Sass, 2016-11-11 As prominent as the Wharton School of Business is today so was the Wharton family in the mercantile world of eighteenth century Philadelphia Nineteenth century scion of this large and wealthy business family Joseph Wharton amassed a huge new fortune in his American Nickel Company and the Bethlehem Steel Corporation and through these enterprises helped catapult the nation into the modern age of industry In 1881 while still in mid career he contributed part of his accumulated wealth to endow the Wharton School of Finance and Economy at the University of Pennsylvania Wharton's purpose was to prepare the city s young men of inherited wealth and capacity to assume control of the complex economy that he and his fellow entrepreneurs were then creating He would have the university provide that cultural background needed by all gentlemen of society while the new Wharton course would instruct students in those economic experiences necessary for success in the world of practical affairs Wharton's investment and instructional program began the modern tradition of collegiate management education Steven A Sass s The Pragmatic Imagination not only provides a history of the world s oldest and still one of the most prestigious schools of management but also offers a fascinating exploration of the interaction of higher

education and economic activity. The volume illuminates the essential tension in professional business education that between utilitarian training and scholarly speculation and analyzes the various regimes of conflict accommodation and synergy between these two interests Providing the unifying theme of the history is Joseph Wharton's ambition to create a leadership class for industrial America Careful attention is devoted to the various strategies adopted to achieve this end and to the forces that facilitated or frustrated the founder's purpose Essentially an essay on the role of authority in the development of American culture The Pragmatic Imagination carries the history of Joseph Wharton's experiment from its origins in the ironmaster's entrepreneurial ethos through the vigorous Mugwumpery of the 1880s to the gospel of the Progressive Era of civic revival and practical education into the crises of depression and war through the flowering of econometrics and operations research down to the present day voque for the M B A The Making of a Radical Scott Nearing, 2000 Scott Nearing lived one hundred years from 1883 to 1983 a life spanning most of the twentieth century In his early years Nearing made his name as a formidable opponent of child labor and military imperialism Having been fired from university jobs for his independence of mind Nearing became a freelance lecturer and writer traveling widely through Depression era and post war America to speak with eager audiences Five time Socialist candidate for president Eugene V Debs said Scott Nearing He is the greatest teacher in the United States Concluding that it would be better to be poor in the country than in New York City Scott and Helen Nearing moved north to Vermont in 1932 and commenced the experiment in self reliant living that would extend their fame far and wide They began to grow most of their own food and devised their famous scheme for allocating the day's hours one third for bread work livelihood one third for head work intellectual endeavors and one third for service to the world community Scott who d grown up partly on his grandfather's Pennsylvania farm taught Helen who was raised in suburbia groomed for a career as a classical violinist the practical skills they would need working with tools cultivating a garden and managing a woodlot and building stone and masonry walls For the rest of their lives the Nearings chronicled in detail their good life first in Vermont and ultimately on the coast of Maine in a group of wonderful books many of which are now being returned to print by Chelsea Green in cooperation with the Good Life Center an educational trust established at the Nearings Forest Farm in Harborside Maine to promote their ongoing legacy Back cover Educational Research .1925 The Booklist .1926 News Notes of California Libraries California State Library, 1925 Vols for 1971 include annual reports and statistical summaries Booklist ,1926 American Literature in Transition, 1910-1920 Mark W.
