Hands-on Science Education Benefits Megann McKendrick,2018 Science has been taught in many ways throughout history and the recent push has been to have students doing rather than memorizing Groups like the National Research Council and the STEM Education Coalition are trying to get the United States to move towards quality hands on science lessons The purpose of this study was to research how hands on science helps students learn retain knowledge and see science class and science careers positively 50 humans were split into 2 classes One class was taught using only hands on methods and the other class was taught using lecture and direct instruction Each class took a pretest and posttest 10 random students were interviewed from each class and a retention test was taken 3 weeks after the unit was taught The hands on class showed patterns of higher scores and more growth than the non hands on class I ve concluded that there are major benefits to teaching using hands on science higher test scores more growth better retention rates and positive attitudes about science This means that despite the extra time hands on activities take the deep thinking and discovery learning higher test scores and retention rates that come from hands on science is something that lecture teaching could never offer
