**Epistemic Contextualism** Peter Baumann, 2016-10-13 Peter Baumann develops and defends a distinctive version of epistemic contextualism the view that the truth conditions or the meaning of knowledge attributions of the form S knows that p can vary with the context of the attributor The first part of the book examines arguments for contextualism and develops Baumann's version The first chapter deals with the argument from cases and ordinary usage the following two chapters address theoretical arguments from reliability and from luck The second part of the book discusses the problems contextualism faces to which it must respond and provides an extension of contextualism beyond epistemology Chapter 4 discusses lottery scepticism and argues for a contextualist response Chapter 5 is dedicated to a homemade problem for contextualism a threat of inconsistency Baumann argues for a way out and for a version of contextualism that can underwrite this solution Chapter 6 proposes a contextualist account of responsibility The concept of knowledge is not the only one which allows for a contextualist analysis and it is important to explore structural analogies in other areas of philosophy The third part of the book is focused on some major objections to contextualism and alternative views namely subject sensitive invariantism contrastivism and relativism

**The Varieties of Pragmatism** Douglas McDermid, 2008-09-01 For much of the twentieth century many Anglo American philosophers supported three theses one about reality one about truth and one about human knowledge that taken together underwrote debates in epistemology The first was realism the commonsensical sounding view that the world of physical objects exists independently of human thought or language The second was the correspondence theory of truth according to which true statements or beliefs are those which accurately represent the way the world is The third was foundationalism the view that our knowledge of the world like an edifice must rest on firm foundations i.e. on beliefs whose justification does not depend on any other beliefs In the last two decades however a radical anti epistemology movement led by the influential American philosopher Richard Rorty has put partisans of all three theses on the defensive Moreover Rorty has repeatedly claimed that his opposition to the shibboleths of traditional epistemology draws inspiration from the grand tradition of Pragmatism especially from William James and John Dewey In this important new book Douglas McDermid argues persuasively for two key claims first that the so called Neo Pragmatist critique of traditional epistemology is thoroughly unconvincing second that Rorty is guilty of taking the name of Pragmatism in vain since there are crucial and far reaching differences between Neo Pragmatism and the Classical Pragmatism of James and Dewey The Varieties of Pragmatism will take its place in the forefront of the literature on this most vital part of the American philosophical legacy

Meinertsen, 2019-04-06 This book addresses the metaphysics of Armstrongian states of affairs i.e. instantiations of naturalist universals by particulars The author argues that states of affairs are the best candidate for truthmakers and in the spirit of logical atomism that we need no molecular truthmakers for positive truths In the book's context this has the pleasing result that there are no molecular states of affairs Following this account of truthmaking the author first shows that the particulars in first order states of affairs are bare particulars He then argues that the properties in states of affairs are simple non relational and concrete universals Next he argues that material relations in states of affairs are external relations Lastly he argues that a state of affairs is unified by a distinctive formal relation without giving rise to Bradley's regress Written in a relatively non technical style the book offers a valuable resource for philosophers working on analytic metaphysics and ontology as well as their graduate students
