What Is It Then between Us? Eric Murphy Selinger, 2018-10-18 Tracing the solitude of the American self, the difference between idolatrous and companionate affection, and the dream of an America of love, Eric Murphy Selinger shows how such concerns can shape a poet's most intimate decisions about genre and form. Positive As Sound Judy Jo Small, 2010-05-01 The strange rhymes of Emily Dickinson's verse have offended some readers attracted others and proved a stumbling block for critics In the first thorough analysis of
