All Poets Welcome Daniel Kane, 2003-03-26 This landmark book together with its accompanying CD captures the heady excitement of the vibrant irreverent poetry scene of New York's Lower East Side in the 1960s Drawing from personal interviews with many of the participants from unpublished letters and from rare sound recordings Daniel Kane brings together for the first time the people political events and poetic roots that coalesced into a highly influential community From the poetry reading venues of the early sixties such as those at the Les Deux M'gots and Le Metro coffeehouses to The Poetry Project at St Mark's Church a vital forum for poets to this day Kane traces the history of this literary renaissance showing how it was born from a culture of publicly performed poetry The Lower East Side in the sixties proved foundational in American verse culture a defining era for the artistic and political avant garde The voices and works of John Ashbery Amiri Baraka Charles Bernstein Bill Berkson Ted Berrigan Kenneth Koch Bernadette Mayer Ron Padgett Denise Levertov Paul Blackburn Frank O'Hara and many others enliven these pages and the thirty five track CD includes recordings of several of the poets reading from their work in the sixties and seventies The Lower East Side's cafes coffeehouses and salons brought together poets of various aesthetic sensibilities including writers associated with the so called New York School Beats Black Mountain Deep Image San Francisco Renaissance Umbra and others Kane shows that the significance for literary history of this loosely defined community of poets and artists lies in part in its reclaiming an orally centered poetic tradition adapted specifically to open up the possibilities for an aesthetically daring playful poetics and a politics of joy and resistance

Glancing Visions Zachary Tavlín, 2023-06-13 The sweeping vantages that typify American landscape painting from the nineteenth century by Thomas Cole and other members of the Hudson School are often interpreted for their geopolitical connotations as visual attempts to tame the wild alleviating fears of a savage frontier through views that subdue the landscape to the eye Zachary Tavlín's *Glancing Visions* challenges the long standing assumption that visuality in nineteenth century art and literature was

inherently imperialistic or possessive While there is much to be said for both material economic and theological impulses to clear the wilderness superimpose a national identity and usher in a Puritanical idyll many literary figures of the era display a purposeful disdain for the possessive gaze signaling instead a preference for subtle glances often informed by early photography Impressionism new techniques in portraiture and soon after the dawn of cinema The visual subjectivities and contingencies introduced by these media made room for a visual counter narrative one informed by a mode of seeing that moves fast and lightly across the surface of things Tavlin probes Nathaniel Hawthorne s idea of the imagination one that derives from both the camera obscura in *The Custom House* and the daguerreotype in *The House of the Seven Gables* each in its way an instance of the glance and entirely dependent on temporal moments The poetry of Frances Ellen Watkins Harper toggles between gazes and glances unsettling two competing forms of racialized seeing as they pertain to nineteenth century Black life and racial hierarchies the sentimental gaze and the slave trader s glance highlighting the life and death stakes of both looking anyone squarely in the eye and looking away Emily Dickinson s certain slant of light syntactical oddities and her stitching of scraps and fragments into the fascicles that constitute her corpus all derive from a commitment to contingency the ungrounded life s only defense against the abyss of non being Tavlin investigates as well Henry James s vexed but entirely dependent relationship to literary and painterly impressionism and William Carlos Williams s imagist poetics as a response to early cinema s use of the cut as the basis for a new visual grammar Each of these literary artists Tavlin argues via their own distinctive sensibilities and the artistic or technological counterparts that informed them refuse the authoritative all possessive gaze in favor of the glance a mode of seeing thinking and being that made way for what we now think of as commonplace namely modernity

Awakening to Race Jack Turner, 2012-09-20 The election of America s first black president has led many to believe that race is no longer a real obstacle to success and that remaining racial inequality stems largely from the failure of minority groups to take personal responsibility for seeking out opportunities Often this argument is made in the name of the long tradition of self reliance and American individualism In *Awakening to Race* Jack Turner upends this view arguing that it expresses not a deep commitment to the values of individualism but a narrow understanding of them Drawing on the works of Ralph Waldo Emerson Henry David Thoreau Frederick Douglass Ralph Ellison and James Baldwin Turner offers an original reconstruction of democratic individualism in American thought All these thinkers he shows held that personal responsibility entails a refusal to be complicit in injustice and a duty to combat the conditions and structures that support it At a time when individualism is invoked as a reason for inaction Turner makes the individualist tradition the basis of a bold and impassioned case for race consciousness consciousness of the ways that race continues to constrain opportunity in America Turner s new individualism becomes the grounds for concerted public action against racial injustice

Dissonant Voices Joseph Pizza, 2023-09-28 *Dissonant Voices Race Jazz and Innovative Poetics in Midcentury America* explores the braiding together of racial politics popular music and avant garde poetics in post war

American culture Ranging from roughly the late 1940s to the early 1970s this study examines the development of open field poetics alternately termed projective verse after Charles Olson's influential essay of the same name In doing so it traces projective verse from its creation amidst the crucible of racial integration at Black Mountain College to its development through a series of interracial friendships explored among writers involved in the Boston San Francisco and downtown New York scenes to its reimagining by African American poets working in Harlem Los Angeles and beyond as part of the Black Arts Movement Because the histories of integration jazz and postwar poetics have been studied too often as the subjects of disparate narratives and separate disciplines this arc of their shared development has also been largely obscured To remedy this the present study takes an interdisciplinary approach with insights from contemporary histories performance studies sound studies critical race theory and literary criticism informing the mix of literary analysis musicology and historical detail that comprises each chapter Accordingly the book argues for an integrated approach to the New American Poetry and the Black Arts Movement one that situates the midcentury poetics of breath and performance in the context of the Civil Rights era politics and jazz music that informed it Moreover it also unearths significant and little understood connections between Black Mountain the Beats the Boston Renaissance the New York scene and the Black Arts Movement expanding thereby our understandings of each and in a more general sense of contemporary American poetry politics and music in the process

Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, and Miles Davis Aaron Lefkowitz, 2018-06-20 This book examines Louis Armstrong Duke Ellington and Miles Davis as distinctively global symbols of threatening and nonthreatening black masculinity It centers them in debates over U S cultural exceptionalism noting how they have been part of the definition of jazz as a jingoistic and exclusively American form of popular culture

He analyzes the works of Frederick Douglass, Ralph Ellison, Marvin Gaye, Octavia E.
