Demagogues, Power, and Friendship in Classical Athens Robert Holschuh Simmons, 2023-02-09 What makes a demagogue A much more friendly touch or more importantly a perception of a friendly touch than has previously been explored Demagogues Power and Friendship in Classical Athens examines the ways in which a demagogic leadership style based on personal connection became ingrained in this period drawing on close study of several genres of literature of the late 5th and early to mid 4th centuries BCE Such connection was particularly effective with lower classes of Athenians who had been accustomed to being excluded from politicians friendship based approaches to coalition building Comedies of Aristophanes particularly Knights tragedies of Euripides particularly Iphigenia in Aulis and historical biographies of Xenophon particularly Anabasis and Cyropaedia depict demagogues or characters exhibiting demagogic characteristics using a style of outreach to members of neglected classes that involved provoking feelings of friendship with individuals in these classes whether the demagogues and individual supporters actually interacted closely or not These leaders employed techniques such as propinquity homophily and transitivity that both contemporary sociologists and in some cases Aristotle recognize as effective for such purposes Particular attention is paid to discrepancies in Aristophanes Knights between how the demagogue Cleon is hyperbolically portrayed as a pederastic lover of the Athenian people and how his language and actions make him out as a friend of theirs as he likely portrayed himself

Witches, Isis and Narrative Stavros Frangoulidis, 2008-11-06 This is the first in depth study of Apuleius Metamorphoses to look at the different attitudes characters adopt towards magic as a key to deciphering the complex dynamics of the entire work The variety of responses to

magic is unveiled in the narrative as the protagonist Lucius encounters an assortment of characters either in embedded tales or in the main plot. A contextualized approach illuminates Lucius' relatively good fortune when compared to other characters in the novel; this results from his involvement with the magic of a sorcerer's apprentice rather than that of a real witch and signals the possibility of eventual salvation. A careful investigation of Lucius' attitude towards Isis in book 11 and his relationship with the witch slave girl Photis earlier on suggests that the novel's final book may be read as a second *Metamorphoses* consciously rewritten from a positive perspective. Last but not least, the book also breaks new ground by examining the narrative structure of the *Metamorphoses* against the background of the typical plotline found in the ideal romance. The comparison shows how Apuleius both follows and alters this plot, exploiting the genre to his own specific ends in keeping with his central theme of metamorphosis.

Hogan's *The Tragedy of the Athenian Ideal in Thucydides and Plato* assesses the roles of Pericles, Alcibiades and Nicias in Athens' defeat in Thucydides' Peloponnesian War. Comparing Thucydides' presentation of political leadership with ideas in Plato's *Statesman* as well as *Laches*, *Charmides*, *Meno*, *Symposium*, *Republic*, *Phaedo*, *Sophist* and *Laws*, it concludes that Plato and Thucydides reveal Pericles as lacking the political

discipline sophrosune to plan a successful war against Sparta Hogan argues that in his presentation of the collapse in the Corcyraean revolution of moral standards in political discourse Thucydides shows how revolution destroys the morality implied in basic personal and political language This reveals a general collapse in underlying prudential measurements needed for sound moral judgment Furthermore Hogan argues that the Statesman's outline of the political leader serves as a paradigm for understanding the weaknesses of Pericles Alcibiades and Nicias in terms that parallel Thucydides' direct and implied conclusions which in Pericles' case he highlights with dramatic irony Hogan shows that Pericles failed both to develop a sufficiently robust practice of Athenian democratic rule and to set up a viable system for succession
