Fashioning Identities in Renaissance Art Mary Rogers, 2019-06-04 Originally published in 2000 *Fashioning Identities* analyses some of the different ways in which identities were fashioned in and with art during the Renaissance taken as meaning the period c 1300 1600 The notion of such a search for new identities expressed in a variety of new themes styles and genres has been all pervasive in the historical and critical literature dealing with the period starting with Burckhardt and it has been given a new impetus by contemporary scholarship using a variety of methodological approaches The identities involved are those of patrons for whom artistic patronage was a means of consolidating power projecting ideologies acquiring social prestige or building a suitable public persona and artists who developed a distinctive manner to fashion their artistic identity or drew attention to aspects of their artistic personality either in self portraiture or the style and placing of their signature or by exploiting a variety of literary forms

Pietro Aretino: Subverting the System in Renaissance Italy Raymond B. Waddington, 2024-10-28 The essays gathered together in this volume follow the career of the sixteenth century courtier poet Pietro Aretino Part One introduces the author during the 1520s in Rome with his remarkable first comedy *La Cortigiana* With Aretino's move to Venice 1527 he found a congenial life long home in which he could flourish Yet the transition from courtier poet to poligrafo vernacular writer for the popular press was slow and difficult before he adopted a new career model derived from Erasmus even then he contemplated abandoning Italy for the Ottoman Empire Part Two examines his work as a satirist in the mid thirties with the *Ragionamenti* the dialogues that branded him a pornographer when the satiric targets lost their immediacy He augmented the satiric writings by creating the visual persona of a satirist in various media woodcut author portraits in books engravings and particularly portrait medals The complementary verbal visual relationship is the subject of this pairing Aretino's religious writings have not been taken seriously until quite recently The two essays presented here trace Aretino's associations with Erasmians spirituali heretics and apostates arguing that his own convictions were sincere suggesting that he became a Nicodemite during the gathering Counter Reformation repression of the 1540s The concluding essays consider two examples of Aretino's continuing influence in different media visual arts and literature on the brilliant eccentric artist Giuseppe Arcimboldo and on a great English comedy Ben Jonson's *Volpone*

The Cultural World of Eleonora di Toledo Konrad Eisenbichler, 2017-07-05 Eleonora di Toledo was a powerful and influential woman who over the course of nearly a quarter century 1539 62 contributed profoundly to the cultural flowering of ducal Florence Her patronage of some of the leading artists of the time her support of newly arrived Jesuit preachers her involvement in charitable activities her unflinching devotion to her husband and his policies not to mention her successful farming and business ventures are only some of the areas where her influence was unambiguously exercised and felt She also provided the House of Medici with a full stable of children to re invigorate the failing family line ensure male succession even in the face of unexpected calamities and provide enough females to establish marriage connections with a variety of

noble and ruling houses in Italy In spite of all these contributions Eleonora has attracted little attention from scholars This apparent disinterest may be a factor of Eleonora s personal style or of the bad press that as a Spanish noblewoman she quickly received from her Florentine subjects or of modern antipathy for some of the basic characteristics of ducal Florence An examination of her impact on Tuscany is long overdue In fact a fuller more nuanced understanding of the duchess can shed a more profound light not only on her as a person or on her impact on Tuscan culture in the sixteenth century but also on the contribution of female consorts to the vitality of a successful early modern state The essays collected here bring together a variety of scholars working in various disciplines While many of the articles take their cue from art history a natural reflection of the innovative research recent art historians have carried out on the duchess they also reach out towards other disciplines political history literature spectacle and religion to mention just a few In so doing they expand our understanding of Eleonora s place in her society and reveal a very complex

Magdalene in Northern Art, 1430-1550 Penny Howell Jolly, 2016-12-05 Examining innovations in Mary Magdalene imagery in northern art 1430 to 1550 Penny Jolly explores how the saint's widespread popularity drew upon her ability to embody oppositions and embrace a range of paradoxical roles sinner prostitute and saint erotic seductress and holy prophet. Analyzing paintings by Rogier van der Weyden Quentin Massys and others Jolly investigates artists and audiences' responses to increasing religious tensions expanding art markets and changing roles for women. Using cultural ideas concerning the gendered and pregnant body Jolly reveals how dress confirms the Magdalene's multivalent nature. In some paintings her gown's opening laces betray her wantonness yet simultaneously mark her as Christ's spiritually pregnant Bride elsewhere undress reconfirms her erotic nature while paradoxically marking her penitence. In still other works exotic finery expresses her sanctity while celebrating Antwerp's textile industry. New image types arise as when the saint appears as a lovesick musician playing a lute or as a melancholic contemplative longing for Christ. Some depictions emphasize her intercessory role through innovative pictorial strategies that invite performative viewing or relate her to the mythological Pandora and Italian

Renaissance Neoplatonism Throughout the Magdalene's ambiguities destabilize readings of her imagery while engaging audiences across a broad social and religious spectrum The Translation of Raphael's Roman Style Henk Th. van Veen, 2007 The papers show that the response to the new style was without exception a very conscious one In Siena and Venice it was simply rejected whereas in Pesaro Mantua Rome and Fontainebleau it was transformed or attempts were made even to surpass it In other cases Florence in particular the answer to the new Raphaellesque style was found by proposing a conspicuously Michelangelesque one instead BOOK JACKET

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
