Smith, 1998 This book has three interlocking themes It is concerned first with the advance and subsequent decline of the Wesleyan Methodist efforts in education during the nineteenth century Secondly it is about Dr James Harrison Rigg an irascible and self opinionated Victorian minister who became Principal of Westminster Methodist Training College and President of the Methodist Conference He had a dominant influence over his church for many years and dictated its education policy He also gained the ear of many in government who were formulating educational legislation and the book assesses his influence on government ideas The final and overriding theme of the book is the anti Catholicism within the Methodist church throughout the nineteenth century which influenced Wesleyan attitudes towards government education policy in general and towards Anglican Tractarian schools in particular The book is invaluable for students of nineteenth century religious history and is worthwhile for others interested in ecclesiastical history **Mary Sumner** Sue Anderson-Faithful, 2018-02-22 The founder and president of the Mothers Union one of the first and largest women s organisations Mary Sumner 1828 1921 was an influential educator and a force to be reckoned with in the Church of England of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries Using the analytical tools of the sociologist Pierre Bourdieu Sue Anderson Faithful locates Mary Sumner s life and thought against social and religious networks in which she was restricted

by gender yet privileged by class and proximity to distinguished individuals This dichotomy is key to understanding the achievements of a woman who both replicated and shaped Victorian attitudes to women's roles in society To Mary Sumner mission and education meant the propagation of religious knowledge through progressive pedagogy Her activism was intended to promote social reform at home and nurture the growth of the British Empire with mothers wielding their political power as educators of future citizens The symbiotic relationship between Church and State concentrated power in the hands of a ruling class with which Mary Sumner identified and which she supported In her view the legitimacy of national and imperial rule was intertwined with the moral force of Anglicanism Sue Anderson Faithful interprets Mary Sumner's lifelong work in the light of these relationships contrasting her assertion of personal agency and an empowering discourse of motherhood with her simultaneous reinforcement of patriarchy and class privilege

The Impact of Victorian Children's Fiction J. S. Bratton, 2015-09-07 Originally published in 1981 Many of the classics of children's literature were produced in the Victorian period But Alice in Wonderland and The King of the Golden River were not the books offered to the majority of children of the time When writing for children began to be taken seriously it was not as an art but as an instrument of moral suasion practical instruction Christian propaganda or social control This book describes and evaluates this body of literature It places the books in the economic and social contexts of their writing and publication and considers many of the most prolific writers in detail It deals with the stories intended to teach the newly literate poor their social and religious lessons sensational romances tales of adventure and military glory through which the boys were taught the value of self help and inspired with the ideals of empire and domestic novels intended to offer girls a model for the expression of heroism and aspiration within the restricted Victorian woman's world
