Hezel (s.j.), 1983 Kwajalein Atoll, the Marshall Islands and American Policy in the Pacific Ruth Douglas Currie, 2016-10-27 For centuries the Marshall Islands have been drawn into international politics primarily because of their central location in Oceania After World War II they came into the American sphere as part of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands At the outset of the Cold War the Marshalls were a site for nuclear tests and later for the U S Army s ballistic missile testing as part of President Reagan s Strategic Defense Initiative This book focuses on the islanders tenacious negotiations for independence and control of their land accomplished as the Republic of the Marshall Islands in a Compact of Free Association with the U S The creation of American policy in the Pacific was a struggle between the U S departments of the Interior and State and the military s goals for strategic national defense as illustrated by the case of the Army s base at Kwajalein Atoll

The Federated States of Micronesia's Engagement with the Outside World Gonzaga Puas, 2021-09-28 This study addresses the neglected history of the people of the Federated States of Micronesia s FSM engagement with the outside world Situated in the northwest Pacific FSM s strategic location has led to four colonial rulers Histories of FSM to date have been largely written by sympathetic outsiders Indigenous perspectives of FSM history have been largely absent from the main corpus of historical literature A new generation of Micronesian scholars are starting to write their own history from Micronesian perspectives and using Micronesian forms of history This book argues that Micronesians have been dealing successfully with the outside world throughout the colonial era in ways colonial authorities were often unaware of This argument is sustained by examination of oral histories secondary sources interviews field research and the personal experience of a person raised in the Mortlock Islands of Chuuk State It reconstructs how Micronesian internal processes for social stability and mutual support endured rather than succumbing to the different waves of colonisation This study argues that colonisation did not destroy Micronesian cultures and identities but that Micronesians recontextualised the changing conditions to suit their own circumstances Their success rested on the indigenous doctrines of adaptation assimilation and accommodation deeply rooted in the kinship doctrine of eaea fengen sharing and alilis fengen assisting each other These values pervade the Constitution of the FSM which formally defines the modern identity of its indigenous peoples reasserting and perpetuating Micronesian values and future continuity

The Royal Navy, China Station: 1864 - 1941 Jonathan Parkinson, 2018-02-20 A definitive history of the Royal Navy s China Station In the The Navy List for April 1864 the China Station was first shown as a separate Royal Navy Station It remained as such until the outbreak of the Pacific War in December 1941 which was to signal the end

of that era In addition to a precis of the lives and naval careers of each of the Commanders in Chief of the China Station this volume also gives relevant information outlining something of the concurrent internal affairs of China and Japan Both are very different but sad tales the former in decline towards the end of the Manchu Ching dynasty and then into the chaotic 1920 s and 1930 s and the latter increasingly adopting a militaristic attitude which was to result in their disaster of the Pacific War of 1941 1945 As a reminder of these days long gone are interwoven brief references to the British Consular Service This is especially relevant for China and for a shorter period for Japan during that era of extraterritoriality Mention is also made of the British Colonial Service with whom necessarily the Navy worked very closely In addition being one important reason for it all frequent references are made to a few British shipping and trading interests together with those of some other nations All of these areas are linked together to give a definitive history of this very important Royal Navy Station

Colonial Dis-Ease Anne Perez Hattori, 2004-07-31 A variety of cross cultural collisions and collusions sometimes amusing sometimes tragic but always complex resulted from the U S Navy s introduction of Western health and sanitation practices to Guam s native population In Colonial Dis Ease Anne Perez Hattori examines early twentieth century U S military colonialism through the lens of Western medicine and its cultural impact on the Chamorro people In four case studies Hattori considers the histories of Chamorro leprosy patients exiled to Culion Leper Colony in the Philippines hookworm programs for children the regulation of native midwives and nurses and the creation and operation of the Susana Hospital for women and children Changes to Guam s traditional systems of health and hygiene placed demands not only on Chamorro bodies but also on their cultural values social relationships political controls and economic expectations Hattori effectively demonstrates that the new health projects signified more than a benevolent interest in hygiene and the philanthropic sharing of medical knowledge Rather the navy s health care regime in Guam was an important vehicle through which U S colonial power and moral authority over Chamorros was introduced and entrenched Medical experts navy doctors and health care workers asserted their scientific knowledge as well as their administrative might and in the process became active participants in the colonization of Guam

Akin, 2013-10-31 This book is a political history of the island of Malaita in the British Solomon Islands Protectorate from 1927 when the last violent resistance to colonial rule was crushed to 1953 and the inauguration of the island s first representative political body the Malaita Council At the book s heart is a political movement known as Maasina Rule which dominated political affairs in the southeastern Solomons for many years after World War II The movement s ideology kastom was grounded in the determination that only Malaitans themselves could properly chart their future through application of Malaitan sensibilities and methods free from British interference Kastom promoted a radical transformation of Malaitan lives by sweeping social engineering projects and alternative governing and legal structures When the government tried to suppress Maasina Rule through force its followers brought colonial administration on the island to a halt for several years through a labor strike and massive civil resistance actions that overflowed government prison camps David Akin draws on extensive archival and field research to present a practice based analysis of colonial

officers interactions with Malaitans in the years leading up to and during Maasina Rule A primary focus is the place of knowledge in the colonial administration Many scholars have explored how various regimes deployed colonial knowledge of subject populations in Asia and Africa to reorder and rule them The British imported to the Solomons models for native administration based on such an approach particularly schemes of indirect rule developed in Africa The concept of custom was basic to these schemes and to European understandings of Melanesians and it was made the lynchpin of government policies that granted limited political roles to local ideas and practices Officers knew very little about Malaitan cultures however and Malaitans seized the opportunity to transform custom into kastom as the foundation for a new society The book's overarching topic is the dangerous road that colonial ignorance paved for policy makers from young cadets in the field to high officials in distant Fiji and London Today kastom remains a powerful concept on Malaita but continued confusion regarding its origins history and meanings hampers understandings of contemporary Malaitan politics and of Malaitan people's ongoing problematic relations with the state

revere their vessels and share a singular attitude to risk and death The period of prehistoric seafaring is discussed using archaeological data interpretations from interisland exchanges experimental voyaging and recent DNA analysis Sections on the arrival of foreign exploring ships centuries later concentrate on relations between visiting sailors and maritime communities The more intrusive influx of commercial trading and whaling ships brought new technology weapons and differences in the ethics of trade The successes and failures of Polynesian chiefs who entered trading with European type ships are recounted as neglected aspects of Pacific history As foreign owned commercial ships expanded in the region so did colonialism which was accompanied by an increase in the number of sailors from metropolitan countries and a decrease in the employment of Pacific islanders on foreign ships Eventually small scale island entrepreneurs expanded interisland shipping and in 1978 the regional Pacific Forum Line was created by newly independent states This was welcomed as a symbolic return to indigenous Pacific ocean linkages The book's final sections detail the life of the modern Pacific seafarer Most Pacific sailors in the global maritime labor market return home after many months at sea bringing money goods a wider perspective of the world and sometimes new diseases Each of these impacts is analyzed particularly in the case of Kiribati a major supplier of labor to foreign ships
