Representation Theory William Fulton, Joe Harris, 2013-12-01 The primary goal of these lectures is to introduce a beginner to the finite dimensional representations of Lie groups and Lie algebras Since this goal is shared by guite a few other books we should explain in this Preface how our approach differs although the potential reader can probably see this better by a quick browse through the book Representation theory is simple to define it is the study of the ways in which a given group may act on vector spaces It is almost certainly unique however among such clearly delineated subjects in the breadth of its interest to mathematicians This is not surprising group actions are ubiquitous in 20th century mathematics and where the object on which a group acts is not a vector space we have learned to replace it by one that is e.g. a cohomology group tangent space etc As a consequence many mathematicians other than specialists in the field or even those who think they might want to be come in contact with the subject in various ways It is for such people that this text is designed To put it another way we intend this as a book for beginners to learn from and not as a reference This idea essentially determines the choice of material covered here As simple as is the definition of representation theory given above it fragments considerably when we try to get more specific **Lie Groups, Lie Algebras, and Representations** Brian C. Hall, 2003-08-07 This book provides an introduction to Lie groups Lie algebras and repre sentation theory aimed at graduate students in mathematics and physics Although there are already several excellent books that cover many of the same topics this book has two distinctive features that I hope will make it a useful addition to the literature First it treats Lie groups not just Lie alge bras in a way that minimizes the amount of manifold theory needed Thus I neither assume a prior course on differentiable manifolds nor provide a con densed such course in the beginning chapters Second this book provides a gentle introduction to the machinery of semi simple groups and Lie algebras by treating the representation theory of SU 2 and SU 3 in detail before going to the general case This allows the reader to see roots weights and the Weyl group in action in simple cases before confronting the general theory The standard books on Lie theory begin immediately with the general case a smooth manifold that is also a group The Lie algebra is then defined as the space of left invariant vector fields and the exponential mapping is defined in terms of the flow along such vector fields This approach is undoubtedly the right one in the long run but it is rather abstract for a reader encountering such things for the first time Lie Groups, Lie Algebras, and Their **Representations** V.S. The second chapter is devoted to compact Riemann surfaces The main classical results like the Riemann Roch Theorem Abel s Theorem and the Jacobi inversion problem are presented Sheaf cohomology is an important technical tool But only the first cohomology groups are used and these are comparatively easy to handle The main theorems are all derived following Serre from the finite dimensionality of the first cohomology group with coefficients in the sheaf of holomorphic functions And the proof of this is based on the fact that one can locally solve inhomogeneous Cauchy Riemann equations and on Schwarz Lemma
