Haeberli, 2012-12-06 Features Categories and the Syntax of A Positions investigates various aspects of the distribution of nominal arguments and in particular the cross linguistic variation that can be found among the Germanic languages in this domain of the syntax The empirical topics that are discussed include variable vs fixed argument order the distribution of subjects with respect to adjuncts expletive constructions and oblique subjecthood These and many other phenomena are analyzed within a theoretical framework which is based on the Minimalist Program The book argues that the traditional theoretical devices accounting for the distribution of arguments in generative syntax abstract Case the Extended Projection Principle should be eliminated from the grammar and that their apparent effects can be derived from the feature specifications of syntactic categories Furthermore it is shown that several aspects of the cross linguistic variation found in the syntax of arguments can be related to variation in the domain of inflectional morphology

Grammaticalization and Parametric Variation Montse Batllori, 2005-08-11 In this outstanding collection of new work the methods and theories of formal syntax are focussed on grammatical variation and change The editors open the volume with an extensive and accessible introduction to the ideas and techniques deployed in the book and the phenomena and issues on which they are brought to bear Seventeen chapters follow divided into two parts the first concerned with grammaticalization and the second with parametric variation These show what the application of contemporary theories of syntax and language variation can reveal about syntactic change and variation and the processes of parametric change which lie behind them They also demonstrate the value of testing and constructing synchronic theories on the basis of historical data The analyses range over many languages and language families including Germanic Romance Greek and Chinese This book will interest scholars and students of grammatical change and theory at graduate level and above *The Rise of Agreement* Eric Fuß, 2005-10-13 This book investigates the historical paths leading from pronouns to markers of verbal agreement and proposes a unified formal account of this grammaticalization process In opposition to beliefs widely held in the literature it is argued that new agreement formatives can be coined in a multitude of syntactic environments Still the individual paths toward agreement are shown to exhibit a set of underlying similarities which are attributed to universal

principles that govern the reanalysis of pronominal clitics as exponents of verbal agreement across languages It is claimed that syntactic principles impose only a set of necessary conditions on the reanalysis in question while its ultimate trigger is morphological in nature More specifically it is argued that the acquisition of inflectional morphology is governed by blocking effects which operate during language acquisition and promote the grammaticalization of new markers if this change serves to replace worn out underspecified forms with new more specified candidates Diachronic Clues to Synchronic Grammar Eric Fuß, Carola Trips, 2004-10-13 This volume emphasizes a new line of thinking in generative grammar which acknowledges that certain synchronic properties of languages can only be fully understood if diachronic data is taken into consideration The central topics addressed in this collection of papers are 1 a critical assessment of the hypothesis that certain apparently synchronic generalizations are actually the result of the mechanisms of language change 2 an inquiry into how diachronic data can be used to evaluate and shape formal analyses of particular synchronic phenomena Reviving the interest in diachronic explanations for synchronic data the contributions provide novel and original diachronic accounts of phenomena that up to now have escaped a deeper synchronic explanation including the nature of EPP features gaps in the distribution of complementizer agreement and counterexamples to the generalization that rich verbal inflection correlates with verb movement *Grammatical Change and Linguistic Theory* Thórhallur Eythórsson, 2008-03-06 This book contains 15 revised papers originally presented at a symposium at Rosendal Norway under the aegis of The Centre for Advanced Study CAS at the Norwegian Academy of Science and Letters The overall theme of the volume is internal factors in grammatical change The papers focus on fundamental questions in theoretically based historical linguistics from a broad perspective Several of the papers relate to grammaticalization in different ways but are generally critical of Grammaticalization Theory Further papers focus on the causes of syntactic change pinpointing both extra syntactic exogenous causes and more controversially internally driven endogenous causes The volume is rounded up by contributions on morphological change by itself A wide range of languages is covered including Tsova Tush Nakh Dagestan Zoque and Athapaskan languages in addition to Indo European languages both the more familiar ones and some less well studied varieties *Balkan Sprachbund* *Morpho-Syntactic Features* Olga M. Tomic, 2006-09-13 At the end of 1998 Professor Pieter Muysken was awarded the Spinoza prize of the Netherlands Organization of Scientific Research NOW and set up a research program entitled Lexicon and Syntax The implementation of the Program started in the autumn of 1999 with research on the lexicon and syntax in a number of areas where contacts between 1 different languages are intensive For the languages of many of the areas selected basic data had to be collected For most of the languages of the Balkan Sprachbund area however there are grammars and dictionaries Moreover quite a number of studies of the Balkan Sprachbund features have been published Accordingly when I joined the team of the Project I aimed at a description of the state of art in the field After several months of research I realized that Balkanists have mainly been concerned with compiling lists of similarities and making parallels between the

lexical and grammatical forms of the Balkan languages while analyses of the interaction of the Balkan Sprachbund morpho syntactic features with other features in the structure of the DP or the sentence of a given language dialect are scarce This oriented me towards descriptions of Balkan Sprachbund morpho syntactic features in the context of individual sub systems in nine Balkan language to which they relate the Slavic languages Macedonian Bulgarian and Serbo Croatian the Romance languages Romanian Aromanian and Megleno Romanian Albanian Modern Greek and the Arli Balkan Romani dialect

Differential Subject Marking Helen de Hoop, Peter de Swart, 2007-12-04 Although almost all sentences have subjects not all sentences encode their subjects in the same way Some languages overtly mark some subjects but not others depending on certain features of the subject argument or the sentence in which the subject figures This phenomenon is known as Differential Subject Marking DSM Languages differ in which conditions govern DSM Some languages differentiate their subjects on the basis of semantic features of the argument such as thematic role volitionality animacy whereas others differentiate on the basis of clausal features such as tense aspect and the main dependent clause distinction DSM comes in different formal guises case marking agreement inverse systems and voice

alternations Relatively much is known about cross linguistic variation in the marking of subjects yet little attempt has been made to formalize the facts This volume aims to unify formal approaches to language and presents both specific case studies of DSM and theoretical approaches

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
