Daly, 2016-12-05 The emblem was big business in early modern Europe used extensively not only in printed books and broadsheets but also to decorate pottery metalware furniture glass and windows and numerous other domestic devotional and political objects At its most basic level simply a combination of symbolic visual image and texts an emblem is a hybrid composed of words and picture However as this book demonstrates understanding the precise and often multiple meaning intention and message emblems conveyed can prove a remarkably slippery process In this book Peter Daly draws upon many years research to reflect upon the recent upsurge in scholarly interest in and rediscovery of emblems following years of relative neglect Beginning by considering some of the seldom asked but important questions that the study of emblems raises including the importance of the emblem the truth value of emblems and the transmission of knowledge through emblems the book then moves on to investigate more closely focussed aspects such as the role of mnemonics mottoes and visual rhetoric The volume concludes with a review of some perhaps inadequately considered issues such as the role of Jesuits who had a role in the publication of about a quarter of all known emblem books and questions such as how these hybrid constructs were actually read and interpreted Drawing upon a database containing records of 6 514 books of emblems and impressing this study suggests new ways for scholars to approach important questions that have not yet been satisfactorily broached in the standard works on emblems **Images of Sex and Desire in Renaissance Art and Modern Historiography** Angeliki Pollali, Berthold Hub, 2017-12-06 Studies on gender and sexuality have proliferated in the last decades covering a wide spectrum of disciplines This collection of essays offers a metanarrative of sexuality as it has been recently embedded in the art historical discourse of the European Renaissance It revisits canonical forms of visual culture such as painting sculpture and a number of emblematic manuscripts The contributors focus on one image either actual or thematic and examine it against its historiographic assumptions Through the use of interdisciplinary approaches the essays propose to unmask the ideologies of representation of sexuality and suggest a richer image of the ever shifting identities of gender The collection focuses on the Italian Renaissance but also includes case studies from Germany and France *Reading the Royal Monument in Eighteenth-Century Europe* Charlotte Chastel-Rousseau, 2017-07-05 Reading the Royal Monument in Eighteenth Century Europe is the first in depth study of the major role played by royal monuments in the public space of expanding cities across

ranging from war to love from religion to philosophy to politics from the sciences to the occult from social mores to encyclopedic knowledge and from serious speculation to entertainment Following Andrea Alciato's publication of the first emblem book in 1531 the form enjoyed its heyday in the seventeenth century appearing in speeches sermons and printed texts but also in wall and ceiling decorations jewelry carvings paintings and other material expressions Beyond this early boom the emblem was again present in eighteenth century title pages and frontispieces and experienced twentieth century manifestations during the ideological battles of both world wars and Quebec's attempt at secession from Canada The Companion to Emblem Studies introduces the multiple forms that the emblem has taken through nearly five centuries of production and offers an interdisciplinary and international assessment of the long history of this pervasive symbolic device use those vernacular languages on Alciato the father and prince of emblems on bibliography and theory on the Jesuit and Neo Latin emblems which cut across national groupings on flags and tournaments and on emblems in recent material culture logos and advertisements The Companion features 130 illustrations and concludes with a Selective Bibliography for Further Reading which includes works written in western European languages and expands the volume's usefulness for researchers and students in the field

