political prisoners in Spain focusing on six texts in particular the two volumes of *Círcel de mujeres* by Tomasa Cuevas *Desde la noche y la niebla* by Juana Do a R *quien por la libertad* by ngeles Garc a Madrid *Abajo las dictaduras* by Josefa Garcia Segret and *Aquello sucedi as* by ngeles Malonda All the texts share common themes such as describing the hunger and repression that all political prisoners suffered However the ideologically driven narratives of Communist women often foreground representations of resistance at the expense of exploring the emotional and intellectual struggle for survival that many women political prisoners faced in the aftermath of the Spanish Civil War This study nuances our understanding of imprisoned women as individuals and as a collective analysing how women political prisoners sought recognition and justice in the face of a vindictive dictatorship It also explores the women s response to the spirit of *convivencia* during the transition to democracy which once again threatened to silence them

Jewish Imaginaries of the Spanish Civil War Cynthia Gabbay, 2022-09-08 Jewish Imaginaries of the Spanish Civil War inaugurates a new field of research in literary and Jewish studies at the intersection of Jewish history and the internationalist cultural phenomenon emerging from the Spanish Civil War 1936 1939 the Republican exile and the Shoah With the Spanish Civil War as a point of departure this volume proposes a definition of Jewish textualities based on the entanglement of multiple poetic modes Through the examination of a variety of narrative fiction and non fiction memoir poetry epistles journalism and music in Yiddish Spanish French German and English these essays unveil non canonic authors across the West and explore these works in the context of antisemitism orientalism and philo Sephardism among other cultural phenomena Jewish writings from the war have much to tell about the encounter between old traditions and new experimentations framed by urgency migration and messianic hope They offer perspectives on memorial and post memorial literatures triggered by transhistorical imagination and many were written against the grain of canonic literature where subtle forms of dissidence manifested through language structure sound and thought sought to tune with the anti fascist fight This book revindicates the polyglossia of Jewish cultures and literatures in the context of genocide and epistemicide and proposes to remember the cultural phenomena produced by the Spanish Civil War demanding a new understanding of the cosmopolitan imaginaries in Jewish literature

Spanish Women Writers and Spain's Civil War Maryellen Bieder, Roberta Johnson, 2016-12-01 The Spanish Civil War 1936 1939 pitted conservative forces including the army the Church the Falange fascist party landowners and industrial capitalists against the Republic installed in 1931 and supported by intellectuals the petite bourgeoisie many campesinos farm laborers and the urban proletariat Provoking heated passions on both sides the Civil War soon became an international phenomenon that inspired a number of literary works reflecting the impact of the war on foreign and national writers While the literature of the period has been the subject of scholarship women s literary production has not been studied as a body of work in the same way that literature by men has been and its unique features have not been examined Addressing this lacuna in literary studies this volume provides fresh perspectives on well known women writers as well as less studied ones whose works take the Spanish Civil War as a theme

The authors represented in this collection reflect a wide range of political positions. Writers such as Maria Zambrano, Merc Rodoreda, and Josefina Aldecoa were clearly aligned with the Republic, whereas others including Mercedes Salisachs and Liberata Masoliver sympathized with the Nationalists. Most, however, are situated in a more ambiguous political space, although the ethics and character portraits that emerge in their works might suggest Republican sympathies. Taken together, the essays are an important contribution to scholarship on literature inspired by this pivotal point in Spanish history.

Revolutionary Women of Texas and Mexico Kathy Sosa, Ellen Riojas Clark, Jennifer Speed, 2020-12-01 Much ink has been spilled over the men of the Mexican Revolution, but far less has been written about its women. Kathy Sosa, Ellen Riojas Clark, and Jennifer Speed set out to right this wrong in *Revolutionary Women of Texas and Mexico*, which celebrates the women of early Texas and Mexico who refused to walk a traditional path. Relational Responses to Trauma in Twenty-First-Century French and Spanish Women's Writing Hannie Lawlor, 2024-09-05 Relational Responses to Trauma in Twenty First Century French and Spanish Women s Writing offers new insight into what it means to write relational lives It broadens the parameters of existing discussions in terms of geography as well as genre drawing together two literatures whose prominence in life writing theory to date could hardly be more different while French women s writing has long been at the centre of international discussions of autobiography the relative invisibility of Spanish women s writing remains striking The dialogue that thus underpins this study between diverse twenty first century case studies and broader approaches to life writing shines a light on what is gained from inviting different voices into the discussion These narrative projects challenge longstanding critical assumptions in autobiography studies and trauma theory about how writers can and should represent the multiple perspectives that are at the heart of intergenerational stories In exploring the narrative solutions that these texts propose in response to the ethical questions they navigate this book shows that writing relational lives rests on far more than the mere recounting of a shared history Relating in these texts it proposes is an act embedded in the telling of the story It is a mode of testifying together to traumatic experience one that reveals a powerful preoccupation in contemporary women s life writing practice with making more audible the many voices and versions that go unheard

Revolution and the State Danny Evans, 2018-05-08 This book analyses the processes of revolution and state reconstruction that took place in the Republican zone during the Spanish civil war It focuses on the radical anarchists who sought to advance the revolutionary agenda Their activity came into conflict with the leaders of the libertarian organisations committed to the reconstruction of the Republican state following its near collapse in July 1936 This process implied participation not only in the organs of governance but also in the ideological reconstitution of the Republic as a patriarchal and national entity Using original sources the book shows that the opposition to this process was both broader and more ideologically consistent than has hitherto been assumed and that in spite of its heterogeneity it united around a common revolutionary programme This resistance to state reconstruction was informed by the essential insight of anarchism that the function and purpose of the modern state cannot be transformed from within By situating the struggles of the radical anarchists within the contested process of state reconstruction the book affirms the continued relevance of this insight to the study of the Spanish revolution

organization This book is a global history of Singer but it also focuses on the cases of Spain and Mexico to highlight nations where the sewing machine multinational never established manufacturing operations Casa Singer was a mostly profitable and a long term selling and marketing operation in both countries Gendered Capitalism demonstrates that local Spanish and Mexican agents both men and women developed and expanded Singer s selling system to the extent that the multinational company was seen as domestic both in the location sense and because of its focus on the private sphere of the home By bringing the cases of Spain and Mexico and the cultural everyday realm of practices related to sewing and embroidery that the sewing machine was part of to the center of the study of international business Gendered Capitalism further reveals the layers of complexities and multitudes that conform the history of global capitalism This book will be of interest to readers and scholars in the fields of business history economic cultural history management studies international business women s history gender studies and the history of technology
