settings for pleasure resulted in a constantly increasing level of luxury sought within everyday architecture

**Fish on Friday** Brian Fagan, 2008-08-01 What gave Christopher Columbus the confidence in 1492 to set out across the Atlantic Ocean? What persuaded the king and queen of Spain to commission the voyage? It would be convenient to believe that Columbus and his men were uniquely courageous. A more reasonable explanation, however, is that Columbus was heir to a body of knowledge about seas and ships acquired at great cost over many centuries. *Fish on Friday* tells a new story of the discovery of America. In Brian Fagan's view, that discovery is the product of the long sweep of history: the spread of Christianity and the radical cultural changes it brought to Europe; the interaction of economic necessity with a changing climate and generations of unknown fishermen who explored the North Atlantic in the centuries before Columbus. The Church's tradition of not eating meats on holy days created a vast market for fish that could not be fully satisfied by fish farms, better boats, or new preservation techniques. Then, when climate change in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries diminished fish stocks off Norway and Iceland, fishermen were forced to range ever farther to the west, eventually discovering incredibly rich shoals within sight of the Nova Scotia coast. In Ireland in 1490, Columbus could well have heard about this unknown land. The rest is history.

**Isfahan and its Palaces** Sussan Babaie, 2008-07-14 Winner of the Houshang Pourshariati Iranian Studies Book Award 2009 This beautifully illustrated history of Safavid Isfahan 1501-1722 explores the architectural and urban forms and networks of socio-cultural action that reflected a distinctly early modern and Persian Shi'i practice of kingship. An immense building campaign initiated in 1590-91 at the millennial threshold of the Islamic calendar 1000 A.H. transformed Isfahan from a provincial medieval and largely Sunni city into an urban-centered representation of the first Imami Shi'i empire in the history of Islam. The historical process of Shi'ification of Safavid Iran and the deployment of the arts in situating the shifts in the politico-religious agenda of the imperial household informs Sussan Babaie's study of palatial architecture and urban environments of Isfahan and the earlier capitals of Tabriz and Qazvin. Babaie argues that since the Safavid claim presumed the inheritance both of the charisma of the Shi'i Imams and of the aura of royal splendor integral to ancient Persian notions of kingship, a ceremonial regime was gradually devised in which access and proximity to the shah assumed the contours of an institutionalized form of feasting. Talar palaces, a new typology in Islamic palatial designs and the urban spatial articulation of access and proximity are the architectural anchors of this argument. Cast in the comparative light of urban spaces and palace complexes elsewhere and earlier in the Timurid, Ottoman and Mughal realms as well as in the early modern European capitals, Safavid Isfahan emerges as the epitome of a new architectural urban paradigm in the early modern age.

**A Revolution in Taste** Susan Pinkard, 2009 This book traces the development of modern French habits of cooking, eating and drinking from their roots in the Ancien Régime. **Fonthill Recovered** Caroline Dakers, 2018-05-16 Fonthill in Wiltshire is traditionally associated with the writer and collector William Beckford who built his Gothic fantasy house called Fonthill Abbey at the end of the eighteenth century. The collapse of the Abbey's tower in 1825 transformed the name Fonthill into a symbol for overarching ambition and folly, a sublime ruin. Fonthill is however much more than the story of one man's excesses. Beckford's Abbey is only one of several important houses to be built on the estate since the early sixteenth century, all of them eventually consumed by fire or deliberately demolished and all of them oddly forgotten by historians. Little now remains: a tower, a stable block, a kitchen range, some dressed stone, an indentation in a field. Fonthill Recovered draws on histories of art and architecture, politics and economics to explore the rich cultural history of this famous Wiltshire estate. The first half of the book traces the occupation of Fonthill from the Bronze Age to the twenty-first century. Some of the owners surpassed Beckford in terms of their wealth, their collections, their political power and even in one case their sexual

misdemeanours They include Charles I's Chancellor of the Exchequer and the richest commoner in the nineteenth century The second half of the book consists of essays on specific topics filling out such crucial areas as the complex history of the designed landscape the sources of the Beckfords wealth and their collections and one essay that features the most recent appearance of the Abbey in a video game      What Will You Drink?