Humanistica Lovaniensia Gilbert Tournoy, Dirk Sacre, 2001 Volume 50 The Emblem Tradition and the Low Countries John Manning, Karel Porteman, Marc van Vaec, 1999 Antwerp and Amsterdam were among the most active publishing centres for emblematic forms in Europe during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries Nowhere else was the emblematic mode more integrated into the literary and artistic culture than in the Low Countries The essays are revised versions of papers presented at the Fourth International Emblem Conference held at Leuven in 1996 The table of contents provides an overview of the variety of topics and approaches represented in the volume *Jeremias Held - 'Liber Emblematum' (Frankfurt-Am-Main 1566)* Andrea Alciati, Jeremias Held, 2007 This work by Jeremias Held Henry Green no 74 is the second German translation of the emblems of Andrea Alciato who is rightfully known as pater et princeps of the emblem The first German translation was written by Wolfgang Hunger and published by Chrestien Wechel in a bilingual Latin German edition in Paris in 1542 Held s version printed in 1566 and 1580 has never before been offered in its entirety in a modern reprint It too is a bilingual edition with the Latin texts followed by Held s German version Jeremias Held produced this the second German translation which appeared in a 1566 and a 1580 edition The 1566 edition was printed in Frankfurt am Main by Georg Raben for Simon Huter and Sigmund Feyerabend The colophon is dated 1567 Held s version contains 132 woodcuts in text to Alciato s 212 emblems and they are numbered i ccxvii The numbering of the emblems has caused some confusion Henry Green 190 hastily called the number 217 a misprint but it is not The number 217 is correct and derives from the separate numbering of the alternative versions of the epigrams which Alciato had labled aliud to four of the emblems Held s written German is simple and colloquial In fact it is sloppy In matters of orthography we cannot know if the typesetting accurately represents his intentions but it probably does *Emblem Studies in Honour of Peter M. Daly* Michael Bath, Pedro F. Campa, Daniel S. Russell, 2002 **Emblematic Paintings from Sweden's Age of Greatness** Simon McKeown, 2006 Emblematic Paintings of the Swedish Baroque is the first full length study of the cycle of emblematic canvases hanging in the corridors at Skokloster Castle outside Stockholm These imposing paintings were commissioned by a wealthy nobleman and cultural patron from Sweden s Age of Greatness and were inspired by images from one of the most important emblem books of the seventeenth century Otto VAenius s Emblemata Horatiana The principal importance of the Skokloster paintings lies in the fact that they appear to be a unique instance of paintings wholly adapted from images in a printed emblem book a phenomenon never previously recorded in emblem studies As such they prompt questions about the place of the emblem within the fine and applied arts generic issues explored in some detail in the introductory essay The

study presents a detailed reconstruction of the paintings place within a lost decorative milieu at the Uppland castle of Salsta and offers interpretations of the role emblems played within its wider conceptive framework The appeal of VAenius to the commissioning patron is also examined and through this a broader consideration of the reception of literary emblematics in seventeenth century Sweden This marks a significant attempt at opening up the rich subject of the emblem in Sweden a national tradition hitherto largely neglected and little understood within emblem studies Emblematic Paintings of the Swedish Baroque is the result of extensive field and archival research in major public and private collections in Sweden and documents a historically significant group of artworks little known outside Scandinavia The introductory essay presents the necessary groundwork of the pictures date provenance and probable circumstances of commission as well as an extended reconstruction of the original context in which they were first displayed Establishing that they were originally owned by Count Nils Bielke the study examines the intellectual preoccupations of a Swedish nobleman and the reasons he found the Neo Stoic ideas promoted in VAenius s emblems conducive to his interests and tastes The study situates the Skokloster paintings within the intellectual framework of Great Power Sweden conceiving of the pictures as attempts at private self representation but concomitantly aesthetic expressions of the nationalist mythologopoeic movement promoted by the scholars Olof Rudbeck Johan Peringskiöld and Urban Hjarne This volume presents the paintings as an emblem text reassembling the paintings in the order in which they occur in VAenius and providing each with a commentary on iconography sources and analogues Each plate is accompanied by a moralizing gloss by the seventeenth century French author and editor of VAenius Marin Le Roy Sieur de Gomberville in the translation of Thomas Mannington Gibbs *Mundus Emblematicus* K. A. E. Enenkel, Arnoud S. Q. Visser, 2003 The thirteen articles in this volume deal with the Neo Latin emblem book after the birth of the genre with Andrea Alciato s *Emblematum libellus* 1531 While the interest in emblematics has grown considerably during the last decades the seminal Neo Latin production has received relatively little attention In *Mundus Emblematicus* an international team of experts in the field makes this part of the emblem tradition accessible to a broad scholarly audience The articles cover a variety of emblem books published at the time ranging from influential humanist collections for instance those by Achille Bocchi Hadrianus Junius or Joachim Camerarius to alchemist Michael Maier or religious emblems such as the books of the Calvinist Theodore de Beze or the Jesuit Herman Hugo In each paper subjects dealt with include the historical context of the work and its makers the relation between word and image the structure of the collection as a whole and the emblematic game intertextuality in word and image Moreover several articles explore the interaction between the emblem and connected literary phenomena like the commonplace book the fable or the use of commentaries All papers are in English and all examples from Latin texts are translated Together these articles show the variety within the Neo Latin emblem production thus challenging traditional approaches of the emblem As such *Mundus Emblematicus* contributes towards a more comprehensive view of the forms and functions of the genre as a whole *Insect Artifice* Marisa
