**Edward Cullinan Architects** Edward Cullinan Architects, 1984      **Edward Cullinan Architects** Kenneth Powell, 2022-12 Edward Ted Cullinan set up his practice in 1965 as a cooperative in the belief that architecture needed commitment from the whole team He was inspired by a year at Berkeley in 1956 and worked closely with Denys Lasdun before deciding to draw make and grow his own architecture He started with highly inventive low cost houses building his own upside down passive solar home in Camden Mews in North London where he lived until his death in 2019 The practice and the projects grew with major local authority housing schemes schools health buildings and conference centres before embarking on a sequence of university buildings and masterplans in the UK and abroad Ted composed his buildings drawing by hand the section plan and elevations simultaneously The architecture is integral not applied and you didn't have to be an architect to be captivated by the drawings he made when giving lectures His integration of lower energy and environmental design matured as a team effort of architects and engineers With some classic and many new photographs and a selection of his drawings this is the first complete account of the practice that he led for over 50 years Never more than 45 strong the practice ebbed and flowed with the economy and morphed into Cullinan Studio with his insistence on thinking and behaving differently for architecture and the greater good Kenneth Powell has written many articles about the work and the first practice monograph for Academy Editions in 1995 Edward Cullinan Architects is part of the series Twentieth Century Architects produced in collaboration with the Twentieth Century Society and Historic England      **Ends, Middles, Beginnings** Jonathan Hale, 2005 Influential pioneering and active as ever Edward Cullinan Architects continue to hold the pivotal place within British architectural practice that they established in the 1960s Providing a unique privileged insight into their working process this exclusive and timely monograph showcases the firm's sensitivity to the built environment that has shaped all of their work from Ted Cullinan's first commissions to the present Ends Middles Beginnings takes a view from the present looking from Cullinan's recent work to the future situating this work within the contemporary scene the book also provides an overview of how they reached the highly regarded position they hold today Seminal buildings such as the Horder House and the RMC International Headquarters are explored alongside the practice's recent work      *Edward Cullinan Architects* Kenneth Powell, 1995      Accession , Chilworth Park Surrey 1984      Contemporary Architects Muriel Emanuel, 2016-01-23      *Building on Knowledge* David Bartholomew, 2009-01-26 This guide shows design practices and other construction professionals how to manage knowledge successfully It explains how to develop and implement a knowledge management strategy and how to avoid the pitfalls focusing on the techniques of learning and knowledge sharing that are most relevant in professional practice Expensive IT based solutions bought off the shelf rarely succeed in a practice context so the emphasis here is on people centred techniques which recognise and meet real business knowledge needs and fit in with the organisational culture Knowledge is supplanting physical assets as the dominant basis of capital value and an
