Ulmer, 2019-12-01 Originally published in 1984 In *Applied Grammarology* Gregory Ulmer provides an extraordinary introduction to the third applied phase of grammarology the science of writing outlined by Jacques Derrida in *Of Grammarology* Ulmer looks to the later experimental works of Derrida beginning with *Glas* and continuing through *Truth in Painting* and *The Post Card* In these he discovers a critical methodology radically different from the deconstruction for which Derrida is known At the same time he finds the source of a new pedagogy for all the humanities one based on grammarology and appropriate to the era of audiovisual communications in which we live Detractors of Derrida often accuse him of superficial wordplay and of using images and puns as nonfunctional subversions of academic conventions Ulmer argues that there is in fact a fully developed use of homonyms in Derrida's style which produces its own distinctive knowledge and insight Derrida's experiments with images moreover his expansion of descriptions of everyday objects such as umbrellas matchboxes and post cards into cognitive models serve to reveal a simplicity underlying intellectual discourse which could be used to eliminate the gap separating the general public from specialists in cultural studies Comparing the stylistic innovations of Derrida with Jacques Lacan's use of puns and diagrams with the German performance artist Joseph Beuys's demonstration of models and with the montage writing of the films of Sergei Eisenstein Ulmer explores the possibility of deriving a postmodernist pedagogy from Derrida's texts The first study to suggest the full potential of the program available in Derrida's writings *Applied Grammarology* is also the first outline of a Derridean alternative to deconstructionism With its shift away from Derrida's philosophical studies to his experimental texts Ulmer's book aims to inaugurate a new movement in the American adaptation of contemporary French theory **The Sphinx in the City** Elizabeth Wilson, 1992-03-10 Adopting the guise of a flaneur Wilson reconsiders the classical imagery of the city from the viewpoints of diverse groups of women bourgeois wives prostitutes transvestite writers and others Its originality resides in its deft consistently provocative interweaving of underground feminist discourses with the familiar male infected rhetorics of urban experience Mike Davis author of *City of Quartz* Penelope Voyages Karen R. Lawrence asks an intriguing question What happens when instead of waiting patiently for Odysseus Penelope voyages and records her journey when the woman who is expected to wait sets forth herself and traces an itinerary of her own Lawrence ranges widely discussing both fiction and nonfiction and traversing the genres of travel letters realistic and sentimental novels ethnography fantasy and postmodern narrative In examining works as dissimilar as Margaret Cavendish's rendition of the Renaissance adventure narrative and Christine Brooke-Rose's postmodernist *Between* she explores not only the significance of gender for travel writing but also the value of travel itself for testing the limits of women's social freedoms and restraints Lawrence shows how writings by Frances Burney Mary

Wollstonecraft Sarah Lee Mary Kingsley Virginia Woolf and Brigid Brophy reconceive the meanings of femininity in relation to such apparent oppositions as travel home other self and foreign domestic Despite the differences historical generic political among these writers Lawrence maintains they share common insights Their accounts overturn the dichotomy between adventure and domesticity demonstrating something illusory within both the stability of home and the freedom of travel

Marxism and Deconstruction Michael Ryan, 2019-12-01 Originally published in 1982 Aside from Jacques Derrida's own references to the possible articulation between deconstruction and Marxism the relationship between the two has remained largely unexplored In *Marxism and Deconstruction* Michael Ryan examines that multifaceted relationship but not through a mere comparison of two distinct and inviolable entities Instead he looks at both with an eye to identifying their common elements and reweaving them into a new theory of political practice To accomplish his task Ryan undertakes a detailed comparison of deconstruction and Marxism relating deconstruction to the dialectical tradition in philosophy and demonstrating how deconstruction can be used in the critique of ideology He is a forceful critic of both the politics of deconstruction and the metaphysical aspect of Marxism as seen from a deconstructionist perspective Besides offering the first book length study of Derrida in this context Ryan makes the first methodic attempt by an American scholar to apply deconstruction to domains beyond literature He proposes a deconstructive Marxism one lacking the metaphysical underpinnings of conservative scientific Marxist theory and employing deconstructive analysis both for Marxist political criticism and to further current anti metaphysical developments within Marxism *Marxism and Deconstruction* is an innovative and controversial contribution to the fields of literary criticism philosophy and political science

Why Are Our Pictures Puzzles? historiographical style of great complexity deploying brilliant reconfigurations of the dominant themes styles ideologies and tropes that characterize acceptable modes of history writing in the West Moving from the late nineteenth century to the present Schwarz identifies six distinct modes of translation and transformation produced by these writers ranging from liberal nationalist text to those of writers associated with the Subaltern Studies project He analyzes the narrative modes employed during the period and traces the movement toward the metaphoric and ironic styles of the post Independence era Writing Cultural History in Colonial and Postcolonial India provides a needed counterweight to the emphasis on colonial discourse that has come to dominate recent postcolonial scholarship By examining how the colonized interpreted and transformed the experience of oppression through their own work this book represents postcolonial studies written from the other side
