemological changes of the 19th 20th and 21st centuries are reflected in and shape Spanish language literature and other cultural expressions in both Spain and Latin America The 19th century was conducive to various movements of independence while in Europe radical changes of different types and in all contexts of life and knowledge occurred Language was certainly affected by these changes resulting in new terminology and discourse strategies Likewise new schools of thought such as idealism dialectic materialism nihilism and nationalism among others were established in addition to new literary movements such as romanticism evocative of r evolution individualism and realism inspired by the social effects of capitalism Scientific and technological advances continued throughout the 20th century when the women s liberation movement consolidated The notion of globalization also appears simultaneously to various crises despotism wars genocide social exclusion and unemployment Together these trends give rise to a vindicating discourse that reaches large audiences via television The classic rhetoric undergoes some changes given the explicit suasion and the absence of delusion provided by other means of communication The 21st century is defined by the flood of information and the overpowering presence of mass communication so much so that the technological impact is clear in all realms of life From the linguistic viewpoint the appearance of anglicisms and technicalities mirrors the impact of post modernity There is now a need to give coherence to a national discourse that both grasps the past and adapts itself to the new available resources with the purpose of conveying an effective and attractive message to a very large audience Discourse is swift since society does not seem to have time to think but instead seeks to maintain interest in a world filled with stimuli that in turn change constantly Emphasis has been switched to a search for historical images and moments that presumably explain present and future events It is also significant that all this restlessness is discussed and explained via new means such as the world wide web The change in communication habits e mail chats forums SMS and tools computers mobile phones that was initiated in the 20th century has had a net effect on the directness and swiftness of language

The Oxford Handbook of the Latin American Novel Juan E. De Castro,Ignacio Lòpez-Calvo,2023 The Latin American novel burst onto the international literary scene with the Boom era led by Julio Cort zar Gabriel Garc a M rquez Carlos Fuentes and Mario Vargas Llosa and has influenced writers throughout the world ever since Garc a M rquez and Vargas Llosa each received the Nobel Prize in literature and many of the best known contemporary novelists are inspired by the region s fiction

Affectual Erasure Cynthia Margarita Tompkins, 2018-08-23 Affectual Erasure examines how Argentine cinema has represented Indigenous peoples throughout a period spanning roughly a century Cynthia Margarita Tompkins interrelates her discussion of films with the ethnographic context of the Indigenous peoples represented and an analysis of the affective dimensions at play These emotions underscore the inherent violence of generic conventions as well as the continued political violence preventing Indigenous peoples from access to their ancestral lands and cultural mores Tompkins explores a broad range of movies beginning in the silent period and includes both feature films and documentaries underscored by archival and contemporary film stills She traces the initial erotic projection moving through melodrama to the conventions of the Western into the 1960s focus on decolonization superseded by allegorical renditions and the promise of self expression in late twentieth century documentaries Each section includes an introduction to the sociohistorical events of the period and their impact on film production Analyzed chronologically the films evidence different stages in the projection of the hegemonic Argentine imaginary which fails to envision the daily life of Indigenous peoples prior to conquest or in colonial times and remains in denial of their existence in the present

Indian Captivity in Spanish America Fernando Operé, 2008 Even before the arrival of Europeans to the Americas the practice of taking captives was widespread among Native Americans Indians took captives for many reasons to replace by adoption tribal members who had been lost in battle to use as barter for needed material goods to use as slaves or to use for reproductive purposes From the legendary story of John Smith's captivity in the Virginia Colony to the wildly successful narratives of New England colonists taken captive by local Indians the genre of the captivity narrative is well known among historians and students of early American literature Not so for Hispanic America Fernando Operé redresses this oversight offering the first comprehensive historical and literary account of Indian captivity in Spanish controlled territory from the sixteenth to the twentieth century Originally published in Spanish in 2001 as *Historias de la frontera El cautiverio en la América hispánica* this newly translated work reveals key insights into Native American culture in the New World's most remote regions From the happy captivity of the Spanish military captain Francisco Nuñez de Pineda y Bascuñán who in 1628 spent six congenial months with the Araucanian Indians on the Chilean frontier to the harrowing nineteenth century adventures of foreigners taken captive in the Argentine Pampas and Patagonia from the declaraciones of the many captives rescued in the Río de la Plata region of Argentina in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries to the riveting story of Helena Valero who spent twenty four years among the Yanomam in Venezuela during the mid twentieth

century Oper s vibrant history spans the entire gamut of Spain s far flung frontiers Eventually focusing on the role of captivity in Latin American literature Oper convincingly shows how the captivity genre evolved over time first to promote territorial expansion and deny intercultural connections during the colonial era and later to romanticize the frontier in the service of nationalism after independence This important book is thus multidisciplinary in its concept providing ethnographic historical and literary insights into the lives and customs of Native Americans and their captives in the New World
