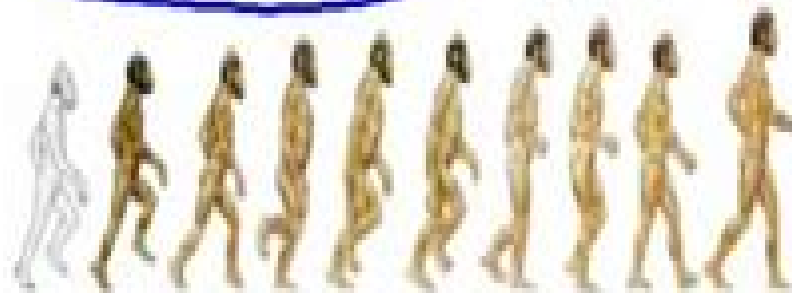

The Origin and Diversification of Language Morris Swadesh, Joel F. Sherzer, Dell Hymes, 1971 Morris Swadesh one of this century's foremost scientific investigators of language dedicated much of his life to the study of the origin and evolution of language This volume left nearly completed at his death and edited posthumously by Joel F Sherzer is his last major study of this difficult subject Swadesh discusses the simple qualities of human speech also present in animal language and establishes distinctively human techniques of expression by comparing the common features that are found in modern and ancient
