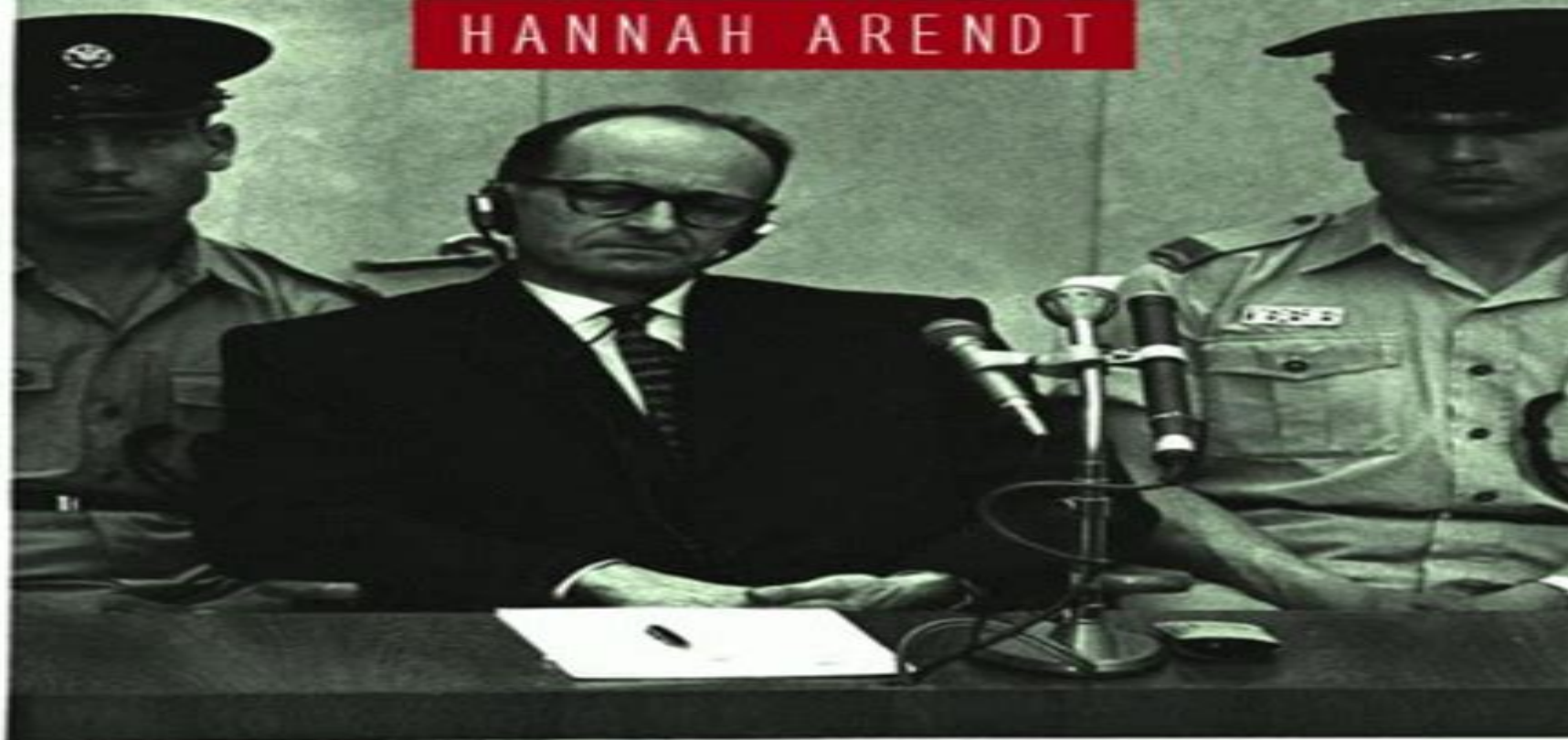

These derive from the human failure to develop the thought, will and judgment that are necessary to prevent the kind of evil committed by the Nazis. Like Arendt, Bergen is more concerned with totalitarianism than antisemitism, often referring to her work *The Origins of Totalitarianism*.
