### **Ballet and Opera in the Age of Giselle** Marian

Smith,2010-08-09 Marian Smith recaptures a rich period in French musical theater when ballet and opera were intimately connected Focusing on the age of Giselle at the Paris Op ra from the 1830s through the 1840s Smith offers an unprecedented look at the structural and thematic relationship between the two genres She argues that a deeper understanding of both ballet and opera and of nineteenth century theater going culture in general may be gained by examining them within the same framework instead of following the usual practice of telling their histories separately This handsomely illustrated book ultimately provides a new portrait of the Op ra during a period long celebrated for its box office successes in both genres Smith begins by showing how gestures were encoded in the musical language that composers used in ballet and in opera She moves on to a wide range of topics including the relationship between the gestures of the singers and the movements of the dancers and the distinction between dance that represents dancing entertainment staged within the story of the opera and dance that represents action Smith maintains that ballet pantomime and opera continued to rely on each other well into the nineteenth century even as they thrived independently The divorce between the two arts occurred little by little and may be traced through unlikely sources controversies in the press about the changing nature of ballet pantomime music shifting ideas about originality complaints about the ridiculousness of pantomime and a little known rehearsal score for Giselle

most felt California the American Southwest Texas and Florida there were also early quite serious flare ups of the craze in Chicago New York and New England Kagan revisits early interest in Hispanism among elites such as the Boston book dealer Obadiah Rich a specialist in the early history of the Americas and the writers Washington Irving and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow He also considers later enthusiasts such as Angeleno Charles Lummis and the many writers artists and architects of the modern Spanish Colonial Revival in the United States in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries Spain s political and cultural elites understood that the promotion of Spanish culture in the United States and the Western Hemisphere in general would help overcome imperial defeats while uniting Spaniards and those of Spanish descent into a singular raza whose shared characteristics and interests transcended national boundaries With elegant prose and verve *The Spanish Craze* spans centuries and provides a captivating glimpse into distinct facets of Hispanism in monuments buildings and private homes the visual performing and cinematic arts and the literature travel journals and letters of its enthusiasts in the United States
