Arithmeticity in the Theory of Automorphic Forms Goro Shimura, 2000 Written by one of the leading experts venerable grandmasters and most active contributors in the arithmetic theory of automorphic forms the new material included here is mainly the outcome of his extensive work over the last eight years a very careful detailed introduction to the subject this monograph is an important comprehensively written and profound treatise on some recent achievements in the theory Zentralblatt MATH The main objects of study in this book are Eisenstein series and zeta functions associated with Hecke eigenforms on symplectic and unitary groups After preliminaries including a section Notation and Terminology the first part of the book deals with automorphic forms on such groups In particular their rationality over a number field is defined and discussed in connection with the group action also the reciprocity law for the values of automorphic functions at CM points is proved Next certain differential operators that raise the weight are investigated in higher dimension The notion of nearly holomorphic functions is introduced and their arithmeticity is defined As applications of these the arithmeticity of the critical values of zeta functions and Eisenstein series is proved Though the arithmeticity is given as the ultimate main result the book discusses many basic problems that arise in number theoretical investigations of automorphic forms but that cannot be found in expository forms Examples of this include the space of automorphic forms spanned by cusp forms and certain Eisenstein series transformation formulas of theta series estimate of the Fourier coefficients of modular forms and modular forms of half integral weight All these are treated in higher dimensional cases The volume concludes with an Appendix and an Index The book will be of interest to graduate students and researchers in the field of zeta functions and modular forms

Iwasawa Theory 2012 Thanasis Bouganis, Otmar Venjakob, 2014-12-08 This is the fifth conference in a bi annual series following conferences in Besancon Limoges Irsee and Toronto The meeting aims to bring together different strands of research in and closely related to the area of Iwasawa theory During the week before the conference in a kind of summer school a series of preparatory lectures for young mathematicians was provided as an introduction to Iwasawa theory Iwasawa theory is a modern and powerful branch of number theory and can be traced back to the Japanese mathematician Kenkichi Iwasawa who introduced the systematic study of \mathbb{Z}_p extensions and p adic L functions concentrating on the case of ideal class groups Later this would be generalized to elliptic curves Over the last few decades considerable progress has been made in automorphic Iwasawa theory e.g the proof of the Main Conjecture for $GL(2)$ by Kato and Skinner Urban Techniques such as Hida's theory of p adic modular forms and big Galois representations play a crucial part Also a noncommutative Iwasawa theory of arbitrary p adic Lie extensions has been developed This volume aims to present a snapshot of the state of art of Iwasawa theory as of 2012 In particular it offers an introduction to Iwasawa theory based on a preparatory course by Chris Wuthrich and a survey of the proof of Skinner Urban based on a lecture course by Xin Wan

general linear group $GL_n(\mathbb{R})$ of all $n \times n$ non singular real matrices and K the maximal compact subgroup of orthogonal matrices Other examples are Siegel's upper half plane and the quaternionic upper half plane In the case of the general linear group one can identify X with the space P_n of $n \times n$ positive definite symmetric matrices Many corrections and updates have been incorporated in this new edition Updates include discussions of random matrix theory and quantum chaos as well as recent research on modular forms and their corresponding L functions in higher rank Many applications have been added such as the solution of the heat equation on P_n the central limit theorem of Donald St P Richards for P_n results on densest lattice packing of spheres in Euclidean space and GL_n analogs of the Weyl law for eigenvalues of the Laplacian in plane domains Topics featured throughout the text include inversion formulas for Fourier transforms central limit theorems fundamental domains in X for discrete groups such as the modular group $GL_n(\mathbb{Z})$ of $n \times n$ matrices with integer entries and determinant 1 connections with the problem of finding densest lattice packings of spheres in Euclidean space automorphic forms Hecke operators L functions and the Selberg trace formula and its applications in spectral theory as well as number theory

Dynamical, Spectral, and Arithmetic Zeta Functions Michel Laurent Lapidus, Machiel Van Frankenhuysen, 2001 The original zeta function was studied by Riemann as part of his investigation of the distribution of prime numbers Other sorts of zeta functions were defined for number theoretic purposes such as the study of primes in arithmetic progressions This led to the development of L functions which now have several guises It eventually became clear that the basic construction used for number theoretic zeta functions can also be used in other settings such as dynamics geometry and spectral theory with remarkable results This volume grew out of the special session on dynamical spectral and arithmetic zeta functions held at the annual meeting of the American Mathematical Society in San Antonio but also includes four articles that were invited to be part of the collection The purpose of the meeting was to bring together leading researchers to find links and analogies between their fields and to explore new methods The papers discuss dynamical systems spectral geometry on hyperbolic manifolds trace formulas in geometry and in arithmetic as well as computational work on the Riemann zeta function Each article employs techniques of zeta functions The book unifies the application of these techniques in spectral geometry fractal geometry and number theory It is a comprehensive volume offering up to date research It should be useful to both graduate students and confirmed researchers

Let Σ be a Riemann surface of analytically finite type of genus g with $2n$ boundary components. Take two points $P_1, P_2 \in \Sigma$ and set $\Sigma_{P_1, P_2} = \Sigma \setminus \{P_1, P_2\}$. Let $\text{Homeo}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})$ be the group of all orientation preserving homeomorphisms $w: \Sigma_{P_1, P_2} \rightarrow \Sigma_{P_1, P_2}$ fixing P_1, P_2 and isotopic to the identity on Σ . Denote by $\text{Homeo}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})_{\text{iso}}$ the set of all elements of $\text{Homeo}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})$ isotopic to the identity on Σ_{P_1, P_2} . Then $\text{Homeo}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})_{\text{iso}}$ is a normal subgroup of $\text{Homeo}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})$. We set $\text{Isot}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2}) = \text{Homeo}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})_{\text{iso}}$. The purpose of this note is to announce a result on the Nielsen-Thurston-Bers type classification of an element w of $\text{Isot}(\Sigma_{P_1, P_2})$. We give a necessary and sufficient condition for w to be hyperbolic. The condition is described in terms of properties of the pure braid b_w induced by w . Proofs will appear elsewhere. The problem considered in this note and the form of the solution are suggested by Kra's beautiful theorem in [6] where he treats self maps of Riemann surfaces with one specified point. The classification due to Bers. Let us recall the classification of elements of the mapping class group due to Bers. See [1]. Let $\mathcal{T}(R)$ be the Teichmüller space of a Riemann surface R and $\text{Mod}(R)$ be the Teichmüller modular group of R . Note that an orientation preserving homeomorphism $w: R \rightarrow R$ induces canonically an element $w \in \text{Mod}(R)$. Denote by d_R the Teichmüller distance on $\mathcal{T}(R)$. For an element $w \in \text{Mod}(R)$ we define $\alpha(w) = \inf_{r \in R} d_R(r, w(r))$.

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
