Fécondité d'Emile Zola David Baguley, 1973-12-15 This historical and critical study of Zola's *Fécondité* contributes much to an understanding of how the novel came to be written and of its achievements. Like *Le Travail* and *Le Ver*, the later books in the series *Les Quatre Évangiles*, *Fécondité* has not previously received significant critical attention. This study reveals and interprets the less obvious aspects of the work: its biblical and mythical themes, its sources and genesis. It also adds to our knowledge of Zola's later works through the examination of various ideological currents, particularly the impact of Malthusianism, its proponents and adversaries, and who among them Zola read in preparing this book. *Fécondité* deals with the particular problem of France's declining birth rate at the end of the nineteenth century and more generally with the problem of decadence and cultural renewal. By the time that he wrote *Fécondité*, Zola had abandoned his naturalist aesthetic of scientific objectivity, if not also his working methods as a novelist. This study shows how his didactic concerns continually asserted themselves in the structure and the use of rhetorical techniques in *Fécondité*. Specialists in Zola and others more generally interested in the French culture of the late nineteenth century as well as the particular demographic problems that Zola treats in the work and the relationship of literature to primitive mythology should find this study of particular interest.

Debating the Woman Question in the French Third Republic, 1870-1920 Karen Offen, 2018-01-11 Karen Offen offers a magisterial reconstruction and analysis of the debates around relations between women and men, how they are constructed, and how they should be organized that raged in France and its French-speaking neighbors from 1870 to 1920. The woman question encompassed subjects from maternity and childbirth and the upbringing and education of girls to marriage practices and property law, the organization of households, the distribution of work inside and outside the household, intimate sexual relations, religious beliefs and moral concerns, government-sanctioned prostitution, economic and political citizenship, and the politics of population growth. The book shows how the expansion of economic opportunities for women and the drop in the birth rate further exacerbated the debates over their status, roles, and possibilities. With the onset of the First World War, these debates were temporarily placed on hold, but they would be revived by 1916 and gain momentum during France's post-war recovery. The Colonial Comedy: Imperialism in the French Realist Novel Jennifer

Yee, 2016-08-12 Nineteenth-century French Realism focuses on metropolitan France with Paris as its undisputed heart. Through Jennifer Yee's close reading of the great novelists of the French realist and naturalist canon—Balzac, Flaubert, Zola, Maupassant—*The Colonial Comedy* reveals that the colonies play a role at a distance even in the most apparently metropolitan texts. In what Edward Said called geographical notations of race and imperialism, the presence of the colonies off stage is apparent as imported objects, colonial merchandise, and individuals whose colonial experience is transformative. Indeed, the realist novel registers the presence of the emerging global world system through networks of importation, financial speculation, and immigration, as well as direct colonial violence and power structures. The literature of the century responds

to the last decades of French slavery and direct colonialism notably in Algeria but also economic imperialism and the extension of French influence elsewhere Far from imperialist triumphalism in the realist novel exotic objects are portrayed as fake or mass produced for the growing bourgeois market while economic imperialism is associated with fraud and manipulation The deliberate contrast of colonialism and exoticism within the metropolitan novel and ironic distancing of colonial narratives reveal the realist mode to be capable of questioning its own epistemological basis The Colonial Comedy argues for the existence in the nineteenth century of a Critical Orientalism characterized by critique of its own discursive foundations Using the tools of literary analysis within a materialist approach The Colonial Comedy opens up the domestic Paris Provinces axis to signifying chains pointing towards the colonial space

the twenty first century In an interview with the newspaper Liberation in 2010 feminist philosopher Elisabeth Badinter claimed that the pressure to breast feed signified a reduction of woman to the status of an animal species as though we were all female chimpanzees The debate over maternal nursing held even more urgency before pasteurization provided a safe alternative in the early 1900s While scholars of literary criticism and art history have described the abundance of breast feeding imagery following the publication of Rousseau s *Emile* in 1762 little has been written on its manifestations in the nineteenth century Despite an ongoing propaganda campaign to encourage mothers to nurse reflected in such diverse sources as medical theses paintings and fictional cautionary tales French mothers continued to entrust their infants to wet nurses more often and for longer than was the norm in other European countries throughout the nineteenth century and well into the twentieth This book examines representations of breast feeding in French literature and culture from 1800 to 1900 and their apparent dissonance with the socio historical realities of French mothers

Franklin,1979-12-15 While Paul Val ry s lyric poetry as well as his dialogues dramatic work and critical prose have preoccupied his critics his prose poems have been virtually ignored and his position in the tradition of the genre has remained unacknowledged This study demonstrates the significance of Val ry as a prose poet and of the form and its evolution in the poet s oeuvre The close textual reading and analysis concentrate on Val ry s prose aubades the prose poems poetic prose fragments and sequences celebrating the emergence of the self and its world at dawn The theme of dawn pervades Val ry s poetry from the opening chord of *Charmes* to those Notebooks which he kept from almost half a century and which are the source of so much of his poetry This book shows how the moment and theme of dawn have also inspired the greater part of Val ry s prose poems and poetic prose fragments Critics have begun to show interest in the break up of traditional genres and in the emergence of the fragment as a new literary form But Val ry s position in this development has so far escaped critical inquiry as have his prose poems in general Professor Franklin redresses the balance with rigor poise and elegance She shows how Val ry s artistic progression from the traditional prose poem to the fragment the evolution of the *recueil* to the sequence represents a development very similar to that manifests in another new prose form the new *nouveau roman* It is a brilliant analysis of a neglected aspect of Val ry s work and a thoughtful interpretation of Val ry s thought and poetics as a whole *Editing Nineteenth-Century Fiction* Jane Millgate,2016-07-28 First published in 1978 this collection of papers first presented at the thirteenth annual Conference on Editorial Problems in 1977 focuses on the editing of nineteenth century fiction Four of the papers are devoted to single authors Dickens Thackeray Hardy and Zola while the fifth takes its principle examples from Hawthorne Twain and Crane Looking at a range of works from English American and French literature this volume demonstrates the number of different attitudes that exist towards the editorial process as well as the different ambitions for the texts that scholars seek to produce This book will be of interest to those studying and editing nineteenth century literature Canadiana ,1976 **Edgar Allan Poe** Charles Baudelaire,1973-12-15 The earliest foreign study of the life and works of Edgar Allan Poe the text presented in this volume is something of a landmark in the history of comparative literature Baudelaire s first and longest essay on Poe was published in the *Revue de Paris* in 1852 it was revised and abridged for use as the preface of the first volume of his translation of Poe s tales *Histoires extraordinaires* This study was significant especially in the area of Franco American literary relations because it was the basis of not only the French attitude toward Poe but of his reputation throughout Europe one might almost say throughout the world The essay on Poe has never been the subject of a separate publication This edition reveals for the first time the sources of information

used by Baudelaire It shows that a considerable part of the study was translated literally from articles by John M Daniel and John R Thompson in the Southern Literary Messenger 1849 50 Previous editions vary widely in excellence because almost all suffered from the mistaken belief that Baudelaire was acquainted with the American edition of Poe s works when he wrote the 1852 essay and that it was largely based on Rufus Griswold s Memoir contained in that edition This led to the commentary and notes that were unconsciously misleading and in many cases false The introduction to this edition presents a complete and accurate account of the genesis of Baudelaire s essay with supporting documents showing his indebtedness to American French and British sources It enables the reader to distinguish clearly between what Baudelaire himself knew or thought about Poe and what he borrowed from other writers Messiah Or Antichrist?
