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Selma's Bloody Sunday Robert A. Pratt, 2016-12-11 A fresh look at this historical crossroads which marked the culmination of the Civil Rights Movement timely and engaging Patricia Sullivan author of *Justice Rising* On Sunday afternoon March 7 1965 roughly six hundred peaceful demonstrators set out from Brown Chapel A M E Church in a double file column to march from Selma Alabama to the state capital of Montgomery Leading the march were Hosea Williams of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and John Lewis of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee Upon reaching Broad Street the marchers turned left to cross the Edmund Pettus Bridge that spanned the Alabama River The violence and horror that was about to unfold at the foot of the bridge would forever mark the day as Bloody Sunday one of the pivotal moments of the civil rights movement Alabama state troopers fell on the unarmed protestors as they crossed the bridge beating and tear gassing them In Selma s Bloody Sunday Robert A Pratt offers a vivid account of that infamous day and the indelible triumph of black and white protest over white resistance He explores how the march itself and the 1965 Voting Rights Act that followed represented a reaffirmation of the nation s centuries old declaration of universal equality and the fulfillment of the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution Selma s Bloody Sunday offers a fresh interpretation of the ongoing struggle by African Americans to participate freely in America s electoral democracy Jumping forward to the present day Pratt uses the march as a lens through which to examine disturbing recent debates concerning who should and who should not be allowed to vote

At the Dark End of the Street Danielle L.
