Zhao Mengfu Shane McCausland,Mengfu Zhao,2011-01-01 Zhao Mengfu has enormous significance for Chinese art history This work presents a new synthetic portrait of the artist s development from the 1280s to his death in 1322 and evaluates his pivotal role in the social political context in Yuan China as well as the development of the artist s self consciousness Shane McCausland s study features detailed interpretations of pictorial forms in light of historical changes and close readings of critical colophons many of which are appended to artworks but neglected as visual sources These readings are meant to stimulate visual analysis of the oeuvre as well as debate about the use of Tang 618 907 and other period modes as models for the Yuan renaissance The book challenges stereotypes portraying Zhao Mengfu as a traitor or careerist The historical background of dynastic change and Mongol rule is treated in a revisionist manner that aims to contextualize the traditional Chinese hostility towards Zhao Mengfu as a Yuan scholar official The concern here is for his development in the context of Mongol rule as a Chinese scholar artist This book will be a

must for scholars curators and other specialists in Chinese painting and calligraphy especially those focusing on Yuan dynasty and literati painting Shane McCausland is a lecturer in the history of Chinese art in the Department of Art and Archaeology at SOAS University of London

The Figurative Works of Chen Hongshou (1599-1652) Tamara Heimarck Bentley, 2017-07-05 Despite the importance of Chen Hongshou 1599-1652 as an artist and scholar of the Ming period until now no full length study in English has focused on his work Author Tamara H Bentley takes a broadly interdisciplinary approach treating Chen's oeuvre in relation to literary themes and economic changes and linking these larger concerns to visual analyses Considering Chen's paintings and prints alongside Chen's romance drama commentaries and prefaces and his collected writings particularly poetry Bentley sheds new light not only on Chen but also on an important cultural moment in the first half of the seventeenth century Through analysis of Chen's figure paintings and print designs Bentley examines the artist's engagement with the values of authenticity and emotion which were part of a larger discourse stressing idiosyncrasy the individual voice and vernacular literature She contrasts these values with the commercial aspects of his production geared at an expanding art market of well to do buyers excavating the apparent contradiction inherent in the two pursuits In the end she suggests the emphasis on the authentic voice was marketed to a broad field of anonymous buyers Though her primary focus is on Chen Hongshou Bentley's investigation ultimately concerns not only this individual artist but also the effect of early modern changes on an artist's mode of working and his self image in the West as well as the East The study touches upon expanding international trade and the rise of middle class art markets including print markets not only in China but also in the Dutch Republic in circa 1630-1650 Bentley investigates the specific rhetoric of different categories of images including Chen's non literal figurative works literal commemorative portraits his printed romance drama illustrations and his printed playing cards Bentley's investigation takes in issues of studio practice including various types of image replicati

Geo-Narratives of a Filial Son Elizabeth Kindall, 2020-05-11 Huang Xiangjian a mid seventeenth century member of the Suzhou local elite journeyed on foot to southwest China and recorded its sublime scenery in site specific paintings Elizabeth Kindall's innovative analysis of the visual experiences and social functions Huang conveyed through his oeuvre reveals an unrecognized tradition of site paintings here labeled geo narratives that recount specific journeys and create meaning in the paintings Kindall shows how Huang created these geo narratives by drawing upon the Suzhou place painting tradition as well as the encoded experiences of southwestern sites discussed in historical gazetteers and personal travel records and the geography of the sites themselves Ultimately these works were intended to create personas and fulfill specific social purposes among the educated class during the Ming Qing transition Some of Huang's paintings of the southwest together with his travel records became part of a campaign to attain the socially generated title of Filial Son whereas others served private functions This definitive study elucidates the context for Huang Xiangjian's painting and identifies geo narrative as a distinct landscape painting tradition lauded for its naturalistic immediacy experiential topography and dramatic narratives of

contestation where Ming emperors and senior court ministers staked claims about rulership ruler minister relations and the role of the military in the polity Simultaneously colorful entertainment prestigious social events and statements of power martial spectacles were intended to make manifest the ruler s personal generosity keen discernment and respect for family tradition They were however subject to competing interpretations that were often beyond the emperor s control or even knowledge By situating Ming martial spectacles in the wider context of Eurasia David Robinson brings to light the commensurability of the Ming court with both the Mongols and Manchus but more broadly with other early modern courts such as the Timurids the Mughals and the Ottomans

The Forger's Creed J. P. Park,2025-03-04 The first in depth look at the history and legacies of forgeries in Chinese art In 1634 scholar official Zhang Taijie b ca 1588 published a book titled A Record of Treasured Paintings C Baohui lu presenting an extensive catalogue of a purportedly vast painting collection he claimed to have built However the entire book is Zhang s meticulously crafted forgery he even forged paintings to match the documentation and profited from trading them Furthermore the book intriguingly mirrors unfounded art historical claims of its time Prominent figures like Dong Qichang 1555 1636 made entirely fabricated arguments to assert legitimate lineages in Chinese art designed to create a fictionalized history shaped by preferred beliefs rather than reality While presenting the first comprehensive exploration of various forgery practices in early modern China fabricated texts forged paintings and fictitious art history The Forger s Creed examines the cultural social and genealogical desires anxieties and tensions prevalent in early modern China Through thorough scrutiny of the historical irregularities introduced by these forgeries J P Park highlights a peculiar and paradoxical phenomenon wherein forgeries transform into legitimate materials across Chinese history

Presence Robert Maniura,2017-07-05 In about 25 BC tribesmen of the kingdom of Meroe placed a bronze head of Augustus cut from a full length statue beneath the steps of a temple of victory the decapitated head of the Emperor was thus regularly trampled underfoot Two millennia later during the second Gulf War Iraqis insulted a toppled bronze statue of Saddam Hussein by beating it with their shoes Do these chronologically distant but apparently related examples of the defamation of images imply that the persons represented were regarded by their detractors as in some way present in the images Presence The Inherence of the Prototype within Images and Other Objects reconsiders the notion of presence in objects The first book to address the issue directly it contains a series of case studies covering a broad geographical and chronological range from ancient Greece and the Incas to industrial America and contemporary India as well as examples from the canon of western European art The studies reveal the widespread evidence for this striking form of response and allow readers to see how presence is evoked and either embraced or repressed in differing historical and cultural contexts Featuring a variety of disciplines and approaches the book will be of interest to students of art history art theory visual culture anthropology psychology and philosophy
