Since the mid 1990s Taiwan's unique brand of Mandopop Mandarin Chinese language pop music has dictated the musical tastes of the mainland and the rest of Chinese speaking Asia Cries of Joy Songs of Sorrow explores Mandopop's surprisingly complex cultural implications in Taiwan and the PRC where it has established new gender roles created a vocabulary to express individualism and introduced transnational culture to a country that had closed its doors to the world for twenty years In his early chapters Marc L. Moskowitz provides the historical background necessary to understand the contemporary Mandopop scene beginning with the birth of Chinese popular music in the East Asian jazz Mecca of 1920s Shanghai A brief overview of alternative musical genres in the PRC such as Beijing rock and revolutionary opera is included The section concludes with a look at the manner in which Taiwan's musical ethos has influenced the mainland's music industry and how Mandopop has brought Western music and cultural values to the PRC This leads to a discussion of Taiwan pop's exceptional hybridity beginning with foreign influences during the colonial period under the Dutch and Japanese and continuing with the

country's political, cultural, and economic alliance with the U.S. Moskowitz addresses the resulting wealth of transnational musical influences from the rest of East Asia and the U.S. and Taiwan pop's appeal to audiences in both the PRC and Taiwan. In doing so, he explores how Mandopop's songs of sorrow with their ubiquitous themes of loneliness and isolation engage a range of emotional expression that resonates strongly in the PRC. Later chapters examine the construction of male and female identities in Mandopop and look at the widespread condemnation of the genre by critics. Drawing on analyses and data from earlier chapters, including interviews with dozens of performers, songwriters, and lay people in Taipei and Shanghai, Moskowitz attempts to answer the question: Why, if the music is as bad as some assert, is it so central to the lives of the largest population in the world? To answer, he highlights Mandopop's important contribution as a poetic lament that simultaneously embraces and protests modern life. *Cries of Joy: Songs of Sorrow* is a highly readable introduction to an important but understudied East Asian phenomenon. It will find a ready audience among scholars and students of Chinese and Taiwanese popular culture as well as musicologists studying transnational music flows and non-Western popular music.

This definition, at once whimsical and very nearly true, is incomplete. Many of its strongest threads have emerged because a person or a people have wanted to understand themselves, their history, and their identity.

RASA Marc Benamou, 2010-09-20. The complex notion of *rasa*, as understood by Javanese musicians, refers to a combination of various qualities including taste, feeling, affect, mood, sense, inner meaning, a faculty of knowing intuitively, and deep understanding. This leaves us with a number of questions: how is *rasa* expressed musically? Who or what has *rasa*, and what sorts of musical, psychological, perceptual, and sociological distinctions enter into this determination? How is the vocabulary of *rasa* structured, and what does this tell us about traditional Javanese music and aesthetics? In this first book on the subject, *Rasa* provides an entry into Javanese music as it is conceived by the people who know the tradition best: the musicians themselves. In one of the most thorough explorations of local aesthetics to date, author Marc Benamou argues that musical meaning is above all connotative; hence, not only learned but learnable. Following several years performing and researching Javanese music in the regional and national cultural center of Solo, Indonesia, Benamou untangles the many meanings of *rasa* as an aesthetic criterion in Javanese music, particularly in court and court-derived gamelan traditions. While acknowledging that certain universal psychological tendencies may inspire parallel interpretations of musical meaning, *Rasa* demonstrates just how culturally specific such accrued shared meanings can be.

The Force of Family Cara Krmpotich, 2014-04-30 Over the course of more than a decade the Haida Nation triumphantly returned home all known Haida ancestral remains from North American museums In the summer of 2010 they achieved what many thought was impossible the repatriation of ancestral remains from the Pitt Rivers Museum at the University of Oxford *The Force of Family* is an ethnography of those efforts to repatriate ancestral remains from museums around the world Focusing on objects made to honour the ancestors Cara Krmpotich explores how memory objects and kinship connect and form a cultural archive Since the mid 1990s Haidas have been making button blankets and bentwood boxes with clan crest designs hosting feasts for hundreds of people and composing and choreographing new songs and dances in the service of repatriation The book comes to understand how shared experiences of sewing weaving dancing cooking and feasting lead to the Haida notion of respect the creation of kinship and collective memory and the production of a cultural archive

Christianization and politico economic change A single Amis melody for example can exist in several guises that are contextually exclusive but functionally mutually supportive Thus a weeding song ladhiw which may have lost its traditional context of existence following advancements in farming technology becomes sustained within a larger ecosystem finding new life on the interacting platforms of Amis Catholic hymnody karaoke and tourist shows The latter genres collectively yinyue may not rely on traditional livelihoods for survival but thrive on a traditional melody s deeper associations to local memory and idealized Amis identities While these new and old genres are stylistically separate they feed into each other and back into themselves through transforming contexts and cross referenced memes in organic and developing cycles of song activity Drawing from fieldwork conducted from 2000 2010 as well as a background in ethnomusicology and journalism Ta
